

Church Must in a Practical Way Meet the Competition of the World

By W. A. DOSS, Illinois Jurist.

TX 7 HILE "Methodism" has had a vital influence on American life for more than a century, it might be better to consider whether the church has exercised real genius in solving the more pertinent problems before it now. The painful fact is that in scarcely any church that I have observed within the last year or two do I see a great percentage of attendance of younger people. Unless the older membership in attendance at these church services be replaced or increased, it is a mere matter of time until it can be mathematically seen that death will eat away the major portion of the present church

I am not criticizing the young people if they should not be drawn to such an emotional way of gaining a spiritual lesson, but the point is: Would young people attend in any considerable numbers any strictly

It may be that because of the advent of the auto, radio, moving pictures, etc., the young people have acquired unconsciously to themselves or us a sort of standard of religion and morals to which old or former ways of religious observance will give way.

Frankly it must be admitted that this is a kind of competition or resistance to the form of success which our church must meet. It would be useless for us to deny that there is competition, and we must demonstrate that our plan, our product, is superior and better if we are to have it survive. I have complete confidence that our younger folks will ultimately very largely adopt the plan which proves to most efficiently develop the best Christian men and women.

#### Highest Ideal of Universities Should Be Teaching Resistance to Evils

By ARNOLD BENNETT HALL, President University of Oregon.

The first hypothetical objective for the reorganization of the first two years of a university curriculum is the development in the student of the consciousness of the eternal conflict between intelligence on the one hand and mysticism, prejudice, bigotry and intolerance on the other, and the developing of those habits of intelligent behavior which will best equip him to resist the forces of darkness,

The second hypothetical objective would be the organization and direction of the emotional life of youth until the organized emotional complexes, or sets, would tend to operate in behalf of altruism, nobility and righteousness, rather than in the interests of the opposing forces.

If the first course in chemistry were a course that told the history of the science of chemistry, showing how it started in mysticism and how slowly and at what a cost the intelligence of man gradually supplanted the forces of mysticism and ignorance, they would come out of that course at the end impressed with the fundamental significance that the science of chemicry had been a triumph of intelligence over the forces

They would find the same thing true in geology, in physics, in social science and in religion.

Only the mind of the child is developed while the soul is permitted to die and waste.

In rearing children it is most important that both parents and children recognize the divine authority to govern children, given to the parents. It is the parents' sacred duty to govern and the children's sacred duty to be governed.

#### Parental Problems Increase in Proportion With the Progress of the World

Progress of civilization has demanded radical changes in the relation of parent to child comparable to the changes in industry or farming. Under a simple civilization child care correspondingly was simple, but modern progress has presented a new problem for the parent.

Under the conditions of our complex living the radio, the newspaper, the telephone, the automobile place us in contact with far-distant parts of our country and even with remote parts of the globe. Children come in contact with a constant flood of new ideas and influences. Under these new conditions older methods often break down or need modifica-

Modern parents are eager for the new knowledge of children and scientific methods in child care and the parents' problems are those which deal with health and normal growth, discipline and education.

#### Idea of Everlasting Punishment Has No Part in the Faith of Judaism

By RABBI STEPHEN S. WISE, New York.

Judaism considers death as not the end of life, but merely an incident in a fuller life. It urges the unquestioning acceptance of death as the will of God, and none of the Jewish prophets has enlarged upon the topic by telling anything of a future life.

Judaism does not believe in hell or everlasting punishment. Life is not to be as if good deeds are to be rewarded and bad deeds punished. Judaism is not a religion of fear. It says nothing of a hell after life, but teaches that a hell in life should be avoided. Judaism does not subscribe to a system of rewards and punishments. There is none of the terror and horror in Judaism that is found in religions which hold out the specter of everlasting damnation for the naughty.

But in the early part of the present century it became evident that the structure for which Thomas Jefferson had drawn up plans and made a model while in France was no longer adequate for the needs of the state. In 1904 and 1905 wings were added. in which new quarters were provided for the legislature; and the old hall of the house of delegates became a museum for the state's agricultural exhibits. At its 1926 session, however, the general assembly decided the hall deserved a fate more in keeping with its history, and the work of estoration then authorized is now approaching completion.

