Science Notes Changes in Position of Pole

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Although the inhabitants of the earth are not perceptibly affected by the wandering motion of the North pole, yet it is a phenomenon of increasing interest to scientists, particularly astronomers.

This motion, which is suggestive of the "wabbling" of a top, is extremely slight when the vast size of the earth is taken in account. For about 30 years the North pole has never, it is claimed, been more than 35 feet away from the place it should occupy if the earth's axis of revolution never varied in direction. The amount of variation has been learned by the International tions and four observing stations, all close to the thirty-ninth degree of Midzusawa, Japan; Caroloforte, Sardinfa; Galthersburg, Md., and Uktah, Calif. Precisely similar observations with exactly the same kind of zenith telescopes are made at each station on carefully selected stars. In this the pole reveals itself by a shift of the stars.

TOUNG people must realize that they are the creators of tomorrow. > But if the weight of the motor and fuel could be reduced or its power proportionately increased, so much more "pay load" could be carried.

> All human and animal existence depends upon combustion as its source of energy. The first real progress man made in his ascent or descent from the anthropomorphic missing link depended upon his control of fire or combustion, and our further progress depends upon more intelligent and efficient control of combustion.

At present there is a deadlock in the design of light, high speed internal combustion engines for automobile and aircraft use. The effect on

increased compression in increasing efficiency is thoroughly realized. Designers are prepared to supply high compression engines if the common run of motor fuels can be used in them.

couch connected to a special seis mograph, Doctor Angenheister ob tains records of every shock and quiver produced by the throbbing heart, precisely as though these were shock waves broadcast through the globe by an earthquake. The doctor's seismograph magnifies

by several thousand times heart shocks transmitted to it. The vibrations are then recorded on a moving strip of photographic film. Physicians now study the action of

the heart, Doctor Angenhelster and his medical associates point out, by indirect methods, either by sounds or by electric changes. The old-fashloned stethoscope of

even an ear pressed to the chest permits one to hear the heart sounds and these now may be magnified and recorded by modern electric apparatus Similarly the electric changes accompanying the heartbeat are recorded by the instrument called the electro cardiograph.



Writing from London in 1786, while he was minister to the court of St. James, Adams said: "It has ever been my hobby horse to see rising in America an empire of liberty, and a prospect of 200,000,000 or 300,000,000 of freemen without one noble or king among them."

It was John Tyler, tenth President of the United States, blessed with similar vision, who made a similar prophecy, though not so extravagant as Adams' but at the same time doubtful of fulfillment, and missed his guess by only a few years and a relatively small number of millions of popula tion. In a letter addressed to Col. Samuel Gardiner of Shelter Island, whose son married Tyler's daughter, and dated from the ex-President's country seat, Sherwood Forest, Va., November 26, 1850, Tyler said: "In a little more than half a century, a people who were regarded as little better than a host of murderers or sojourners among savage tribes have attained position

"With a spirit of adventure here tofore unequaled by anything which has occurred on the map of the world, there is united a deep plodding sagacpattering footsteps ity which crowns the most daring enterprises with success. As the result of his kindness to a stowaway black cat, in prohibiting his crew from throwing it overboard to prevent. a jinx, the captain is \$7,000 richer than when he put out from Wildwood Gables.

When demands came from the forecastle to toss the cat overboard, Captain Peterson refused and shared his cabin with it. At dawn during the skipper's watch the cat followed him to the deck and sprang to the riging. clawing its way upward to the empty crow's nest where a lookout had not yet been stationed.

The captain climbed the ratlines to its rescue and from the high place saw a large area of the sea broken by baby mackerel trying to escape the attack of a school of bluefish.

Dories were lowered quickly, encircling the entire school with seine, and three hours later the Clifton sailed into Cold Spring Harbor, the deck waist deep in bluefish. Captain Peterson was at the wheel, a black cat perched on his shoulder.






