



LATEST HAPPENINGS It Is the Quality. Not the Quantity of Life That Really Counts

News That Is News, When It By DR. W. S. RANKIN, North Carolina Health Officer.

THAT is the use of adding years to a man's life, if those added years are of no value? If we all lived to be a thousand and didn't make the proper use of our lives, we'd really be worse off, not better off, than we are now. The problem really is how to live our lives (no matter how short or long) in the best possible manner, at the highest attainable efficiency.

It's quality, not quantity, of life that really counts. There was a time, long ago, when this earth of ours was freighted with far more life than it bears now. But it wasn't very intelligent or useful life, and now only fossil bones tell its dismal story. There's less life now, but it's better

Suppose we take 80 representative American people and watch them for a year. What will we find? One dies; his quality is zero. One, at the other end of the scale, achieves an efficiency and vitality of 96 per cent; his quality is high. Only 12 register over 90 per cent; 31 between 70 and 90 per cent; 34 between 30 and 70 per cent, that is, seriously impaired in one way or another. The two that remain are as good as dead, as far as physical quality is concerned.

Our chief job, then, is not to lengthen the lives of old people, but to improve the general tone of the lives of ordinary persons who are not getting what can be gotten out of their years, and aren't giving what they might be giving to the world.

Survey With Purpose to Show Public How to Use Its Leisure Time

It is, of course, difficult to make a general survey for the purpose of showing the public how to use its leisure which will produce results that are of real value. It is difficult to keep it from falling of its own weight. For that reason we have turned for advice and suggestions to organizations like the American Library association which are in touch with people who try to use their leisure to advantage. In fields where there is no central organization of this kind it has seemed wisest to bring together, quite informally, groups of men and women for the preliminary discussions, and to supplement their findings with further analysis and investigation.

Community Contests.

Edge Community, Brazos County, Texas, district 2, made a score of 94.6 out of a possible 100, thus winning first place in the district, also first place in the state for the best Boys' and Girls' Agricultural Community

This contest was started January 1, 1924, by Colonel Frank P. Holland of the Farm and Ranch, offering \$1000 in premiums for the best Boys' and Girls' Agricultural Community Club in the state. Arrangements were made for \$100 of this money to be awarded to the Boys' and Girls' Community Club in the state, the remainder to be divided into nine prizes of \$100 each for the best Boys' and Girls' Agricultural Community Club in each of the nine districts.

Peters Prairie Community in Mason county, district 8, came second with grade of 93.4 out of the possible 100; Dieutsburg Community, Jackson County, district 7, third; Dessau Community, Travis County, district 1, Tryon Community, Gregg County, district 4, fifth; Sunset Community, Kerr County, distrite 6, sixth; Harpersville Community, Stephens County, district 9, seventh; Lakeview Community, Hale County, district 3, eighth, and Meridian Creek Commu-

ity, Bosque County, district 5, ninth. There were a number of other contestants and the educational value of his contest far surpassed the monitorial value of the premius awarded. Other fine records were made, but space will not permit their numeration at this time. Only joint boys' and girls' organizations having not less than five club members working on the same project were allowed to compete. Each county chose its own judges to select the winning community club, while a state judging com mittee was chosen by the Extension Service staff to select districts and state winners.

All clubs were judged by the folowing score card: Percentage of enrollment, 5; percentage of attendance at regular meetings, 15; percentage of record book meeting, 20; average grade of record book meetinug, 20; complete project exhibits at club shows, 26; report of secretary, 20; total, 100.

The winning club of each district se lected a committee composed of two members of the local club-one man and one woman residing in a local community. This committee selected any equipment which it saw fit, up to the value of \$100.

All boys were required to carry on productive projects under the direction of the county or home demonstration agent, while the girls in counties having a home demonstration agent were required to carry full home demonstration programs. In counties having no home demonstration agent, girls carried on productive projects under the direction of home demonstration agents.

The Edge Community of Brazos County, Texas, also won the Delco-Light plant which was awarded by the Delco-Light Company for the best Boys' and Girls' Agricultural Community Club in the state.

Successful Turkey Pool.

So successful was the Thanksgiving turkey pool in Dickens County that the farmers were very anxious to pool the Christmas crop also. In the Thanksgiving pool 7.125 turkeys were handled and in the December pool 3,895 were handled. The turkeys sold brought a net return of \$33,712.15, which was \$6,611.75 more than they would have brought if they had been sold on the street. There were 224 farmers participating in this sale. The Dickens County Times said: "The urkey pool alone has been worth more than six times the amount which the county pays a county agricultural


