

#### DE PALMA HAS TWO CARS IN BIG RACE

Little Italian-American Has Had Many Accidents.

Ralph DePalma, without question the most popular idol that ever drew a pair of racing goggles, has entered two cars in the fourteenth Annual International Sweepstakes May 31 at the Indianapolis motor speedway. Starting his racing career in 1907, DePalma has lived through a series of accidents his 19 years of racing that would have stopped a less courageous friver. But broken bones have meant nothing to the little Italian-American. Of the thirteen international sweepstakes run at the greatest race course in the world. Ralph has taken part in ten. He started out in the 1911 race by finishing fourth. In 1912 came the greatest point in his career when, after putting his car to the front and leading the second man by 20 miles, he saw victory slip through his fingers on the last lap of the race. DePalma's motor died at the head of the front stretch on his last lap and he pushed his car to the tape, only to be totally disqualified because it had not crossed under its own power. In 1915 Ralph howed the field the way home. He finished sixth in 1919; and fifth in 1920. He came up to fourth place in 1922. The year 1923 he drove his car 69 laps. In 1925 he finished in seventh place.

While DePalma has entered two cars, he has not named them. He is working on them in his Los Angeles workshop. DePalma will no doubt be



#### Present Easy Divorce Laws Blamed for Lowering of National Morality

By BISHOP WILLIAM T. MANNING, of New York.

Many questions are asked me about a strict divorce law. Here are two that are typical: "Does a strict divorce law tend to the increase of immorality?" It does not. The statements that it does so are without foundation. This is shown by the experience of South Carolina, where divorce is not granted for any cause, and of Canada, where the divorce law is a strict one. In the year 1916 Canada had only 57 divorces, while the United States had 112,036. There is no evidence that the morals of the people of Canada are unfavorably affected by their divorce laws.

Another question often asked is this: "Is not a strict divorce law a cruel and unjust thing to many innocent sufferers? It is not. That legcruel and unjust thing to many innocent sufferers?" It is not. That legof society as a whole. Jesus Christ was the most kind and merciful teacher who ever stood on this earth. He tells us that for the good of all marriage must be held sacred and says, "Those whom God hath joined together let not man put asunder."

Constantly we now see in the newspapers notices of divorces obtained in Paris or elsewhere by those whose names are well known among us and who seem to have forgotten their duty to God, to society and to their country. In not a few cases the real reason for the divorce is the desire to marry some one else. In many instances the new alliance is not only in mind but is definitely arranged before the divorce is obtained. The moral degradation of such a situation needs no comment.

Plainly this threatens the very existence of the family as an institution. It is destroying the meaning of marriage and is making it only a temporary arrangement to be determined at the whim of either party to it. How can a home exist if it is understood that it may be dissolved at any time on the most trivial grounds and often merely because those who entered into this sacred relation have become bored, or because one of them wishes to form an alliance with a new partner? Homes cannot be built and cannot endure on such a foundation as that, and a nation cannot endure unless it preserves the sacredness and stability of the home.

Cows give more milk and hens become enthusiastic in the matter of eggs when music is played. Music can do everything for the body that the old, nonprogressive physicians could not do. The Bible is authority for the statement that music was used in this way in the ages before Christ. David, for instance, gave musico-therapy to Saul when he was supposed to be insane.

The flowing notes of a violin, the rhythmic thrills of a piano-but not jazz-can be employed to smooth out domestic tiffs, and as for notable examples of the curative value of music, Gladstone was cured of rheumatic pains by a solo in G and Chopin's music aided Carmen Sylvia. Fourteen New York hospitals are now employing music with good effect in the tuberculosis wards.

I believe that with proper care, diet and sanitation and music we can all live to be one hundred and fifty years old.

Various ailments require different musical prescriptions, but I believe that within twenty years the "musico-physician" will be a well-established figure in medicine.

There is no country abroad of any size or consequence in which motion pictures "made in America" are not exhibited and in many of them the American "movie" commands up to 90 per cent of the showings. Thus the United Kingdom screens 90 per cent American productions: France goes higher than 75 per cent; Germany, up to January 1, 1925, 80 per cent; the Scandinavian countries, nearly 80 per cent. The Latin-American nations show our pictures in similar proportion, as do also the countries of the Far East, Australia being our third largest market, with over 90 per cent American pictures. Canada shows practically as many American films in proportion to its theaters as we do in the United


