

This letter is in relation to the Commerce is making efforts proposed Madigan Plan that is calling for a Farm Services Agency. The reorganization would combine the functions of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), Soil Conservation Service (SCS), and Farmers Home Administration (FHA). The following letter was committee agrees with the concept of reorganization and especially with the ideal of saving the taxpayer money.

> Currently the ASCS and FHA offices are located in Farwell that is the county seat of Parmer County. The SCS is in Friona that is twenty-five (25) miles from Farwell. The ASCS and FHA offices are housed in a 4,911 square foot building. The ASCS complex was built in 1986 with an addition for the FHA office completed in 1991. These two agencies in Farwell employ a work force of fourteen (14) with the agency in Friona employing four (4). The committee feels the most feasible solution to the collocation of agencies is to have the SCS office move to Farwell.

The same landlords of the Farwell building own enough land adjoining the building for an addition to accomodate the SCS office plus enough for parking. The landlords are willing to work Also, I would like to thank Bill with the government in building anything suitable for the SCS

T. Bivins Is Named To Committee

State Senator Teel Bivins (R-Amarillo) has been appointed to the Interim Senate Committee on Home Equity Lending by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock. The committee will study whether Texas home-equity lending laws should be changed.

Texas law currently prohibits voluntary encumbrances on homestead property. Legislature recently considered several bills to amend home-equity laws but no agreement was reached.

"I was supportive of homeequity lending in the past session, but there are still many issues that must be examined," Bivins said. "As a member of this committee, I plan to approach the issue with an open mind so we can generate a fair and reasonable proposal."

The interim committee will issue a report to the Legislature on its findings by December 1994. It also will recommend changes in Texas law relating to home-equity lending.

Sens. John Montford (D-Lubbock) and Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo) also were appointed to the committee.



LOSING STREAK SNAPPED

Chiefs 'Get It On,' Down Canyon 7-0

"48 MINUTES OF HEART!" That was the cry of the Chieftains as they charged onto the field to face the Canyon Eagles. That committed attitude paid off in their 7-0 victory over the Eagles.

"There were two keys to the win," said Coach James Morton. "The Chieftain defense limited the Canyon offense, and the Chieftain offense controlled and dominated the time of possession."

The first quarter began with a Chieftain offensive drive. Blair Burney threw a long pass to Jimmy The Burney-Arias Connection was successful four times during the game, totalling 75 yards for the Chieftain offense. "They couldn't cover us," said Burney.

In the second quarter, a penalty moved the Chiefs back from the three-yard line. The Burney-Arias Connection came through for the only touchdown needed to beat the Eagles on a fourth and goal from the 25.

The last chance Canyon had for a touchdown was spoiled when Roy Hendley jumped in for an interception. "The 'Front 7' was shutting the run down, so they had to do something. I knew they were going to pass," said Hendley.

The offense was able to run out the clock after gettting two first downs. Fans poured onto the field to congratulate the Chieftains on breaking a 12 game losing streak. The scoreboard was left on most of the night. Blair Burney explained, "Coach Morton said in case anybody forgot the score, they could look!"



The grass also has deep roots. The most notable quality of Roots have been found as deep as knotgrass is its ability to survive 17 feet. This allows the plant to while being submerged under water, reach greater depths of moisture to

The extensive, deep root system allows the grass to choke out most lake weeds, which have shallow roots and die from lack of water. Knotgrass also provides an excellent wildlife habitat and environmental advantages. More than two million ducks and geese overwinter on the area's playas, and the seeds produced by knotgrass are an excellent food source for these

In the summer, the tall grass provides good places for rabbits and other animals to hide, feed and build

"The knotgrass provides a much better habitat than a bare, dry basin," said A. Wayne Wyatt, manager of the water district. The grass also prevents wind erosion of the playa lake soils.

