TEACHERS END SAN ANTONIO SESSION

Possibly the most successful meeting ever held by the State Teachers' Association of Texas has just come to an end. The establishment of a state museum, the appointment, rather than the election, of a county school superintendent, and the re-instatement of warnings against alcohol and narcotics in State health books, were recommended in resolutions passed by the Association at the final meeting of its three-day golden anniversary in San Antonio.

Some of the greatest educators and speakers in the United States were guests of the Association where they addressed the teachers in the general sessions at the Municipal Auditorium. Among the most prominent ones appeared Dr. R. G. Reynolds of the Teachers' College of Columbia University, New York City, who delivered the last address of the program. Dr. Reynolds, who spoke on "The Place of Publicity in a Democratic System of Education," pointed out that schools are community projects and their success depends entirely upon community interest, which demands the stimulation that would be provided by publicity accorded to school affairs and school management and government.

The principal address at the Saturday night meeting was delivered by the well known Kansas man, William Allen White, editor of the Emporia Gazette, Emporia, Kan.

Other noted visitors were L. H. Dennis of Pittsburgh, assistant state superintendent of Pennsylvania, and Dr. William Bennett Bizzell, president of the University of Oklahoma.

Gov. Dan Moody honored the Texas teachers with his appearance on the program Friday morning.

In addition to the general assemblies, departmental meetings for every section of public instruction were held Friday and Saturday. Educational leaders from all parts of the State were in charge of these sections. These meetings were designed to provide group instruction and discussion of local school problems.

SCHOOL EXHIBIT FRIDAY NIGHT

With twelve weeks of school gone, the Sanderson public school system is putting on an all grade exhibit at the high school building Friday night in order to demonstrate to the parents the amount and quality of the work done by the students in less than one half of the school year. The faculty urges the school parents to attend the exhibit, which will make them acquainted with class room projects similar to those of the city schools, such as Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Austin, Waco, and El Paso.

Each grade will have its papers on exhibit. The various departments of public instruction will be represented by material characteristic of the subject matter. The aim of the exhibit is to give every pupil in school an opportunity to have his best work on show.

In addition to the usual school exhibitions, new features have been planned for the entertainment and educational improvement of the parent.

TERRELL COUNTY OIL NEWS.

(Special Correspondent.)

J. L. Keck, who is president of the company that is drilling a test well for oil and gas on section 6, certificate 190, Georgetown Railway Company survey, was in this city from the well a few days last week, looking after the interest of his company. It is reported that drilling is under way and that Mr. Keck has ordered 2,000 feet of twelve and a half and eight and a quarter inch casing. It is reported that Mr. Keck will run a test on this well as soon as casing is completed being put in the well.

George Hale, who is drilling a test well for oil and gas on section 78, block D 7, E. L. & R. R. Ry. Co. survey, for Mrs. Jessie McPhee, reported that progress was being made toward drilling.

Judge J. R. Keaton of Oklahoma City, Okla., was a visitor in this city a couple of days this week looking after his interest. Judge Keaton is the owner of three large oil and gas leases situated in this county. He holds leases on something like 35,000 acres of land. His lease are in a solid block. Judge Keaton's acreage is evidently in a very prominent location as the Phillips Petroleum Company, the Gibson Oil Corporation, The Devonian Oil Company, and the Kingwood Oil Company holds oil and gas leases on a considerable amount of acreage adjoining his leases on the north. The Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas Company, The Skelly Oil Company, The Independent Oil and Gas Company, The Phillips Petroleum Company, The Gibson Oil Corporation, The Sun Oil Company, The Magnolia Petroleum Company, The Big Bend Oil Corporation and also holds leases for oil and gas on the east. The Empire Gas & Fuel Company, The Humble Oil & Refining Company, the Superior Oil Corporation, and the Vacuum Oil Company holds leases on acreage to the west. The Gilcrease Oil Company, The Sun Oil Company, The Sinclair Oil & Gas Company and others holds leases on acreage to the south and southwest.

Judge Keaton acquired his leases in the early part of the play in Terrell County, and many geologists believe that his acreage stands a chance to be in line in a southwesterly direction with the famous Yates Pool which is situated about 25 miles northeast of the Keaton leases. The Yates Pool is situated in Pecos County, about 15 miles north of the Terrell County line. Terrell County was cut off of Pecos County in 1905. It is reported that a water well drilled in this county about 15 miles southwest of the Keaton leases contained several feet of Permian formation.

The Trees Oil Corporation, drilling on section 44, block 2, G. C. S. D. & R. G. N. G. Ry. Co. survey, E. T. Corder No. 1, are reported to be down to the depth of 2,250 feet.

Big Bend Oil Corporation's Bassett No. 1 is reported temporarily shut down. The deed records show that the Phillips Petroleum Company, the Gibson Oil Corporation, the Sun Oil Company, The Independent Oil and Gas Company and others have acquired spreads in this block.

The Milham Corporation's Bassett No. 1 is reported to be drilling. Exact depth not obtainable.

Wooley Jones well on section 43, block B 2, C. C. S. D. & R. G. N. G. Ry. Co., reported temporarily shut down.

Ryan & Breen's well on section 10, block 176, Tex. Mex. Ry. Co. survey, reported temporarily shut down.

It is reported that a rig has been hauled in on section 45, block G 15, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. survey in Brewster County about 25 miles west of the Terrell County line, and that this well is to be drilled by the Brewster County Oil Company, and is to be known as Fee number 1.

Several geologists have been doing plane table work on the Stansell ranch the past week.

