Men are not now working together happily and effectively. There is said to be a lack of control in the home, restlessness in the school, apathy in the church, shirking in the shops, dishonesty in the counting houses, grafting in politics, crime in the city, and Bolshevism threatening all our institutions.

All our human relations will be improved as rapidly as we make progress in the social sciences, and I am convinced that our universities will make as great a contribution in the social sciences during the Twentieth century as they did by the discovery of truth in the natural sciences during the Nineteenth century. We may expect the most helpful contributions to the betterment of human relations from universities possessing favorable characteristics:

First, the university must be untrammeled by traditions or superstitions, by politics or cults; but must be animated by a love for truth, and the members of the teaching and research staff must be zealous in their pursuits of truth in their respective fields, and should be sympathetic with research and investigation in fields even quite remote from their own.

Second, the university must sustain a graduate school and a group of professional schools, all in intimate contact with city life.

Third, the university must be inspired with the ideals of religion. The religious interpretation of the universe offers the only possible hope for improvement. > On all projects undertaken hereafter the state in which the development is located should participate in the selection of settlers and the development of farms. The states should not be required to contribute to construction costs, but should be required to contribute to the fund prowided for advances to settlers for farm development as they now contribute to the construction of roads and to agricultural education.

> A fund should be provided from which money can be advanced to help worthy, needy settlers improve and equip their farms. Such advances should bear interest, and, for permanent improvements, should extend over long periods. Four per cent is suggested as the interest rate.

In fact, I am inclined to think that among the elements that go to make the solid reputation of a college, athletic supremacy comes far down on the list in the minds of those, both young and old, whose judgment counts. This means that the cultivation of athletics in the college should be in the interest of the part that it plays in the education of both players and spectators.

Unless athletics can take its place in the picture, in its proper perspective, and in co-operative relations with the rest of the college, trouble is certain to arise.



STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

Declaring she did not represent any special class of interest, but that she approached her task "purposing to do it for the advancement of the common interest of all the people," Governor Ross Thursday delivered her message-the first ever delivered by a woman governor-to the Wyoming state legislature.

For the first time since 1874, when the Texas ranger forces were organized, the State of Texas was without ranger protection Friday in compliwith a perpetual injunction granted by the Fifty-Seventh District Court at San Antonio. The order to suspend operations was sent to the five ranger captains during the morning by Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton, after a conference with Assistant Attorney General C. A.

Eight prisoners, including two of the most noted inmates of the institution and four Houston rioters, were released on parole Wednesday from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

Birth of a baby girl at the Indian reservation home at Hemet, California, to Condino Hopkins, only living child of Ramona, the romantic heroine of Helen Hunt Jackson's novel of early California days, was announced Friday. Ramona's child is welcomed with particular affection in this community. where each year a Ramona pageant celebrates the memory of the bride



FOREIGN NEWS.

Eleven powers participating in the Paris conference of allied finance ministers Wednesday signed the protocol for distribution of the Dawes plan annuities in which the United States shared. The final plenary session of the conference at the Quai D'Orsay in Paris occupied two hours.

Howard Carter, the Egyptologist, has reached an agreement with the Egyptian government under which work will be resumed on the tomb of Tut-ankh-Amen, the exploration of which Carter took over upon the death of Lord Carnarvon.

Examination of the factory in North Berlin, wherein it was recently charged large supplies of munitions were stored, has been completed, it was semi-officially stated this week. The report of the investigators, it was said, shows that in the factory sheds were stored 126,000 unbored steel rods. 10, 000 finished pistol barrels, and 3006 finished rifle barrels already made unfit for military use by shortening. These were no rifles, machine guns or other weapons found in the sheds, if is stated.







LATE FARM NEWS

(By S. C. Hoyle, Editor Extension Service Publications, A. and M.

College of Texas.) Hot Beds and Cold Frames.

The hot beds and cold frames are easily constructed and prove of great advantage on the farm. Some vege tables, such as tomatoes bear better and more fruit when transplanted after being started in the hot beds or cold frames

The hot bed and cold frame should be located convenient to water and built on a well drained soil; also run east and west. Some protection such as a barn, fence or hedge should be on the north side to serve as a wind break. Where there are several hot beds they should be placed parallel which makes them easier to handle and helps to protect them from the wind. One important factor is to make sure no infected soil containing any disease germs whatever is used in the hot beds or cold frames. This is a place where a stitch in time saves

The pit for the hot bed should be

six feet wide and the length depends upon the amount of plants to be started, and whether or not glass sashes are to be used. The width may be more or less than six feet if preferred. This width is suggested be cause the standard sash which is used to cover the top of these beds is six feet long and three feet wide, and a bed six feet wide is very conven native white swans on their way lent to work. It is better for the length of the bed to be such that it can be divided by three when the sash is to be used. The depth should be from 6 to 24 inches, depending on location. In the northern part of Texas the depth should be 20 to 24 inches and in the southern part about 6 to 12 inches. If the depth of the pit is 24 inches, 18 to 20 inches of manure should be put in; that is, about three fourths of the pit should be filled with fresh horse or mule manure. The manure ought not to contain more than 50 per cent of straw or bedding. and should not be put in all at once when the depth is great. A layer of about 4 to 6 inches should be put in, there packed with a sod tamper or the feet and sprinkled before the next layer is placed on. The second and third layers are put on in the same manner as the first layer. After the last layers are packed and dampened, place on a layer of 4 or 5 inches of good garden soil, free from disease, when it is possible to obtain it. The top layer of soil can be placed in after the manure has heated, but it is best to put it on before the manure heats, because some of the weeds seeds are killed by the heat. Cover up the bed with sash or canvas and leave until the temperature rises and then drops back to 80 degrees Fahrenheit, which will require three to four days after the first heating starts. Do not plant any seeds until the manure has heated as it might take more time than that given above.