Cattle apparently like the grass, too. Mitchell said cattle prefer the grass to other forages (when given a choice) and will eat the grass even after it dries up in the late fall and winter. Mitchell plants wheat around the edges and lets the cattle graze it along with the knotgrass in the bottom of the lake beds. If he does not have any wheat and the knotgrass is dry, he supplements it with protein blocks.

ordered by the water district, the knotgrass had a dry weight crude protein of 8.18% and total digestible nutrients of 62.14% in one lake, and 10.6% crude protein and 70.7% digestible nutrients in the other. Clip samples indicated a yield of 8,075 pounds of dry forage in one lake and 6,653 pounds in the

about 20 pounds of dry grass a day, this year's yield should support about one cow per acre. According to Ken Smith, a research assistant with the animal science department at Texas Tech University, both of these are good protein percentages for a forage grass. He does recommend supplementing protein when grazing or feeding knotgrass

SPS Announces Rate Settlement

Southwestern Public Service customer who uses 1,000 kwh pays Company has announced that it has reached a rate settlement that will reduce it's overall Texas retail rates by approximately \$13 million, or

2.9 per cent, beginning October 15. "This settlement resolves the expensive litigation process of a rate hearing which began August 31 in Austin," said SPS President Coyt Webb. "Our electric rates already are the lowest of all investor-owned utilities in the state. Now they will be even lower, on an annualized basis. The making existing businesses in our area more competitive, and making this area increasingly attractive to new business."

The settlement agreement is between SPS, the staff of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, the Office of the Attorney General, a steering committee representing most of the Texas cities served by the company, and various intervenors. The settlement still must be approved by the Public Utility Commission.

"Some parties in the case were proposing the disallowance of many legitimate business expenses, while ignoring the fact SPS is the most efficient utility in the state," said SPS vice-president of rates and regulation, Gerald Diller. "They were proposing reductions of around \$30 million to rates that are already the lowest in Texas. acknowledged some reduction could result as a reflection of today's falling interest rates, but all along contended that the levels of reductions being requested by some parties were unreasonable and unjustified."

"Rate reductions will vary among classes of customers, due to the different costs to serve each customer class," Diller said. Residential rates will decline an average of 2.3 per cent on an annual basis. Industrial rates will decline an average of 3 per cent, while commercial rates will be reduced an average of 3.4 per cent.

"SPS has long opposed seasonal changes in rates for our residential and commercial customers, which result in higher rates per kwh during the summer when our customers generally use

the most electricity," Diller said. "However, in order to satisfy state-favored conservation ideas, SPS has agreed to implement a four-tenths of a cent per kilowatt hour winter/summer rate differential for residential customers." A similar differential between summer and winter rates per kwh will occur

for commercial customers.

\$64.72. Under the new rate schedule, the price for 1,000 kwh will decline 5.3 per cent to \$61.29 for the months of October through May, once the new rate schedule is in full effect. During the four months of June through September, the price will rise nearly one per cent to \$65.29.

The rate reduction will have a net effect on the order of 16 cents on SPS earnings per common share company earned \$2.34 per share in fiscal 1992 and \$2.41 per share in the 12 months ending July 31, 1993. "The company will make every

effort to mitigate the impact of this reduction on earnings by increasing the intensity of new business development, both in our utility and non-regulated business sectors," Web said. "This rate decrease also will require us to examine even more careful cost controls and to consider reductions in some company programs and operations."

Southwestern Public Service Company provides electric service to 75 cities in Texas, and serves portions of New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas as well. It provides wholesale power to several rural electric cooperatives, municipal electric systems and other electric utilities. Company headquarters is in Amarillo.

For those stocks whose price has fallen without a dividend cut, the yield is particularly attractive. and money managers look for the stock to eventually move up on a yield basis alone.

This entire system is predicated on the theory that the highestyielding stocks have seen a drop in share price. As the price of a stock falls and the dividend remains the same, the yield rises. This makes them candidates for a rebound.

The system is not infallible, but on average it has a remarkably good record. The strategy is spelled out in a 1992 book called "Beat the Dow," written by Michael O'Higgins and published by Harper Collins. The book is recommended reading for anyone interested in buying quality stocks that offer attractive dividends at reasonable
