### Sunshine of Importance at Hog-Farrowing Time

The importance of having windows placed in the hog house so that the sun will shine into the beds at farrowing time is said by swine specialists to be of no small moment. To enable farmers to meet this need, E. K. Gross, professor of rural engineering at the New Jersey college of agriculture, New Brunswick, gives a simple rule based upon the angle of the sun's rays.

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Lambs Bring More Money if Docked and Castrated  
Ram lambs should be castrated when between one and four weeks of age. All lambs should be docked when they are one or two weeks old. Either docking irons or a sharp knife may be used for docking. The tail should be removed about one-half or three-quarters of an inch from the body. When docking irons are used the wound is sealed by the hot iron and this prevents bleeding.
