Wheat has defied the toll of time with the greatest clouting record of his career in the last three seasons. averaging approximately .375 and leadng the fight of the veterans to disace the leader, Rogers Hornsby of St. ouis. In 1923 he was second, with .375; in 1924 third, with the same mark, and last year he closed at .359,

After hitting .207 in 1919, Wheat began the greatest stretch of batting in his long record, hitting successively for averages of .328, .320, .335, .375.







Our institutions of higher learning have a great responsibility in the task of promoting and sustaining our civilization. There is great need today for spiritual re-enforcement and the general acceptance of ethical values. Our institutions of higher learning must make definite contributions to the peace, happiness, health, comfort, safety and morality of our people. We can best accomplish these ends by fostering the great forces of civilization to which reference has been made. Our institutions must produce a cultural leadership, competent to perform their duties courageously, honestly and efficiently in every field of human endeavor.

Elimination of Waste in Production and Distribution Called For

By RAY M. HUDSON, Department of Commerce.

Tremendous wastes in production and distribution have done much to lower the purchasing power of the dollar today to about one-half its 1913 level. These wastes have been caused largely by too much variety which, by reason of the vast number of minor differences in every day commodities, is placing a heavy burden on everyone in the country.

Private enterprise has attacked this problem in many cases, and with considerable measure of success. For instance, a shoe manufacturer has reduced his variety from three grades and 2,500 styles to one grade and 100 styles, thus bringing the price of these shoes to the consumer at \$6 .-60 where previously they sold at \$10. Further, a hat manufacturer who found that of the 3,684 styles and colors he was making, 90 per cent of the demand was supplied by seven styles and ten colors and thus again was the cost to the consumer lowered.

A survey taken by the Department of Commerce showed wastes ranging from 28 per cent in the metal trades to 64 per cent in the manufacture of men's ready-to-wear clothing. The average waste of six industries surveyed, he said, was almost 50 per cent-almost half of the material, labor, time and money lost.

Half of these losses were due to faulty management caused by low production, interrupted production and restricted and lost production.

Wastes in production have their parallel in wastes in distribution, the causes of which he classified as follows: Speculation, seasonal operation, lack of statistics, lack of standards, too many varieties, nonuniform business practice, deterioration of commodities, inadequate transportation facilities, disorderly marketing, too many links in the distribution chain, bad credits, faulty understanding of economics, unfair practice, are popular. excessive uses of materials and destruction by fire.

Completion of the Panama canal and increased railway rates have given the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard industries an advantage over Midwest industries in competing for markets bordering on the continent. The result of this has been to shrink up what would otherwise have been the normal growth of Midwest industry and commerce and drive it closer to the seaboard. There has been a profound movement of this character during the last five years. This, again, has a reflected action on the agricultural situation. The idea must be to build up industry in the midst of agriculture, thereby gaining diversity of employment, the immediate consumption of agricultural products without long transportation, and better distribution of the population of the nation.
