The Surest Step Toward the Longed-For Future Brotherhood of Man

By PROF. ALBERT E. JENKS, in Dearborn Independent.

LONG life, which is so essential, if nationalisms are to be built on memories, we have not had. Our American nationalistic memories are only 150 years, while one-third of our people have no American group memories, but have come to America from groups most of which, in Europe or Asia, are, roughly, 1,000 years old.

Another of our difficulties is due to the fact that we are not a homogeneous people—either a single ethnic group or a well-amalgamated folk. We are heterogeneous to the extreme.

The first is our geographic isolation, fortunately far from the historic hatreds and fears of European groups.

The second is a gripping environment, which eventually will make us all Americans by breaking those who will not be made American.

The third is such vital, idealistic hope for a realizable future in America as no nation before has held out to individual men.

A Feeling That There Is No Panacea for Modern Ills in Bureaucracy

The spirit of the common law is opposed to those insidious encroachments upon liberty which take the form of an uncontrolled administrative authority—the modern guise of an ancient tyranny, not the more welcome to intelligent free men because it may bear the label of democracy. It is doubtless impossible to cope with the evils incident to the complexities of our modern life, and to check the multiform assaults of organized cupidity, by the means which were adapted to the simpler practices of an earlier day, but we have an instinctive feeling that there is no panacea for modern ills in bureaucracy.

There is still the need to recognize the ancient right—and it is the most precious right of democracy—the right to be governed by law and not by officials—the right to reasonable, definite and proclaimed standards which the citizen can invoke against both malevolence and caprice.

railroads operating out of St. Louis until 1912, when I came to Bonham, Texas, secured employment with the Texas and Pacific Company, and married Miss Beulah Alston in 1914. In 1915 I secured employment with the Southern Pacific Company at Del Rio, where I have remained since that time. I am now thirty-five years old, have a wife and two children, and own a home in Del Rio. For many years I have been a constant reader of economic questions, and during the last four years I have secured a great deal of advanced knowledge through the International Correspondence Schools. I know that my practical education and experience qualify me for the office I seek.

Since I am a property owner and have the care and responsibility of rearing and educating two children, I am directly concerned about legislation; and as a strong believer in economy in government, I solemnly promise that if I am elected my vote and influence will not be used to swell our books with more laws or to burden anybody with higher taxation. I am for fewer laws and better laws. I am for the reduction of taxes wherever that may be possible. I well know if I am elected that the burden of the entire state will not rest upon my shoulders. I shall therefore devote myself to the welfare of the people of my district, and do everything possible to make our part of the state a better place in which to live. Unlike the young lawyers with whom our legislative halls abound, I will not introduce and vote for laws for the mere sake of cheap, personal notoriety.

I do not believe that the people of this district generally knew who the Democratic candidate was to be before they went into the primary. I therefore believe that inasmuch as they were kept in the dark and had no opportunity to name a choice at the primary, they are under no moral obligation to support a nominee in the selection of whom they had neither voice nor vote. I denounce the use of such well oiled machinery as that which was used in selecting the nominee on the Democratic Ticket. A nominee chosen by a small group of men and representative of certain groups or classes only, is in my opinion, not fit to represent anybody, much less the people as a whole. I am therefore appealing to the voters not as a party politician but as an advocate of fairness, justice, and all that will make secure the prosperity and happiness of the whole people.
