BOYSCOUT AREA COUNCIL ORGANIZED TUESDAY
Joe Kerr of Sanderson was elected national councilman of the newly organized Southwest Texas Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America at the meeting held Tuesday in Uvalde.
Representatives were present from Eagle Pass, Sabin, Hondo, Sanderson, Uvalde, Leakey, and Del Rio.
George E. Love of Del Rio was elected to head the organization. Headquarters for the council went to Uvalde without a dissenting vote.
Del Rio won out in the election of the permanent camp site, the Devil's river having been chosen over the Frio Canyon by a 17 to 9 vote.
The next meeting of the area council will be held in Del Rio.
J. C. Campbell of Uvalde, who has done most of the work of organizing the area, was elected to act as temporary scout executive of this area until a permanent man is chosen. He did not want to accept, but said he would let the president know within a few days.
The meeting was called to order at 2 o'clock by Mr. Campbell, who after introducing E. E. Voss, deputy regional executive of the ninth region which covers Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico turned the meeting over to him. Immediately the delegates voted to apply for a charter and in this connection accepted the financial expenditure plan as suggested by Mr. Voss.
The following officers were elected: George E. Love of Del Rio president; Dr. Thomas B. Knopp of Hondo, vice-president; William H. Hous of Eagle Pass, vice-president; T. B. Coker of Pearsall, vice president; A. P. Johnson of Carrizo Springs, vice-president; D. W. Price of Uvalde, treasurer; Andrew Smyth of Uvalde, chairman of the court of honor; Joe Kerr of Sanderson, national councilman; C. H. Ballentyne of Brackettville, ranking commissioner; Ernest King of Batesville, A. Adamitz of Bandera, Lon Smart of Rock Springs, and Dr. A. J. Springfield of Leakey, commissioners.
A motion was passed asking the local secretaries to forward money to the area treasurer as soon as possible and to collect the pledges throughout the year.
Before the meeting adjourned at 4:30, a rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Campbell for his work and to Uvalde for their splendid entertainment of the visitors.
Uvalde entertained the visiting delegates at 12:30 Tuesday with a dinner at the Sunshine Cafe. At this affair, Mayor Harry Hornby, editor of the Leader-News, welcomed the visitors and commended them upon the great work which brought them together. Mr. LaCrosse of Del Rio responded.

NEW TOLL CIRCUIT FOR SANDERSON
It has been officially announced to the Times that Sanderson is to have one of the best toll circuits in the state built direct from Del Rio which will enable us to talk with any station that has toll connections.
We are advised by the management of the local telephone company that this work will be started by the Del Rio & Western Telephone Co. not later than July 1, this line will be constructed of good heavy material over the main highway, with a pole lead of some eighteen feet in height and the very best grade of copper that is made will be used, which is a copper metallic circuit. The progress of this line will depend some on labor conditions as to how long to construct it, but roughly we would say 3 to 4 months.
The regular toll tariffs on rates in Texas will apply to this station being based on air line charge and the subscribers will be able to get just as good service connections as any toll center affords.
