

#### Self-Respect the "Pearl of Great Price" That 40 COUNTRIES IN America Has to Offer BIG FARM CENSUS

#### Government Regulation of Agriculture Only Hope of the Farmer

Railroad operations are supervised by federal and state commissions and their rates are regulated to provide adequate financial support and at the same time to impose no undue burden on the public. Something along the same line can be worked out in agriculture. Basic prices in agriculture can be regulated, but not until there is some restriction

on production. Bankers are to a large extent responsible for many of the mistakes of the farmers by encouraging unsound practice in agriculture and by failing to work out remedies for the ills that now beset the farmer in nearly every section. No banker would lend money to commercial or industrial concerns unless he were sure the enterprise was on a paying basis. How many bankers make their agriculture loans on a similar showing?

Agricultural conditions have caused the failure of more banks in the last three years than in the previous twenty-five-year period. This is sufficient to emphasize to bankers the importance of stabilizing this fundamental industry in the United States.



# Find Lost Key to Moses' Tongue

#### Inscriptions Discovered at Sinai May Help Solve Baffling Problem.

Boston.-The key to the baffling naracters of a strange half-Semetic, half-Egyptian language which flourshed nearly 3,000 years ago and which science has never been able to decipher may rest today with Prof. Kirsopp Lake, head of the Harvard-Michigan expedition to Mount Sinai, Arabia. A terse message from Professor Lake to the Boston Herald reports new-found fragments of the mysterious "Sinai inscriptions," which Harvard university authorities said might throw an entirely new light on Moses and

The Sinai inscriptions were found more than twenty years ago on the mountain where Moses received the tables of the law. They have never been satisfactorily read, although authorities have unceasingly sought their solution.

#### May Remake History.

If Professor Lake's "fragments" fit into the existing gaps it was possible, archeologists here said, that they might not only remake history but reveal a new origin of modern lan-

The inscriptions were discovered in 1904 during the excavation of the temple of the Egyptian goddess, Hathor, on the side of Mount Sinai. They were carved on stone tablets and images unearthed among ruins of the temple and were in a language never before encountered by excavators, according to Dr. Henry Pfeiffer, Ph. D.

The characters, he said, It was on a stretch of road through strangely allied to Egyptian hieroglyphics and the later Semitic alpha-

bet, yet were not identical with either. Prof. Hubert Grimme, a German scientist, who has advanced a translation for the earlier fragments which, however, has not been accepted by all investigators, believes the inscriptions represent a connecting link between the Egyptian and Semitic languages.

#### Gods Share Temple.

Grimme's translation made Moses, himself, the writer of the sentence in which, after identifying himself as superintendent of the mine workers of Sinal and the caretaker of the great temple there, gives thanks to the Egyptian queen (Pharaoh's daughter) for having rescued him as a child from the Nile

He expressed gratitude for positions of power the queen has given him and refers to the temple as belonging to the Egyptian goddess, Hathor, and to the Jewish god, Jehovah.






