STATE, NATIONAL, FOREIGN

Happenings the World Over of Important Events Condensed To Good Reading.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

The senate Friday passed the postal pay and rate increase bill.

President Coolidge and Emile Daeschner, the new French ambassa dor, took occasion at their first meeting on Friday to exchange assurances that nations must be expected to pay their debts.

President Goolidge Thursday signed the resolution directing an investigation into the general freight rate

C. Bascom Slemp terminated his duties as secretary to the president Tuesday and was given a farewell dinner by President and Mrs. Coolidge.

Approval was given Monday by the house building committee to the Elliott bill to authorize expenditure of \$150,000,000 for new postoffices and other government buildings.

By a vote of 252 to 34 the house Saturday passed a bill to authorize increasing the limit of cost of the air craft carriers Lexington and Saratoga from \$23,000,000 to \$34,000,000 each.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

A serum that will cure the mos hopeless cases of scarlet fever in 12 cording to Dr. Francis G. Blake, pro fessor of medicine at the Yale Medical School, who was one of the speakers at the Connecticut League of Nursing Education at Hartford, Conn., Friday. The serum is produced, he said, from immunized horses.

Texas charges its citizens practically twice as much to reside in the Imperial Commonwealth as it charged in 1917, figures announced by the department of commerce Thursday showed. In 1924 the expense of the state government of Texas was \$9.86 per capita as compared with \$5 per capita in 1917. From 1923 to 1924, a period of a year, per capita cost of state goverpment in Texas creeped up 38 cents.

The lower house of the Tennessee assembly Tuesday at Nashville passed a bill prohibiting the teaching of evolution in the common schools of the state by a vote of 71 to 5.

Mrs. Elizabeth Harris, 85, niece of Brigadier General J. Bankhead Magruder, the Confederate general who directed the brilliant recapture of Galveston from federal forces on New Year's Day, 1863, died Tuesday at Houston, Texas.

LATE FARM NEWS

By S. G. HOYLE.

No Frio County children are drinking either tea or coffee, according to reports submitted by eight hundred and thirty children following a health and diet campaign.

Thirty-six per cent of the grade school children in Frio County were found to be more than seven per cent under weight and twenty-four per cent were ten per cent or more under weight. Five hundred and fifty-eight were weighed and measured by the special Red Cross Nutrition Worker and the Home Demonstration Agent.

This situation is surely not a reflection against the county in the production of food nor the excellency of the food prepared by the mothers. Frio County is becoming famous for its relishing foods, principally truck and an increasing amount of fruit. These were the foods found wanting in most cases. It does stand squarely as a vivid indictment of the common practice of letting children have whatever they want to eat whenever they want it. However, the children themselves have demonstrated that they will choose food wisely after having been thoroughly convinced of the value and necessity of choosing proper foods to balance the diet.

The investigations as conducted by weighing and measuring was followed by lectures, classes and consultations for the mothers and children. These were conducted by the Home Demonstration Agent and the Nutrition Worker.

Eight hundred and thirty grade school children were given health habits score sheets to be filled out every day and submitted to their But you needed clothes. Why not school teachers each week. These cards were suggestive of what should be done in the way of drinking plenty of water, eating fruits and vegetables, keeping clean and getting plenty of sleep and exercise. These cards were faithfully kept for six consecutive

> The health score sheets turned in previous to the educational campaign indicated that the diets of fifty per cent of all children were deficient in fruits and vegetables. Twenty-five per cent were using tea and coffee. Fifty per cent were not drinking enough milk

> There were nearly five thousand health habit score sheets submitted by the eight hundred and thirty children in six weeks. This is essentially one hundred per cent. This high percentage was facilitated by the earnest co-operation of all school teachers. The teachers rendered invaluable services in every way possible in connection with the balanced dlet project.

The final summarization of the health score cards brought out the fact that ninety per cent of those children who were deficient in milk increased their milk and dairy products consumption quite materially. The reports by the children vouched for by the mothers claimed that none of the children wanted to drink either tea or coffee after they had learned of its barmful effects.

Eighty-five per cent of those whose diets were deficient in fruits and vegetables increased their consumption of these foods.

Of the ti rty-six per cent who were found to be under weight at the beginning, fifteen per cent had made appreciable gain even by the end of the six weeks, when the reports ceased coming in. Some who were found to be as much as twenty per cent over weight were prescribed special diets

to reduce them. During this campaign, in order to give the children an opportunity to live up to some of the health rules without much effort, hot lunch rooms were established in three schools.



TE ARE all familiar, of course, with the ancient sectional struggle between the North and the South. It turned simply upon a difference of opinion as to the extent to which a state had the right to secede from the Union. Apart from that, the South and the North were faithful to the same organic instrument and cherished the same general constitutional ideas and ideals. I say now, after having been a member of this body for some time, that the line of division between North and South in that sectional struggle is nothing like as deep as the line of division that I have seen developed here day after day between the West and the East as respects the true functions of

As a means of enlarging the vocabulary and increasing one's power of observation so far as language is concerned, the cross-word puzzle, in my opinion, has no peer. That is why I introduced it among my senior students. Not because it would especially develop their engineering talent, but because it would give them greater fluency in their mother tongue.

In the University of Kentucky College of Engineering 50 per cent more English is taught than in any other technical school in the United States. I believe that, first among all things, one should have a speaking knowledge of his native language, and I am finding that the cross-word puzzle is a greater stimulus of rapid conception and perception of the relationship of words than any other agency coming under my observation.

A feature of the cross-word puzzle is that it teaches us knowledge under such fascinating and entertaining conditions it will never leave us. Moreover, it is a continuous and automatic intelligence test that is continually challenging its solver to greater learning and understanding.

FAUNCES TAVERN

Faunces Tavern at the southeast corner of Broad and Pearl streets in buildings in that great city.

Built in 1719 as a residence for a Mr. DeLancey, fate decreed that it · should play a prominent part on so many important occasions that it has naturally won for itself a place of prominence among the most distinguished landmarks of our time

History records that in 1757 this building was being used as a storeroom and warehouse. Later it became man who was known as "Black Sam," from whom Samuel Faunces purchased It in 1762. Three years later it passed to a new owner and in 1768 the organization of the Chamber of Commerce favor him with their company,

A shot from a men-of-war struck this building in 1775, following which Said bid shall be accompanied, Faunces joined the American army,

In 1783 General George Washington was banqueted here by Governor Clinton of New York state, and in this same building during the same year part of the bidder, and that if General Washington took his leave

Faunces sold this building in 1785 and it later passed through a series of ownerships and usages. In 1832 the interior was damaged by fire. Twenty years later it became known as the Broad Street House, Subsequently it was visited by a disastrous fire and still later two stories were added to it. The venerable building was once

more restored and in 1907 it was dedicated by the Sons of the Revolution. Restored to its former appearance and interior arrangement, the present structure is practically as it was during the Revolutionary period. The first floor is still used as a restaurant. the second containing the celebrated ong room where General Washington took leave of his faithful lieutenants of Revolutionary fame and the third being occupied as a museum contains relics-flags, china, medals, etc., of itevelutionary days.


