After examining the body the Justice found that the deceased came to his death by falling off or being hit by a train and it is his opinion that the man was killed by trying to alight or board train No. 109, as he had been dead for some time when found. There were no papers on his person or any marks about his clothing by which he could be identified. He appeared to be about 45 or 50 years of age and seemed to be a sufferer from tuberculosis.

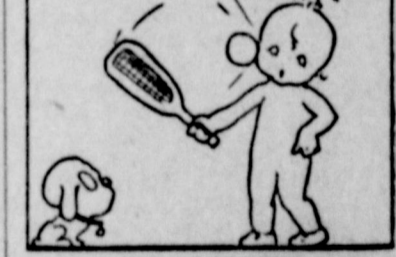
