



# ADJOURNS SESSION

Many Measures Passed Have Been Approved by Governor Dan Moody.

Austin, Tex .- Amid the usual scenes of felicitation and farewells, the Fortieth Texas legislature adjourned last week to meet again in special session

Dozens of bills passed by the Fortieth legislature have been approved by Governor Dan Moody.

Bills signed: Providing stock in Texas insurance companies shall be valued at not less than \$10 nor more board of directors shall consist of not oil and gas permit on 200 acres of land in Harris county, San Jacinto bay; authorizing the land commissionthereafter in which to file for purchase; validating Guadalupe county road bonds; repealing special road law for Brazoria county; authorizing wolf bounties in McCullough, San Saba. Lampasas, Burnet and Llano counties; certain counties; providing that service in the Spanish-American war shall eliminate no Confederate veteran from the state pension list; requiring agricultural pools to deposit bonds at the approval of the state commissioner of agriculture; repealing a special Parker county road law; validating the incor poration of the town of Sudan in Lamb county; fixing the jurisdiction of the Harrison court; placing Briscoe county under the province of certain cattle legislation; segregating the white and oil permits in Brazoria county (two bills); providing legal machinery for the extension of public service beyond city limits. Several measures on which Governor Moody delayed action bave become laws automatically.

#### ALLOTMENTS FOR TEXAS WATERWAYS

Wasington, D.C.-Major General Edgar Jadwin, chief of army engineers, has allotted \$2,590,330 for improvements of Texas waterways for the fiscal year beginning July 1. General Jadwin said that in addition to the allotment an adequate sum had been kept in reserve and more could be

allotted if needed. Allotments to Texas were: Sabine Neches, \$800,000; Houston ship channel, \$500,000; Galveston harbor, \$100,-000; Galveston Channel, \$250,000; Texas City Channel, \$240,000; channel from Aransas Pass to Corpus Christi, \$250,000; Port Aransas, \$150,-000; Double Bayou, \$12,000; Turtle Bayou, \$14,700; Trinity River, \$21,-800; Cedar Bayou, \$12,200; Freeport harbor, \$75,000; West Galveston Bay and Brazos River Canal, \$11,530; chan-\$33,000; channel to Port Bolivar. \$20. 000; Anahuac channel, \$31,000; Clear Creek, \$6,600; channel from Pass Cavalo to Port Aransas, \$18,000.

## 3-Cent Gas Tax in Effect.

Austin, Tex.-Texas' 3-cent gasoline tax law went into effect Wednesday immediately after Governor Moody signed and filed House Bill No. 72, which increased the tax from 1 cent. The 1-cent tax had been in effect four years, having been fixed by the 38th legislature. The new law fixes the tax at 3 cents per gallon up to September 1, 1928, and after that date a tax of only 2 cents is to be charged.





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

#### HOUDINI'S SECRET IS BARED BY AID

"Telepathy" Worked by Telephone System.

New York .- The late Harry Houlini's spectacular "telepathy" was disclosed as a telephone system, for which his whole house was wired, the New York World says.

Houdini employed the ideas of Thomas A. Edison in developing a conraption which would fake the semlance of thought transference.

The secret was that Houdini wore in electric belt which established an invisible connection, by electro magnetic induction, with loops of wire oncealed under a carpet. When these oops were energized, by the current of a telephone circuit, invisible lines of magnetism, cutting across the turns of wire in the electric belt, generated a minute electric current. This current was the exact counterpart of the one which energized the wires beneath the carpet.

It was the sum total of this induced electrical energy which vibrated the diaphragm of a miniature telephone receiver and reproduced speech.

The trick was to pick up utterances of "thought transmitters" by means of "planted" dictaphones and then reeat these utterances on a strong telehone circuit terminating in the loops nder the carpet where Houdini stood. Louis C. Kraus, who worked with Houdini in developing the telepathy dea, said Houdini's whole house was wired. Two years ago, when experiments in telepathy in London were

## Many Dairy Calves Are Overlooked in Winter

Many dairy calves are neglected during the winter months because the owners feel that feed is too expensive and that it does not pay to give the calves proper care. When these same men try to buy heifers or young cows. however, they find that good ones are

very expensive. Calves should have skim milk at least until they are six months old They will come through the winter in fine shape when this is available along with a limited amount of grain and good alfalfa hay. Such calves should gain around one pound per iny or slightly more. A fine helfer will result when this gain is not lost by improper feeding later in the life

Some of the best grains to use along with skim milk in calf feeding are cracked corn, ground oats, ground barley and bran. These can be used alone or in combination and supply the needed fat that has been taken out of the skim milk. Corn is especially good as a feed to supply fat.