# To Help Save Our Forests



By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

A ITHIN a few weeks President Coolidge will be issuing his annual proclamation for American Forest week, during which time al. Americans are urged to turn their attention to the problem of saving our vanishing

forests and to co-operate by every means possible to that end. As usual, week will be the officials of the American Tree association, headed by Charles Lathrop Pack, the president.

In anticipation of that observance a series of prizes were offered for the best cartoons drawn by amateurs Clubs; John Hays Hammond, Jay N. Darling (Ding), noted cartoonist of the New York Herald-Tribune; Col. William B. Breeley, chief forester of the United States forest service, and Dr. John T. Finley of the New York Times. These judges recently announced the prize winners among the 210 cartoons which were entered in the contest and which came from every state in the Union and two foreign countries.

If the example of Sweden, which may well be emulated by the United States, presents the bright side of the picture, the experience of another nation plainly shows the darker side and should be an object lesson to this country, unless it gives the forestry problem serious consideration. From a recent issue of the Congressional Record is taken these excerpts under the title of "A Plea for the Forests," from an address by John Q. Tillson, majority leader of the national house of representatives, who made an extended trip through China, Japan and Korea last summer:

Japan herself has done much better in this regard in her own little island empire. The islands are evidently of comparatively recent geological forma-tion, so that there are many more high mountains with precipitous slopes and much of the land is steeply sloping hillsides. From some of these the for-ests were stripped carelessly and eroslon had begun its deadly work, has not been permitted to run its structive course as in China and to a lesser degree in Korea. 





#### **GERMANS DEVELOP** HUGE FLYING BOAT

#### Craft Will Have Speed of 165 Miles an Hour.

New York,-Germany has developed an amazing flying boat with 10 motors and wings with a spread of 282 feet that is expected to make regular 24-hour transatlantic flights.

The machine weighs 256,000 pounds -128 tons. It will be able to carry 165 persons and 13,000 pounds of freight. Its maximum speed will be 165 miles an hour.

These details were heard from Fritz Doering, chief pilot and personal representative of the Rumpler Airplane works in Berlin, and Consul Louis J. Skinitzero, who have arrived here to complete negotiations with a group of American business men from New York, Chicago and San Francisco for formation of a company to finance

the enterprise. Dr. E. Rumpler, head of the organization bearing his name, is one of the leading plane builders in Europe. He has built airplanes since 1908 and has worked on the problem of transoceanic flights since the end of the war. Doctor Rumpler has invented the new "multi-motored" flying boat.

The basic idea behind this machine, Doering explained, is decentralization of weight and all motion units. Use of a large number of motors assures greater safety, he said. Six motors would be sufficient to lift the plane and its cargo from the ground, and four motors would be enough to sustain flight. Therefore, he said, motor trouble is likely to be forgotten, as there always would be sufficient re-

These boats will cover the distance from Europe to the United States in 24 hours, the sponsors say. It is planned to make nonstop flights which will pass over the Azores on the way to America, and over Newfoundland on the way to Europe.

#### Paris to Re-establish Leper Colony in City

Paris .- A leper colony, abolished nturies ago, is to be re-established

in Paris. At the old Hospital St. Louis, built under Henry IV in 1607, a wing is to be fitted up for the unfortunates. Some authorities say leprosy is on the increase and the city has taken the situation so seriously as to appropriate a million francs for the new leper

"Unclean, unclean," the Biblical warning of the lepers as they wandered about, had its equivalent in France in the sort of wood rattle which the lepers, obliged to wear a distinguishing costume, shook as they walked to enable people to get out of their way and keep at a safe distance.

For centuries there was a leper colony at the present Prison Sant Lazare. 800 years old, not far from the downtown district of Paris. It was abolished when the place became a monastery 400 years ago.

#### America's Motor Bill Takes a Great Leap

Chicago.-William M. Webster, commissioner of the Automobile Equipment association, estimated America's automobile bill for 1928 will top by millions the \$8,000,000,000 spent in 1927. following a survey of advance orders. Out of the total he estimated 60 cents of every dollar will represent service, supplies, labor and maintenance parts and only 40 cents actual car

sales. "The American motorist now leads the world in spending money on his car," said Mr. Webster. "Where the motorist of 1915 spent 20 cents of every dollar for service, today he is spending 57 cents of every dol-

He estimated the world registration of motor vehicles would pass 30,000,000 by next December and that the year will witness the greatest movement of motor vehicles on the roads of the United States.


