LATEST HAPPENINGS

News That Is News, When It Is News, For All.

STATE, NATIONAL, FOREIGN

Happenings the World Over of Important Events Condensed To Good Reading.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

The senate Friday passed the postal pay and rate increase bill.

President Coolidge and Emille Daeschner, the new French ambassador, took occasion at their first meeting on Friday to exchange assurances that nations must be expected to pay their debts.

President Coolidge Thursday signed the resolution directing an investigation into the general freight rate structure.

C. Hascom Slemm terminated his duties as secretary to the president Tuesday and was given a farewell dinner by President and Mrs. Coolidge.

Approval was given Monday by the house building committee to the Elliott bill to authorize expenditure of \$150,000,000 for new postoffices and other government buildings.

By a vote of 252 to 24 the house Saturday passed a bill to authorize increasing the limit of cost of the aircraft carriers Lexington and Saratoga from \$23,000,000 to \$34,000,000 each.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

A serum that will cure the most hopeless cases of scarlet fever in 12 to 24 hours has been discovered, according to Dr. Francis G. Blake, professor of medicine at the Yale Medical School, who was one of the speakers at the Connecticut League of Nursing Education at Hartford, Conn., Friday. The serum is produced, he said, from immunized horses.

Texas charges its citizens practically twice as much to reside in the Imperial Commonwealth as it charged in 1917, figures announced by the department of commerce Thursday showed. In 1924 the expense of the state government of Texas was \$9.86 per capita as compared with \$5 per capita in 1917. From 1923 to 1924, a period of a year, per capita cost of state government in Texas crept up 28 cents.

The lower house of the Tennessee assembly Tuesday at Nashville passed a bill prohibiting the teaching of evolution in the common schools of the state by a vote of 71 to 5.

Mrs. Elizabeth Harris, 85, niece of Brigadier General J. Bankhead Magruder, the Confederate general who directed the brilliant recapture of Galveston from federal forces on New Year's Day, 1863, died Tuesday at Houston, Texas.

FOREIGN NEWS.

The death of snow in Switzerland this season has turned the tide of winter tourists northward and the mountainous regions of Sweden are peopled with sport-loving foreigners as never before.

Rasul, notorious Moroccan bandit leader, is besieged in Tazart, his home city, by Rifian tribesmen under Abd-el-Krim, chief of the rebels at war with Spain.

Germany Wednesday broke her silence in the international opium conference and energetically opposed a plan drawn up at private meetings of the leaders, for the method of electing the proposed central anti-narcotic board of control.

A large consignment of stock from King George's farm at Windsor was sold Tuesday in London.

The Latvian parliament has passed a law forbidding the sale of alcoholic drinks at educational institutions, at theaters, exhibitions, fairs, in provision shops, on board vessels in inland waters, on railway trains and in railway stations.

Prison Supervisors Make Report.

Austin, Tex.—Honor farms all over the prison system is the goal of the prison advisory board, announced in the annual report of the board to Governor Neff at the close of his term. Gradual extension of the honor system to every farm in the prison group is urged by the board. Time will be required, Mrs. J. E. King, in filing the report closing the board's affairs in the Neff administration, admitted. The nine runaway prisoners from the Neff honor farm, established a few months ago, does not prove the honor system is wrong, but the 131 out of the original 140 men who have stayed strongly indicate it is in the right direction, she insists. "The Lord himself chose twelve men to be His disciples, and one was a traitor. Could human hands hope to be more perfect than the divine hand?"

Tomb of King Tut Reopened.

London.—The tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen was reopened Monday in the presence of government officials and members of the antiquities department. The contents of the tomb taken out last year were handed over to Howard Carter, the Egyptologist. Mr. Carter found everything that had been sealed when the tomb was closed remained intact. The priceless pall of the sarcophagus, which had been left outside the tomb in a thin wooden shed, however, had deteriorated, probably beyond repair.

LATE FARM NEWS

By S. G. HOYLE, Editor of Extension Service Publications, A. and M. College of Texas. Protect the Child's Health.

No Frio County children are drinking either tea or coffee, according to reports submitted by eight hundred and thirty children following a health and diet campaign.

Thirty-six per cent of the grade school children in Frio County were found to be more than seven per cent under weight and twenty-four per cent were ten per cent or more under weight. Five hundred and fifty-eight were weighed and measured by the special Red Cross Nutrition Worker and the Home Demonstration Agent.

This situation is surely not a reflection against the county in the production of food nor the excellence of the food prepared by the mothers. Frio County is becoming famous for its relishing foods, principally fruit and an increasing amount of truck. These were the foods found wanting in most cases. It does stand squarely as a vivid indictment of the common practice of letting children have whatever they want to eat whenever they want it. However, the children themselves have demonstrated that they will choose food wisely after having been thoroughly convinced of the value and necessity of choosing proper foods to balance the diet.

The investigations as conducted by weighing and measuring was followed by lectures, classes and consultations for the mothers and children. These were conducted by the Home Demonstration Agent and the Nutrition Worker.

Eight hundred and thirty grade school children were given health habit score sheets to be filled out every day and submitted to their school teachers each week. These cards were suggestive of what should be done in the way of drinking plenty of water, eating fruits and vegetables, keeping clean and getting plenty of sleep and exercise. These cards were faithfully kept for six consecutive weeks.

