

Yet when critics speak of the failure of the churches, do they take into account the even worse failure of politics and democracy? Nothwithstanding strenuous efforts, scarcely more than half the voters could be induced to go to the polls in the last two Presidential elections.

"Boy Guidance" Plan Big Factor in Giving Aid to Ambitious Youth

By J. B. SHAW, Dean of Men, Iowa State College.

That many boys go to college with no definite purpose, except to get through with a minimum of exertion is the main reason why a chair of "boy guidance" should be established in every school.

We need men in every school to listen to the boys' ambitions and gain their confidence. We need men who are capable of counseling with the students with a view to helping them take up some profession.

The mission of these counselors would be to advise with the boy and aid him in choosing his life's work. After the boy has chosen his profession then it would be the work of the counselor to establish a point of contact between the boy and some members of his probable profession, that the latter might help him in any way possible.

MAY CHANGE NAME

City by the Bosporus Known by Many Titles.

Washington.-The suggestion has been made in Turkey that Constantinople be renamed for Kemal Pasha. president of the republic.

Constantinople has had many names at various times, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society from

"Not for 400 years has Constantino ple been Constantinople to the Turks. It is Stamboul to them. Some geographical title experts hold that Stamboul has been abbreviated by the Turks from Constantinople just as they abbreviated Thessalonica (Salonica) to Selanik. There are two other con tentions. One is that Stamboul is a corruption of a phrase which the city.' Another supposition is that 'islam,' meaning 'true believing,' and 'bul,' meaning 'copious,' have been Stamboul, 'abounding in the true Mos-1em faith."

"Emperor Constantine, for whom Constantinople is named, did not him self give it that name. On May 11 330 A. D., Constantine called together a mass meeting in the newly complet ed hippodrome. It was a ceremony of rejoicing. A new city had been built, destined to succeed Rome as capital of the Roman empire for 11 centuries. At the high point of the hippodrome pageant Constantine dedicated the city to Christianity and named it Nova Roma.

"It was the Greeks who called it Constantinoupolis and finally it be came Constantinople. The patriarch of the Greek church still signs his title 'bishop of Constantinople, New Rome,' but Nova Roma was forgotten. So was the original name, Byzantium for King Byzas, a local ruler, who first built a town on the Golden Horn peninsula.

"Turks have had other affectionate names for Constantinople just as Americans call New York, Father Knickerbocker. Sometimes the Turks call it Oummoudunia, 'the Mother of the World, and sometimes Islambol, 'the City of Islam.' Another name is Der el Sandet, 'the City of Felicity.' Arabs call it by a name which is sig-



Illiteracy Increasing; Paris Lays It to War








When connected to the proper equipment, and properly adjusted, these bulbs of mystery act as generators of alternating, or vibrating electric cur-Now a characteristic of these rap-

idly vibrating electric currents is that they send off "radio waves" from bodies in which they are flowing. It generating equipment to a wire, or system of wires, suspended high in the air, and a considerable amount of energy will be sent forth as radio waves. The highly suspended system of wires is called "aerial" or "antenna." "It is like the mouth whence comes a loud voice, calling around the earth to radio sets everywhere."

The telephonic currents from the studio are so connected to the transmitting equipment that they control the strength of this radio voice. Thus, the transmitting station sends out a replica of the telephonic currents, the chief difference being that instead of traveling along wires it goes through space as radio waves.

What the Click Means

A click should be audible in the loudspeaker when the plug is inserted in the jack. The click shows that the "B" battery current is reaching the plates of the tubes. Broken transformer wires or bent prongs on the jacks are generally the cause of the signal not reaching the plates.

Cause of Flickering Tube

A flickering tube is caused by the arm or wire which has become dirty passing around the rheostat. This is remedied by removing the arm, and sandpapering both it and the resist-ance wire over the entire length of the rheostat where the arm makes

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
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


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
