## RESOLUTIONS AT EXECUTIVE SESSION MAY 14TH

The following resolutions were read and passed at the regular quarterly meeting of the Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association of Texas, which was in session at Ozona Thursday, May 14:

"Whereas, A. & M. Experimental Station Number 14, located near Sonora, in Sutton county, Texas, will entertain the sheep and goat raisers of Western Texas at the Experimental Station on August 11, and 12, 1925, and

"Whereas, we believe attendance at such meeting will prove of great value in an educational way, as well as a pleasurable vacation for those interested in these industries;

"Therefore, be it resolved that we urge all sheep and goat raisers to visit said Station on said dates as the guests of the Experimental Station, and,

"Be it further resolved that the secretary of this association be and is hereby instructed to furnish a copy of this resolution to the public press throughout the sheep and goat raising territory and to the official journal of this association to the end that the date of such meeting may be thoroughly published among the sheep and goat raisers of our state.

"I hereby certify that the above is a true and correct copy of the original resolution presented by the resolutions committee of the Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association of Texas and adopted by unanimous vote of the members of the executive committee of the above named association in regular quarterly session at Ozona, Texas, May 14, 1925."

"Whereas, during the Fall of 1924, representatives of the Boston wool houses were urging the wool growers to contract their Spring 1925 clips of wool at much higher prices than are now being offered, and

"Whereas, from the best information obtainable, it seems there is not an over-production of wool in the world; but on the other hand there seems to be a world-shortage of sheep and consequently of wool, and it being our understanding that there is no decrease in the demand for woolen goods and hence the consumption has not suddenly or materially reduced and there being no apparent economical reason for a great reduction in the price offered in the Fall for the Spring 1925 clips such as now offered for same, and we being of the opinion that such reduced price of our product is not called for by natural conditions and that the price will become better in the near future;

"Therefore, be it resolved by the executive committee of the Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association of Texas in regular quarterly meeting at Ozona, Texas, the 14th day of May, A. D. 1925, that we urge upon the wool grower that he be not in too great hurry to sell his wool at prevailing offers therefor at this time; but that he use proper discretion in awaiting an improvement in the market which we feel must necessarily come within a short while."

## Boy Scouts Enjoy Outing.

The local Boy Scout troop enjoyed a three-day outing this week at a tank a few miles from the city. Drilling, first-aid, cooking and swimming were among some of the features that the boys participated in, which will enlighten them in the future guidance to their fellow men.

## "SO BIG" WINS \$1,000 PRIZE AS BEST NOVEL

The Times has scored again. Our serial novel, "So Big," by Edna Ferber, has been voted the best representative American novel for 1924, and the author has been awarded the \$1,000 Pulitzer prize. President Nicholas Murray Butler, of Columbia University, announced the decision made by the advisory board of the school of journalism of the Pulitzer prizes in journalism and in letters for 1924.

At the close of each year a committee of competent judges review all noteworthy American novels published during the year and select from hundreds of stories the one "which shall best present the wholesome atmosphere of American life and the highest standard of American manners and manhood."

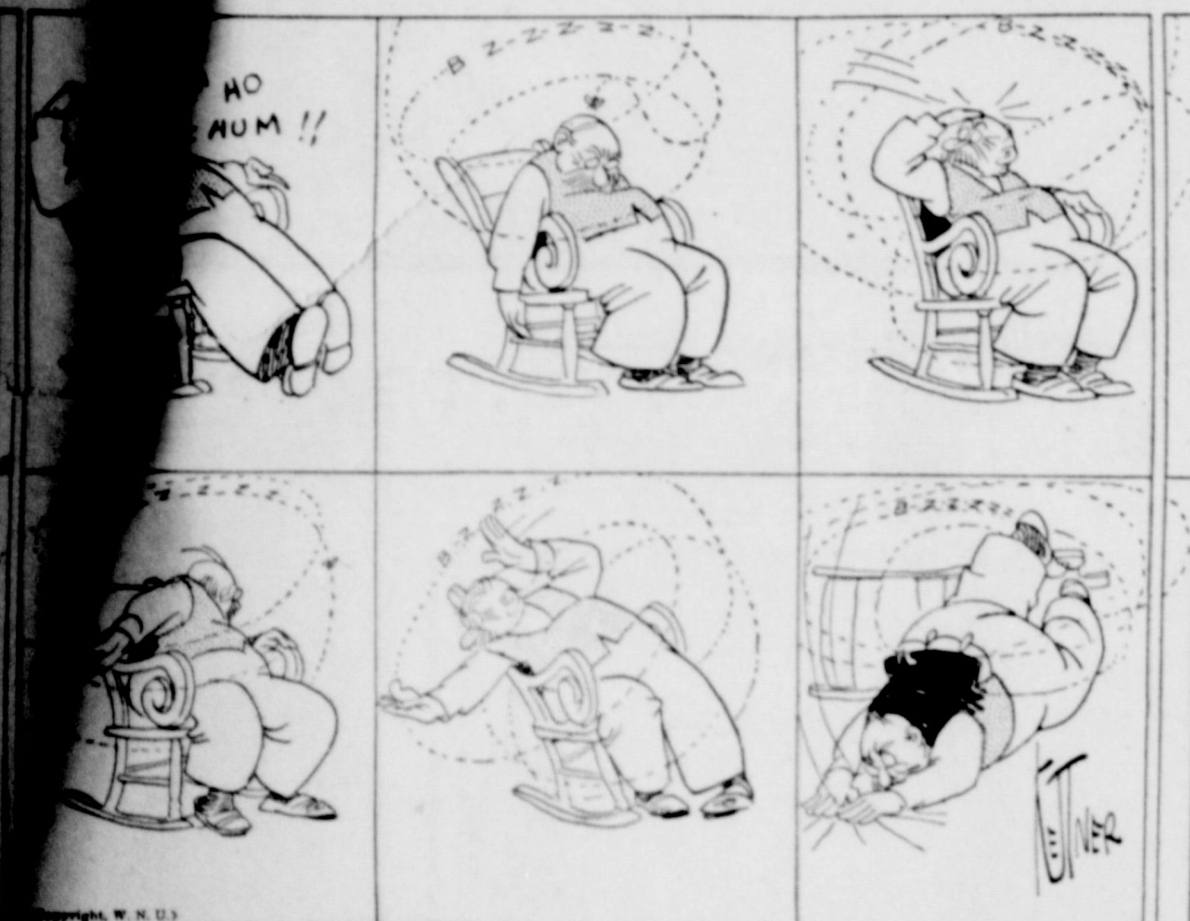
