Scientist Says Earth Is Made of Material That John's Mother Was Expelled From the Sun

By DR. H. S. WASHINGTON, Scientist.

NALYSIS of the sun's atmosphere by astronomers reveals that its chemical composition is just like that of our own earth. This is conclusive proof that our earth is composed of material that was originally expelled from the outer part of the sun. This belief is further strengthened by study of the chemical com-

position of meteors which strike the earth from time to time. They have the same composition, proving thereby that they too had their origin in tite or energy, you know that nine the sun just as did our own earth.

Study of the earth's composition reveals the fact that while there are 92 chemical elements in existence, 99 8-10 of the earth is composed of 12 elements. The other elements only make up two-tenths of one per cent of the earth.

Iron leads the list composing 40 per cent of the earth. Oxygen is next, forming 27 per cent. Silicon forms 12 per cent and nitrogen 8. The other important elements are calcium, aluminum, sulphur, nickel, sodium, phosphorus, potassium and hydrogen.

But while iron comprises 40 per cent of the earth there is no way for man to get at most of this iron.

Most of the iron is at the very center of the earth, forming a core about 4,000 miles in thickness.

There is next a transitional layer which is a mixture of heavy rock of the sort known as peridotite and iron. At the start it is mostly all iron and it finally gives way to a layer that is all peridotite. This layer | help his weak bowels. That was is thought to be composed chiefly of a kind of peridotite known as du-

The sort of meteors which fall to earth bear out this theory. They are of three general types. One is an all-iron type. The second is a mixture of iron and stone, the stone being largely peridotite. The third type is composed entirely of stone.

The theory of an iron-core earth is borne out by the fact that the measurement of the density of the earth shows that the earth is five and a half times as dense as water, whereas the crust of the earth is only about two and three-quarters as dense as water.

Model Child of Today Very Seldom Does Anything to Startle the World

By DR. JOHN J. B. MORGAN, Northwestern University.

Children who are models of obedience to discipline seldom do anything startling in the world, and those who rebel at restraint become material for future ultra-moderns, religious radicals, and criminals.

Frequently a mother becomes obsessed with the idea that she must do the best for her child without having a well defined purpose in her supervision. Doing her best easily becomes such close direction that all opportunity for spontaneity is denied. It leads to the treatment commonly called nagging.

Even more pernicious in its effect than nagging is the smothering of a child's individuality under the guise of affection. The parent who uses such tactics overburdens the child with an ever increasing load of obligations, because of the parent's self-sacrifice, and convinces himself that he is doing the best for his child.

True affection of a parent for his child, means not an increasing intimacy of the bonds which tie them together but a better understanding of the sort of child who is developing. Such an understanding involves some conception of where the child's life is pointing, an analysis of the things, that will be for the child's best interest and guidance only in so far as the child's own best interests are concerned.

When subject to too much parental love and influence, children may become mere echoes of those who have them in charge, or they may break through the restraint and become too independent.

Another group feels the restraint imposed upon them, attempt to get away, but can't quite make it. Those persons become neurotics, driven between conflicting impulses, to conform, on the one hand, and to be independent, on the other, but never having the stamina to do

Man Lost When Out of the Right Relationship to Almighty God

A man is "lost" when he is out of right relationship with God.

No chapter in the gospels throws more light on the character of Jesus than the fifteenth of Luke. It is the incidental rather than the purposeful that gives us our best basis for judgment of men.

Jesus knew the value of a sheep. If it were lost it was worth hunting for. When it was found there was rejoicing. A coin had value and there was joy when it was found. A man lost and then found must certainly be of greater significance. Jesus' estimate of a man's value determines his course in life. The Pharisees' estimate determined theirs and the chapter at the beginning sets forth the contrast, "The Son of Man came to seek and save the lost."

When is a man lost? We have a right to inquire. A man is lost when he is out of his right relationship with his Heavenly Father. In such a case the son cannot share in the family life of God, he is in a far country. When a child cares for some one else as much as it does for its father it is lost. The father has suffered life's greatest tragedy. When the prodigal said "I will arise and go by my father" he was found.

It was Jesus' business to set in motion influences which would restore right relations between the Father and His children. His method was through personal contacts. The disciple is not greater than his master. The church must go out and seek the lost.

TELEVOX MAKES LANDINGS SAFE

Mechanical Man Lights Airport at Call.

Newark, N. J .- Mr. Televox, the mechanical man, has come to the aid of aviators by making dangerous landings on unlighted flying fields unneces-

In obedience to the note of a stren on an approaching plane the mechanical man turned on the flood lights at the Newark airport without the aid of human hands.

Mr. Televox, whose name freely translated, from the Greek and Latin means "distant voice," demonstrated his ability as an airfield attendant when in repeated tests he flooded the new airport with 24,000,000 candle power in response to the distant voice of a plane high in the air.

Pete Branson, air mail pilot, approached the field from various directions and at different altitudes in the test, turning on a wind-driven siren as he neared. Each time the sound of the siren reached the field, the mechanical man flashed on the lights.

The device which gives Mr. Televox the similitude of human response to sound is the combination of two recent inventions, the Knowles gridglow and a vibrating reed selector. The vibrations set up in the reed selector when a sound of a certain pitch is impressed upon it are transmitted to the grid-glow, converted into electrical energy and amplified sufficiently to operate the switching mechanism of the flood lights,

Wooden Teeth in Skull

Are Puzzle for Museum Springfield, Mass .- A curious Indian skull has been placed on exhibition in the Museum of National History here which contains three wooden pegs in places where the natural teeth are

missing. The pegs are in the lower jaw and in the front in a conspicuous position. The fact they are carved to duplicate real teeth raised a question whether Indians who once lived in Florida were skilled sufficiently in dentistry to make false teeth of hard-

The skull and some additional bones were disinterred by Lawrence J. Sikes of Springfield in the Everglades.