The health score sheets turned in previous to the educational campaign indicated that the diets of fifty per cent of all children were deficient in fruits and vegetables. Twenty-five per cent were using tea and coffee. Fifty per cent were not drinking enough milk.

There were nearly five thousand health habit score sheets tabulated by the eight hundred and thirty children in six weeks. This is essentially one hundred per cent. This high percentage was facilitated by the earnest co-operation of all school teachers. The teachers rendered invaluable services in every way possible in connection with the balanced diet project.

The final summarization of the health score cards brought out the fact that ninety per cent of those children who were deficient in milk increased their milk and dairy products consumption quite materially. The reports by the children vouched for by the mothers claimed that none of the children wanted to drink either tea or coffee after they had learned of its harmful effects.

Eighty-five per cent of those whose diets were deficient in fruits and vegetables increased their consumption of these foods.

Of the thirty-six per cent who were found to be under weight at the beginning, fifteen per cent had made appreciable gain even by the end of the six weeks, when the reports ceased coming in. Some who were found to be as much as twenty per cent over weight were prescribed special diets to reduce them.

During this campaign, in order to give the children an opportunity to live up to some of the health rules without much effort, hot lunch rooms were established in three schools.

Farm and Home Suggestions.

An occasional well placed mirror adds space and light to living room or hall.

A pan full of dry warm oats poured into a boy's wet boots dries them out the best of any known method.

A pan of water on the radiator or register will give needed moisture in the air of the room during the winter.

The soil for most potted plants should be a good garden loam containing a little sand, a little well-rotted stable manure, a very little bone meal, and a little leaf mold.

In preparing macaroni, a hearty cold weather dish, all stickiness should be washed away by rinsing after cooking. Plenty of cheese, tomato, or meat sauce adds flavor to this dish.

Agricultural chemists throughout the country are finding that pure sunlight, without the interference even of window glass, is an essential in making strong-boned animals.

For best hatching results, a proper ratio between males and females should be maintained in the poultry flock. For Leghorns, the proper ratio is one male to 20 females. In the case of American or dual purpose breeds, one male to 12 or 15 females is about the right ratio.

A reduction of about 10 per cent over last year in the number of brood sows bred for farrowing this spring is reported by the United States Department of Agriculture. Last fall's pig crop is reported as about 24 percent of last year.

THE GRASSHOPPER GLACIER

Near the ancient town of Cooke City, Mont., northeast of Yellowstone park there is an immense glacier or ice field. This glacier is composed of thousands of strata. These strata, or layers of ice, are filled with a species of insect, locally referred to as "grasshopper" for want of a better name, and now extinct.

The scientific explanation of the peculiar phenomena is that, no one knows how long ago, this section of the country was visited by a plague of these insects; that while flying over the mountains of the Bear Tooth range, in what is now known as the Bear Tooth National forest, they were caught in snowstorms, carried down to earth and died. The passage of these swarms of insects continued at intervals year after year. Winter after winter, millions upon millions of these insects were caught in the snowstorms and perished.

This glacier is approximately a mile wide and upwards of half a mile long. Because of the fact that it lies in a rock-rimmed, bowl-shaped space on the shoulder of a mountain, at an elevation of about 11,500 feet above sea level, no one can accurately determine just how thick it is. Its depth may be as great as 1,000 feet.

The layers of ice which make up this glacier are alternately light and dark in color. This, it is thought, is accounted for by the fact that each year the snow which fell during the period after the flights had ceased, being pure, containing no insects, fell, froze and formed a "light" strata, whereas the snow which formed the succeeding strata, fell during one of those insect flights, contained countless numbers of their carcasses and formed a "dark" strata.

FAUNCES TAVERN

Faunces Tavern at the southeast corner of Broad and Pearl streets in New York City is one of the oldest buildings in that great city. Built in 1719 as a residence for a Mr. DeLaney, fate decreed that it should play a prominent part on so many important occasions that it has naturally won for itself a place of prominence among the most distinguished landmarks of our time.

History records that in 1757 this building was being used as a store-room and warehouse. Later it became the property of a West Indian gentleman who was known as "Black Sam," from whom Samuel Faunces purchased it in 1762. Three years later it passed to a new owner and in 1768 the organization of the Chamber of Commerce was effected here. Faunces again became the owner of this much-traded building in 1770 and in it conducted a tavern—a gathering place for those gentlemen and ladies who wished to favor him with their company. A shot from a men-of-war struck this building in 1775, following which Faunces joined the American army. Later he again secured ownership of this hotel and continued in possession of it for a number of years.

In 1783 General George Washington was banqueted here by Governor Clinton of New York state, and in this same building during the same year General Washington took his leave of his forty-four officers. Faunces sold this building in 1785 and it later passed through a series of ownerships and usages. In 1822 the interior was damaged by fire. Twenty years later it became known as the Broad Street House. Subsequently it was visited by a disastrous fire and still later two stories were added to it. The venerable building was once more restored and in 1907 it was dedicated by the Sons of the Revolution. Restored to its former appearance and interior arrangement, the present structure is practically as it was during the Revolutionary period. The first floor is still used as a restaurant, the second containing the celebrated long room where General Washington took leave of his faithful lieutenants of Revolutionary fame and the third being occupied as a museum contains relics—flags, china, medals, etc.—of Revolutionary days.
