The work of graveling the Glacier to Gulf highway between Nixon and Smiley is proceeding rapidly and will be completed in a short time. This will mean a hardsurfaced road from Smiley to San Antonio as the road from Nixon to the metropolis has been completed for some time.

New prisoners received by the Texas pententiary system during Apri totaled 213, the monthly report of the prison commission filed with Governor Moody reveals. Forty-five escaped convicts were recaptured, 61 escaped and at the end of the month \$295 were "on hand," the report said.

The first reduction of mileage of state highways was made recently by the highway commission. Highway 42 between Sherman and Whiteright, formerly designated as a state highway, was ordered discontined. Approximately 18,000 miles have been designated as state highways. When a road is so designated, its maintenance falls on the state and the coun-

ty is relieved of any work on it. A water filtration plant wffl be installed and a part of the system of mains will be rebuilt at Laredo at a cost of \$500,000. The improvements will be completed within four months. The filtration plant will supplant the one there now and will, also, displace be worse the hole more than 3,000 feet in depth which the company drilled in order to give Laredo an artesian supply. It will be located on the bank of the Rio Grande, within half a mile of Fort McIntosh. Its capacity at the start will be 6,000,000 gallons daily and its construction will be such that this capacity may be increased as required to 18,000,000 every 24 hours.

Since the last report a month ago Texas crop conditions have changed considerable, particularly in the important northwest wheat district. While rainfall has been excessive over most of the Northeastern fourth of the state, more moisture is urgently needed in the Northwest as well as in parts of the West-Central and extreme South. Farm work is several weeks late in the wet sections and lack of moisture has retarded preparations in the drier areas, says H. H. Schutz, federal statistician for Texas, reporting on May 1 conditions.

INHERITANCE TAX COLLECTIONS SLOW

Federal Government Collects Only \$716,361 in First Nine Months of 1927

Washington, D. C .- The federal government collected \$716,361.14 in inheritance taxes in Texas for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1927, as compared with \$1,173,161.13 for the first nine months for the fiscal year 1926, the treasury department announced this week.

Automobile taxes collected in Texas in the first nine months of both fiscal years were negligible, amounting to only \$1448.62 in 1926 and \$1866.21 in

Collections from the tax on net estate of descendents in the entire nation for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1927 amounted to \$81,092,239.02, compared with \$97,401,301.90 for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1926. The periods are from July 1 to March 31.

Collections from the tax on automobiles and motorcycles for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1927 amounted to \$46,921,220,12, compared with \$88,104,163.30 for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1926.

The revenue act of 1926 reduced the tax on automobiles and motorcycles from 5 to 3 per cent, effective March 29, 1926, and reduced the rates on the net estate of descendants with an exemption of \$100,000 instead of \$50,000 and a maximum credit of 80 per cent instead of 25 per cent for estate, inheritance or legacy taxes paid to states, effective February 26, 1926.

Value of Humphreys' Estate.

Clay said Colonel Humphreys had disposed of between \$10,000,000 and \$12,000,000 to charity and in personal gifts to his family during the past 10 years.


