As carefully mad. Boy Scout Movement Declared to Be Highly Effective War Deterrent

By SIR ROBERT BADEN-POWELL, "Chief Scout of World."

The international boy scout movement has been characterized as a prime influence for world peace and good will. A suggestion of the League of Nations that the international scout organization be formed into a "Junior League of Nations," has been opposed, but the present world association of scouts, as now operated, serves ably a similar ideal.

To make a true league we must have first the right spirit. We all want to do away with war, but there is not much use of trying to effect that end by limiting armaments or decreasing navies.

It behooves the scout organization to forget national aspirations and look wide toward international brotherhood. Wars result from jealousies and fear of smaller nations. The greater nations, therefore, must set for their smaller sisters an example of unselfishness and helpfulness. By extending the hand of understanding and fellowship from the boys of sone nation to another we can aid in insuring for the world an era of peace and prosperity.

Facts Show That Birth Control Cannot Prove Cure for Crime

By DR. EDWARD N. EWER, President California Medical Association.

The birth rate in the United States has declined more than 30 per cent in the last thirty years and is still declining, "without the assistance of clinics or other birth control ballyhoo."

Intelligence tests are not infallible. The evolution "flare-up" of last year resulted in the passage of laws by certain states making such states

The extravagant claims made for birth control by its votaries stamp it as the most pretentious as well as the most bizarre of the servist cults. Birth controllers hold out birth restrictions as the remedy for crime, ignorance, poverty, underfeeding, bad housing, tuberculosis, degeneracy, alcoholism and mental defectiveness. The eugenists would breed them all away. Some of these things have decreased during the time our birth rate has been falling 30 per cent, and some of them have not. Crime in every form has greatly increased in spite of our falling birth rate.







I say it good and loud (I never whisper, anyhow), so's the opposing pitcher can hear it.

"What's the effect of that remark? Why right away Mr. Pitcher is reminded of his responsibility. He turns the situation over in his mind and says to himself, 'Gee, this looks bad.' Naturally he isn't at his best and the chances of the run being scored are just so much improved for our team."

The volume of Meyers' voice and its irritating qualities have a definite market value. He once was purchased from Newark by Jim McCaffrey, then owner of the Toronto International League club, just to keep him "from tantalizing the Toronto club any more," as McCaffrey explained.

"If they stopped the coaches from saying anything," said Meyers recently, with a certain touch of wistfulness in his voice, "I might as well fold my tent and be on my way. I wouldn't be any good to my ball club. A coach that doesn't say anything or that just makes noise at random is a total loss. I aim to make my remarks fit the oc-
