CUT ON EYE CAUSES DEATH OF LITTLE GIRL

A few days ago little Betty Lou Warden, the four year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Warden, fell on a piece of glass and cut a place over one of her eyes. The hurt was not thought serious at the time and Mr. Warden went out on his usual run as brakeman for the T. & N. O. Railway, on the west end. In the meantime, however, Mrs. Warden decided to take the little girl to Hondo where Mrs. Warden's parents, Dr. and Mrs. E. R. Bradley, reside. So she took the two little girls and drove through in a Ford coupe. Betty Lou died suddenly Saturday afternoon after reaching Hondo.

Mr. Warden received a message at Valentine announcing the death of his little daughter and he immediately left for Hondo on No. 104.

Burial took place at Hondo, the Rev. Williamson of the Methodist Church conducting the services.

The little girl is survived by her parents and sister, Jean. The friends of the family here extend heartfelt sympathy to them in their hour of bereavement.

Neglectful Parents Are Held Responsible for Prevalence of Crime

By REV. HENRY MCKENZIE, St. Louis.

THE public-spirited citizens ought to rise in righteous indignation, and create a public opinion that would lash and punish the neglectful parents. This menace of adolescent crime is a curse, a plague, a disease. We organize commissions, committees, we continue with our sermons, lectures and addresses, but the constant stream fluctuates very little, if any. We inspect boilers, elevators, fire escapes, and the like, but how insignificant are these things compared to the home. Destroy the home and you destroy all principles, systems, philosophies and civilization itself, but we do not inspect the home nor the child's welfare. When I say that crime last year cost our government \$10,000,000,000, or more than three times our national budget, I am getting at the economic waste, but we are not concerned with the physical aspect, save as it mentally, socially and spiritually influences. The home is a miniature state. The father is the president, the mother the vice president. As goes the home, so goes the city, the state, the nation.

The average conversation in the home reminds one of the "barber shop talk" of a few years ago. The idea is a "movie" star, the hero is a prize fighter, the church is the radio, the school is the theater or amusement center, the attitude toward the child, if it is 100 per cent American, we think, is to pet, coddle, indulge and spoil beyond all reason or excuse.

If you would stop the crime wave, begin in your own home or death and destruction will follow. How can we expect an ideal home after a quick love affair, a hasty experimental marriage built on license which quickly ends in separation and divorce? There are 100,000 divorces granted annually in the United States, or one in seven marriages. We have thirty times more divorces than Great Britain on the percentage basis. Go over the family records of the children brought into the juvenile court and you will discover that over 80 per cent of these little ones come from homes where there is separation or divorce.

Declares That Infant Mortality Rate Is Shame of the United States

Minor ills of children may lead to physical breakdown or death, and minor insults, offered and unwittingly off-repeated by parents or teachers, may lead later to mental breakdown.

Do you recall medicine as it was thirty years ago in the hey-day of saddle-bags, calomel and quinine? Then we counted it a summer lost if there were no epidemic of typhoid. It was the day when every parent expected every child to have measles, mumps, whooping cough and diphtheria, just in the natural order of things. And generally they were not a bit selfish about it. If one child had a contagious disease, as a rule the whole community enjoyed it together.

Now we know that it is not necessary to have these simpler diseases. Even if a child contracts one, the chances are great that he will recover. But they still play a grisly part in the health of those children in later life.

The first of the three great causes of death is heart disease, with 125,000 deaths annually in those sections of the country where there is registration. Nearly all of those between the ages of forty-five and fifty, not caused by excesses, are the results of a heritage from youthful days—diphtheria, pneumonia and flu. There is the danger of acute attacks of cold in the child.

Second is pneumonia, with 115,000 annual deaths registered, and the third is tuberculosis. This is gradually on the decrease, and, like the other two, can best be cut down by scrupulous protection of children. It is a young people's disease, with the dangerous age from fourteen to twenty-one. A Viennese physician examined 100,000 children of fourteen and found traces of it in 80,000. The only hope is to begin with the diet and health habits of the child.

Will Work in Congress for the Rights of Women as American Citizens

By REPRESENTATIVE PEARL OLDFIELD, Arkansas.

Broad-minded people of today think in terms of citizen, not sex. Am I going to work for women's rights in congress? As citizens, yes; as women, no. I shall advance no strange or essentially feminine ideas, as I entertain none. I believe that a government which is properly administered for our men—our sons, our fathers and our husbands—is equally safe and sound for our women.

