This is the second consecutive year that Minton has carried off this honor.

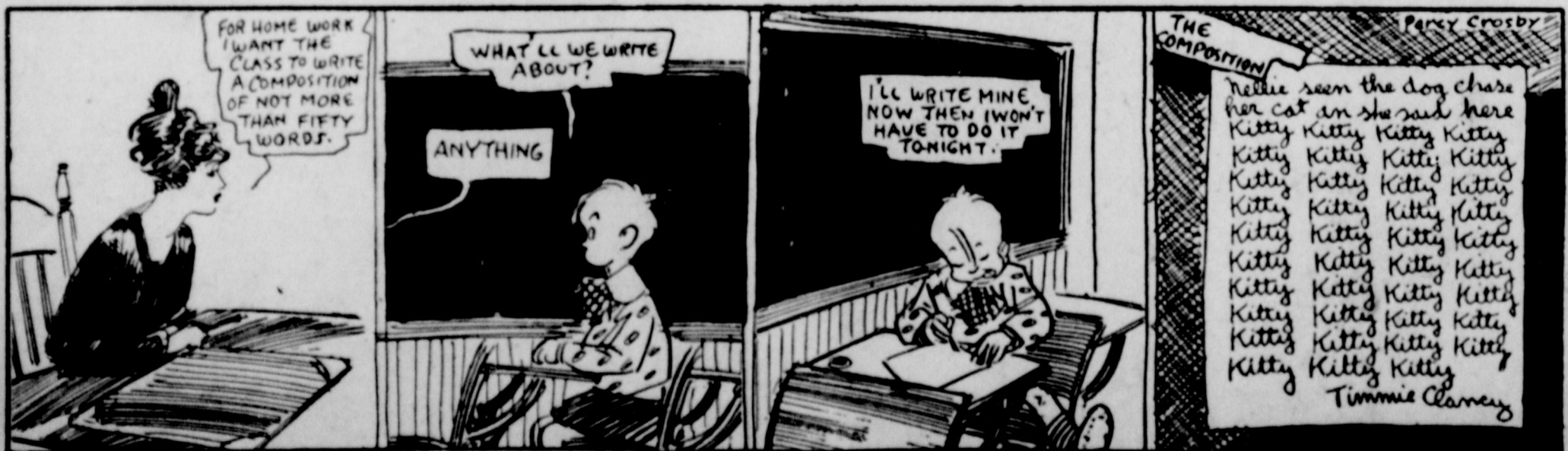

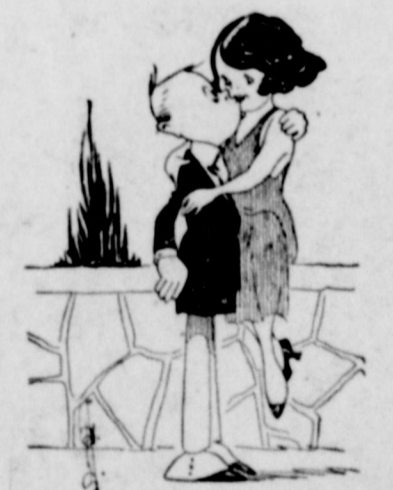
