Waste of Elders Factor in Stirring Feeling of Poverty in Child

NLY in the new sense of being comparative rather than actual can the word poverty be emphasized in any discussion of juvenile delinquency. We can ignore poverty in the sense that the child characters of Dickens knew it, for the simple reason that it is practically non-existent in any civilized land today and never existed in the United States.


