Marfa 27, Sanderson 6.

Altho the score was one sided
it doesn't mean that Sanderson
doesn't have a strong team. San-
derson received at the beginning
of the game and with straight
football carried the ball down
the field within striking distance
of the goal. They couldn't punt
on fourth down on account of
being too close to the goal, and
the ball went to Marfa on their
own ten yard line after fourth
down.

After Marfa made two fail-
ures at the line they punted to
Sanderson's 45 yard line and
Sanderson returned 15 yards.
Then with straight football San-
derson marched down the field
for the first counter of the game.
Laughlin kicked goal but Milam
was off side. Sanderson put up
a strong fight in the first half.
Their defense was too strong for
the Marfa eleven. But the sec-
ond half proved fatal to the local
squad.

First Quarter.

Marfa kicked off to Sanderson's
10 yard line, and Sanderson
returned 10 yards. Milam
made three yards at line. How-
ard no gain at center. Bradley
lost one at center. Ogle goes
over tackle for 11 yards and first
down. Sanderson fails to gain
and Bradley punts 30 and out.

Marfa no gain at line. On
second down Marfa made six at
line. Marfa made three over
tackle. Marfa loses ball when
Yeates covers ball on Marfa's
15 yard line. Bradley passes to
Laughlin but on gain. Another
pass fails to gain. Milam goes
over line for 10 yards and first
down. Bradley passes to Laugh-
lin for six yards. Pass to Yeates
is grounded. Bradley goes
around end for five yards and a
touchdown. Laughlin drop kicked
for extra point but Milam was
off side. Laughlin kicked off for
Sanderson and Marfa returned
20 yards. Marfa went out of
bounds with no gain. Marfa
gets five yard penalty. Marfa
hits line again but failed to gain,
but passed for 12 yards on third
down. Marfa made 10 at center
but failed at center on second
down. Yeates throws Marfa for
10 yard loss.

Quarter ends with ball on San-
derson's 10 yard line. Sanderson
6, Marfa 0.

Second Quarter.

Marfa with ball on Sanderson
10 yard line, and for three
downs made only three yards at
line. Marfa loses 15 yards on
fumble and Sanderson covers
ball. Ogle loses seven at end.
Pass to Yeates nets three yards.
Ogle punts 30 yards and Marfa
is downed in their tracks. Marfa
makes one yard on two downs.
On third down Marfa passed but
failed to gain as Bradley was
awake. Marfa goes around end
for 25 yards. Marfa made one
at line, and four at line which is
a touchdown. Try for extra
point fails. Marfa kicked off and
Sanderson returned 20 yards.
Sanderson hits line twice but
fail to gain. Bradley passes to
Ogle for 33 yard gain. Ogle lost
five. Marfa gains ball on San-
derson pass. Marfa around end
for 12 yards. Six off tackle.
Yeates throws Marfa for three
yard loss. Marfa makes two at
center. Marfa punts 20 yards.
Sanderson no return. Bradley
passes to Milam for eight yards.
Half ends, Sanderson 6, Marfa
6.

Second Half.

Marfa kicked to Sanderson's
15 yard line. Milam made three
yards at line. Ogle loses one
at center. Bradley makes three
at end. Ogle punts 20 and out.
Marfa gets ball on 36 yard line.
Marfa 12 at center. Marfa
passes for 12. Marfa hits tackle
but fail. Marfa four at center.
Yeates throws Marfa for three
yard loss. Marfa made two at
tackle. Then three more at end
and touchdown. Pass makes
extra point. Marfa kicks to
Sanderson and Schupbach re-
turned to 35 yard line. Pass to
Laughlin is grounded. Milam
made three at line. Sanderson
gets five yard penalty. Bradley
punts 41 yards and Marfa is
downed in their tracks. Marfa
two at line. Marfa four at end
and out. Marfa six at end.
Marfa fumbled but recovered.
Marfa 17 at end. Schupbach
throws Marfa for nine yard loss.
Pass fails. Henshaw throws
Marfa for three yard loss.