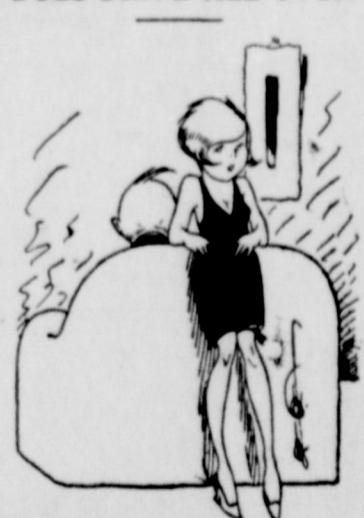

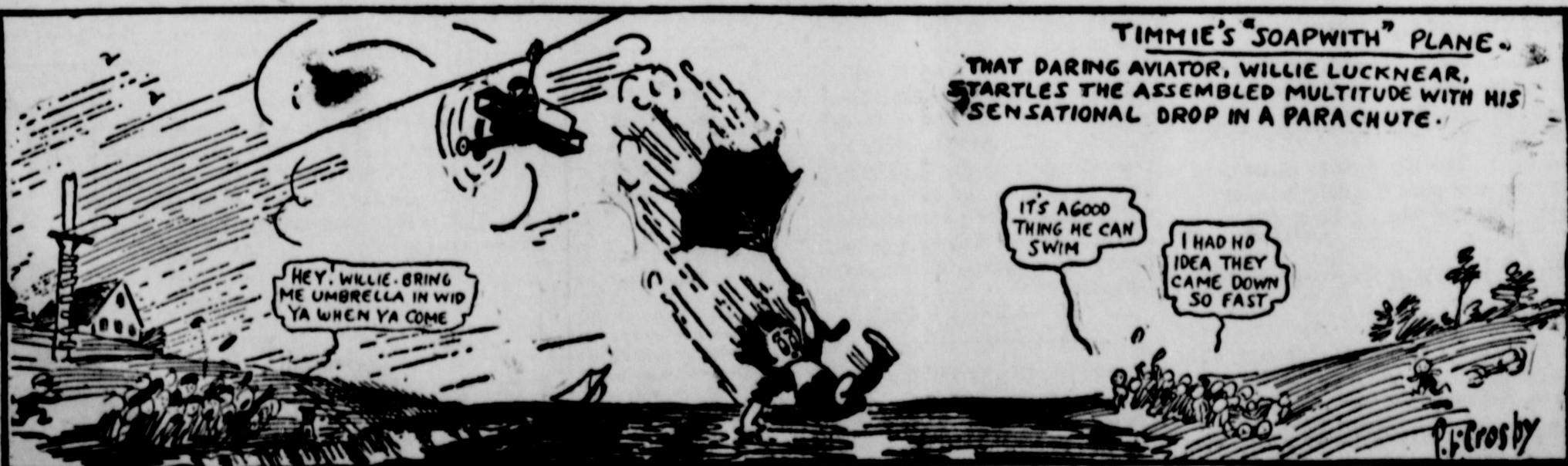

PREVENT HOLIDAY FIRES

How terrible it is to read newspaper accounts of fires at Christmas time. This is the happiest season of the year, especially for children, but fires often bring suffering and death, creating a roaring furnace of flames where but a short time before had been a joyous home.

Yet simple precautions will prevent holiday fires:

When using a candle in your window, be sure it is an electric one, properly wired, as they are generally safe.

If you have a Christmas tree, set it up securely so it cannot topple over. Don't place it near heating or lighting fixtures.

For trimming the tree use only noncombustible materials such as metal tinsel, and powdered mice for snow effect.

For illuminating the tree, never use lighted candles. Properly installed electric lights are safer and give a colorful effect, but safest of all is a colored spotlight focussed on the tree.

Again it is necessary to caution smokers to be careful with their matches and smoking materials near trees and decorations. Of course, keep matches out of the reach of small children.

SOUTHERN BAPTISTS PLAN TO RAISE \$2,600,000 AS CHRISTMAS OFFERING

Proceeds Will Be Applied Toward Liquidation of the Indebtedness of Home and Foreign Mission Boards and Other Institutions—Sacrificial Giving Is Sought

In probably the largest single extra Christmas cash offering that has ever been sought by any denomination in America, the Southern Baptist Convention is asking the churches affiliated with it to provide a cash thank offering at the approaching Christmas season of \$2,600,000. The proceeds will be applied toward the retirement of heavy debts upon the Home and Foreign Mission Boards and several other agencies of the Convention. Combined debts of approximately \$2,500,000 are now owed by the various Southern Baptist Convention boards and institutions, these debts having accumulated over a period of several years because the regular receipts from the churches have not been sufficient to maintain the work of the various institutions as expanded a few years ago when the churches were supporting missions and benevolences more generously than they are today. A portion of the total indebtedness is bonded.

Christmas gift are Dr. George W. Truett of Dallas, president of the Southern Baptist Convention, and members of the large Executive and Promotion Committees of that body.

Business Men Give Liberally
Indicating the manner in which the Baptist business men of the South are responding to the call for the Thank Offering, a layman in one state has agreed to add \$100,000 to the fund if the Baptists of the South generally respond to the effort, while another business man in another state has announced an unconditional gift of \$50,000. Under the leadership of Dr. J. T. Henderson of Knoxville, secretary of the Southern Baptist Brotherhood, an effort is being made to enlist all the large Baptist business men of the South in making big gifts to this effort. From this source several hundred thousand dollars is expected.

and does not have to be paid this year, but \$2,000,000 represents immediate demands upon the boards and institutions, hence the call of the Convention to the churches to provide this large cash sum through a sacrificial Christmas Thank Offering. Over against these debts, however, are combined assets of \$24,000,000.

In its appeal for the success of this cash offering, the Executive Committee of the Southern Convention is asking individual Baptists throughout the South to join in giving sacrificially to this purpose through the elimination of unnecessary giving to one another and making their Christmas gifts to Christ and his causes instead.