War? I am, of course, opposed to war and believe that we should exert every possible means toward honorably averting it. But I do not believe that we should abandon the primary principle of preparedness. I am heartily in favor of any legislation which would assure peace, but I do not wish to sacrifice the nation's safety for sentimentality, and think that under present conditions we need adequate naval and military defense.

A woman's first duty and greatest service to her country is to make a home. If it is a question of choosing between a political career and that of a wife and mother, a woman's duty and also her greatest joy, should be to choose the latter. But when the two do not conflict, I think women can be as valuable as men in the service of their government or in other business or professional fields.

Colleges Should Find Way to Take Care of All Students Who Would Enter

As a result of the great increase in wealth since the World war the country is now in better condition than ever to make investments in education. Since the war the millionaire estates have increased by more than 600 per cent. Only last year there was an increase of 1,500 millionaires in this country. Americans scrap more automobiles every year than the rest of the world owns, and the value of those automobiles is greater than the cost of secondary and elementary education.

As a result of the propaganda in favor of education in recent years the colleges now find themselves swamped with applicants, and the cry goes up to bar them out, raise the entrance requirements yet higher, weed them out through the selective process.

That is the wrong attitude for the colleges to take. They have created the congested situation in which they now profess to find themselves, and it is up to them to find ways to take care of all students and to keep them until the students have shown conclusively that they cannot profit by a college education.

ENGLISH ROBOTS TO ACT AS INFORMANTS

Will Be Placed in Stations and on Corners.

London.—Although England's first Robot was created only a few short months ago, he already has six brothers ranging in height from Jasper's six feet six, to little Rupert's five feet ten.

Despite their tender ages the services of all seven have been hired out under the contract-labor system during the schoolboy's exhibition at Horticultural hall, and soon after the exhibition closes the Robot family will be broken up and the brothers sent out to different railway stations and street corners to take 24-hour-a-day jobs answering questions and giving directions. A pathetic fate for such youngsters, that would seem to call for intervention on the part of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children!

Where Can I Eat?

How these dully gleaming giants of steel work has now been revealed for the first time in connection with the schoolboy's exhibit, where Rupert, a bright little fellow, is to be seen with his chest and head cut open and all his insides revealed. Young John Bull, Jr., presses a button on Rupert's tummy. Almost instantly lights stare from under Rupert's heavy eyebrows and a voice incredibly deep for such a youngster booms out: "What do you want to know?"

Young John, startled, stutters: "Please, where can I get a bite to eat?"

"Take the third aisle on your left and walk straight on," booms the voice. Then the lights die out and Rupert is once again a senseless structure of cold steel.

Bewildered, young John follows the directions, and sure enough, walks straight into a restaurant.

Now what has happened is this: When the youth pushed the button on Rupert's tummy a light shined on a switchboard in front of a man at a table in a control room.

May Soon Be Common.

He immediately "plugged in" on Rupert, lighting up Rupert's eyes and establishing a telephonic contact with a microphone hidden behind a silver gauze-covered hole in Rupert's front. Thus the man at the control station heard young John's question and he promptly answered back by telephone, his words being amplified by a loud speaker in Rupert's chest.

If the question asked is a "sticker," the man at the control station, and through him, Rupert says: "Wait a minute," and the right answer is looked up in handy reference books. One man in the central office, it is declared, will in this way be able to handle the questions asked of, say, a dozen or more Robots installed in a railway station, big shops, hotels, or even on street corners, and it is predicted that within the next few years these grim formidable Robot servants will be commonplace sights in all large cities.

Mexico Creates Zones for Indian Education

Mexico City.—An experimental zone, in which new policies of the department of public education will be tried out, has been established by the Mexican government in the states of Hidalgo and Tlaxcala. These sites were picked because of the large Indian population in their proximity. It was explained. The department is increasing its efforts to educate the Indians of the republic. Special schools in which new methods of teaching will be employed are being built in this zone. Cultural missions will also work there.

The establishment of this zone was decided upon at the suggestion of Moises Saenz, sub-secretary of the department. Senior Saenz has made an extensive study of methods for instructing the Indians.

Phillman, Wash.—Heavy aluminum cooking utensils are shown to be no more efficient than less expensive lighter weight kettles, as the result of careful experiments by Catherine Landreth of Dunedin, New Zealand, research specialist in home economics now working at the University of Washington.