The museum has consulted such authorities as Prof. Warren K. Moore, head of Phillips Andover academy and Prof. F. B. Loojis of Amherst, both noted for their investigations into American archaeology.

Both believe the wooden teeth were inserted in the skull after death when the skull might have been exhibited as a trophy of war.

Move to Save Home of Wilson's Boyhood

Columbia, S. C .- A state movement to establish a Woodrow Wilson me morial museum in the old-fashioned white frame house in which the wartime President spent his boyhood days is under way here.

The house was built in the early '70s by Dr. Joseph R. Wilson, father of Woodrow Wilson, who from 1870 to 1874 was a professor at the Columbla Theological seminary.

Going into private hands after a number of attempts to make it public property falled, the Wilson home was resold to make room for a proposed municipal auditorium. This development roused again attempts to save

HUMAN WEATHER VANE IS THIS MAN'S JOB

All He Does Is Tell Which Way Wind Blows.

Washington .- Of all the queer jobs in the world probably none is stranger than that of official weather vane, Imagine having a position at a fair salary with nothing to do but to tell in which direction the wind is blowing at the weather bureau of the United coming from!

The inquirers are not humorists, professional or otherwise, who have nothing else to do and want to stir up a little annoyance and excitement. They are people with serious interests in life. The maxim that it is an ill wind that blows nobody any good has in a measure been adopted by the human wind indicator at the nation's capital. It is his business to find out if any air disturbance, variously known as a zephyr, a gale or just plain wind, is going to work any one

Must Report on Wind.

Those especially interested in determining air currents have specific objects in view, such as to find out the prevailing direction of a wind in a certain locality in which a glue factory or a garbage disposal plant has been or will be established. Officials of a city government, the heads of a manufacturing plant, real estate dealers or mere householders may all be interested in determining the prevailing direction of winds in a given region. Of course, if it is a no-account, shifty, unstable wind, or one that is likely to blow from all quarters at once, why he is supposed to know that, too. Anything is welcome to the inquirer if it sheds light on the kind of wind he or she is interested in. This sought after information may persuade the writer to buy or not to buy property in a location that the winds adversely affect.

Get Many Queries.

"A steady stream of letters flows in to us from interested people seeking information on a wide variety of subjects," said a weather bureau official recently. "Immediately information may be wanted on the current or seasonal weather, or more particular facts concerning the climate or prevailing weather conditions of a particular locality.

"City governments and manufacturing plants often want to know the normal direction of the winds in a given region with reference to locating plants that give off undesirable odors in such a way that near-by dwellers will be least concerned.

"Statistics of wind force and direction assist also in the installation of water supply systems to be operated by windmills; in determining the origin of fires from flying sparks, or in avolding such fires by proper placing of chimneys; in ascertaining the pressure to which buildings will be sublected under stress of heavy storms and the surface movement of lake waters in connection with the disposal of city sewage. Sometimes this part of the bureau serves the useful purpose of warning would-be real estate purchasers of conditions they had not inquired into with enough diligence.

Grand Duke's Widow

Seeks to Sell Gems London.-The Daily Mail says that two famous jewels from the imperial Russian treasury are being offered for sale in London, but this time not by

the Bolsheviks. They are the property of the widow of Grand Duke Nicholas. The grand duchess is a sister of the queen of Italy, and it was from the Italian court the two gems were brought to England with a request to Commander Locker Lampson, M. P., a friend of the grand duke, to assist in their disposal.

The gems originally belonged to the Empress Catherine. One is a fifteen-carat rose diamond for which it is said the late Emperor Nicholas re fused an offer of £150,000. The other is a seventeen-carat emerald. The paper says the grand duchess wants between £50,000 (about \$250,000) and £60,000 (\$300,000) for the two.

New Source of Paper Discovered in Alaska

Washington.-Southeastern Alaska is regarded by government foresters as a permanent source of pulpwood for paper manufacture, with waterpower resources, tidewater transportation and a climate permitting a year-round operation of paper plants

and shipping. Pulpwood production is estimated at 1,500,000 cords yearly, enough for 1,-000,000 tons of newsprint annually in perpetuity, or more than a quarter the present American consumption.

HUDSPETH DISCUSSES PENSION BILL

Congressman Hudspeth had a personal interview with Secretary of the Interior West this morning relative to securing the frontier during the time that Texas was out of the Union from 1861 to 1865.

Congressman Hudspeth introuced a bill which went before he Pension Committee to permit a status of this character, at the last session, and appeared before the committee in advocacy of this bill, and had a number of other congressmen from Texas also appear. But it seems that the committee passed the matter up to the Pension Com-

The Pension Commissioner rote the Congressman recently tating that the matter had been laced before the Secretary of he Interior for a decision and ndicated that it was a matter hat could be decided by him favorable to these old Texas

After going into the matter fully with the Secretary of the Interior this morning Congressman Hudspeth is very hopeful that the Secretary will decide that, notwithstanding the State was out of the Union and that heretofore those splendid men have not been permitted a pension, they can be placed on the rolls and given a pension

Secretary West stated to Congressman Hudspeth he was very much in sympathy with the matter and would discuss it fully with Pension Commissioner Scott and hoped to be able to arrive at a favorable decision relative to the contention by the Congressman, in his half hour's interview with the Secretary this morning.

The Secretary of the Interior agreed with the contention made by Congressman Hudspeth that several hundred of these old men, who are in straightened circumstances, many of them living in the Congressman's district, and others scattered over Western Texas in other districts, in the event the matter were decided favorably, would be placed on the pension rolls and given and adequate pension.


