Bowie and Cass Counties Conduct Dairy Schools.

The county and home demonstration agents of Bowie and Cass Counties have recently completed a series of very successful one-day dairy schools. These schools were conducted at six places in Bowie County and at five places in Cass County. In Bowie County the attendance averaged about thirty-five to the school while in Cass County the interest seemed to be much better and the average attendance was about sixty. Those who attended these schools were not in any sense there because something was going on in town for they were not held in town but were right out in the country in farmers' dooryards and cow-lots.