Miss Landreth has just embarked on a three to five year project to improve cooking methods for the housewife. She plans to investigate the practicality of the new method of electric cooking in which the current passes directly through the food and to establish definite standards for vegetable cooking.

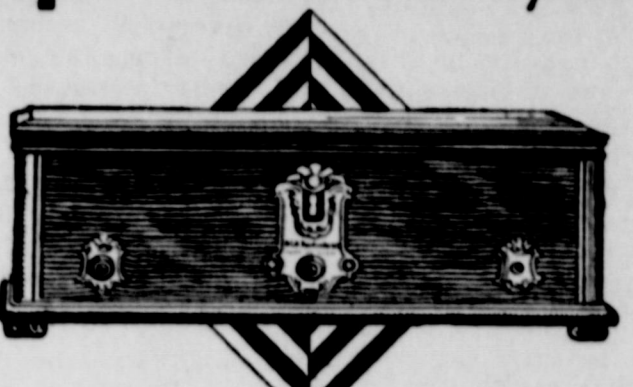
Flees From Angry Wife Into Wild Beast's Cage

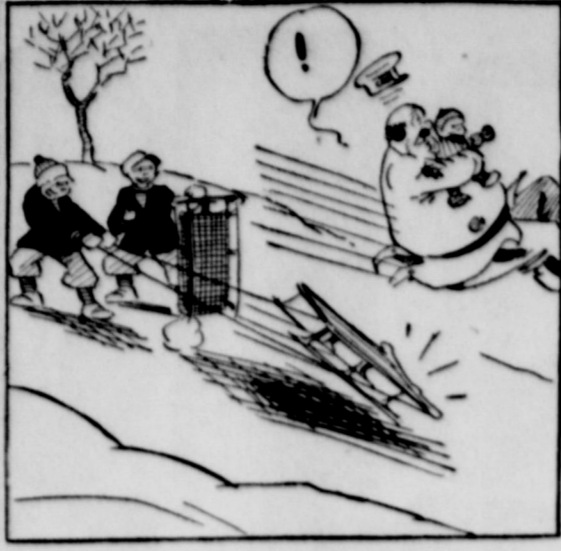

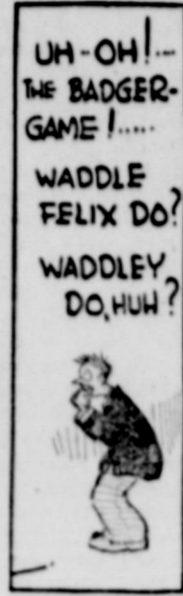

BIRTH AND DEATH REGISTRATION URGED
Austin, Texas.—The United States Census and Children's Bureau are co-operating with the State Department of Health in a drive to better birth and death registration in Texas. Great strides have been made along this line during the past six months. There has been a large increase in the number of births and deaths registered, but the State is still below the required standard of 90 per cent. Through the courtesy of L. M. N. Marrs, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, a canvass is being made throughout the State of all children under one year of age, in connection with the scholastic census. These will be checked against the birth records for each community, and in that way the unregistered births will be located, as well as the names of the doctors and midwives who are not filing their certificates. It is felt that if the parents realized the importance of a birth certificate to their children, they would insist that the doctor or midwife in attendance promptly file one. Among the many uses of a birth certificate as a record are: Proof of parentage, age (for school attendance and child labor laws), legal proof for World War veterans who have claims before the Veteran's Bureau, and proof of citizenship. A concerted drive is also being made through the retail casket dealers in an effort to build up the death registration to the required standard. Too long Texas has had no reliable health statistics; lack of which has greatly handicapped the health officers of this State, and has caused business men outside of the State to become somewhat reluctant to invest money in a state where the healthfulness is in doubt. Texas is one of four states that does not have adequate registration. The other states are New Mexico, Nevada and South Dakota. Substantially the same law and system that is in force in Texas is successfully working in 44 other states, and no doubt will work in Texas if the public will give this matter their whole-hearted co-operation. Parents are urged to call upon the local registrars in their community and ascertain if their children's births have been recorded. If not, to get in touch with the physician or midwife in attendance, and urge upon them the necessity of the promptly filing a birth certificate. Mrs. Lolette Robertson is the registrar for Terrell County.
