### BONE SURGERY.

Some weeks ago my young son suffered an accidental injury to his arm, resulting in several severe bone fractures. Yesterday I took him to a physician for a final X-Ray examination of the injured member. And the results were both gratifying and interesting.

The X-Ray picture clearly showed the marvelous skill and the fine technique employed by the world's greatest surgeon. Broken fragments of bone were reunited and the space separating the ends of a badly broken humerus had been carefully bridged with new bone tissue, while a new marrow-tube was constructed for the new bone formation. This delicate and successful bit of bone surgery was performed by none other than the great specialist—Dr. Nature.

What a debt we all owe to this famous physician and surgeon! He is ever at the beck and call of mankind for the practice of the healing art. And with all honor to the advance of the medical art along scientific lines, in the treatment of human ills Dr. Nature is still our last resort. At best, Dr. Man is but an assistant, an understudy, an interne in Dr. Nature's great clinic.

Whether it be in the treatment of a sore throat or a broken arm, Dr. Nature's services are indispensable. No sick room, no operating room, no hospital can get along without his presence. He is the final consultant and prescriber in every case of illness or accident, and without his

aid every physician and surgeon is utterly helpless.

As it looks to me, Dr. Nature's ability is a mighty potent argument against a materialistic conception of the cosmos and of life. Surely Dr. Nature's skill is no accident. Is it not more reasonable to believe that he is a graduate of the University of God?

### SANDERSON SCHOOLS

Are you willing to do your part to make Sanderson schools the best? It is possible for Sanderson to give to each boy and girl a school system that will mean more to them in the future years than all the material wealth that could be given them. Before any community can have a school system that will function in the lives of the boys and girls there must be a citizenship in that community with a vision.

### H. B. SLOCUM KILLED

Stab Wounds Prove Fatal Following Fight on Highway.

H. B. Slocum, 43, well known railroad engineer, died last Saturday night at a hospital in El Paso after being taken there for treatment for knife wounds which he received following a fight on the highway.

Slocum and a friend, A. O. Hill, were out riding in the latter's car when they came up on some friends whose car was broken down. They offered to take Mrs. Shipp and Mrs. Lantrip, two women members who were in the broken down car owned by W. D. Thompson, son-in-law of Mrs. Shipp, to town. They had been driving only a few minutes when a car stopped ahead of them and a man jumped out and held up his hand. Slocum stopped and the man walked up and asked him why he was following them. Slocum replied that he had not been following them and laughed a little. The man replied, "Oh you think it is funny do you?" and struck at Slocum. Getting out of the car Slocum was again stabbed in two places.

Upon learning of Slocum's death Sunday two city firemen, L. H. Britton, 24, and R. J. Brooks, 34, gave themselves up to officers.

Mrs. Slocum had been here visiting and only left on the early train Sunday morning for El Paso, knew nothing of the trouble until she reached that city. It was only last week that Mr. Slocum was working out of here.

Funeral services were held for Mr. Slocum Tuesday afternoon. Besides his widow he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Angle Ord, Tyler, Miss.

### COX PROSPERS IN WEST TEXAS RANCH SECTION

C. F. Cox, well known ranchman from the Sanderson country, is in town today. He has many friends in the Queen City of the Rio Grande and comes down occasionally to see them. Mr. Cox as a rule objects to having his name in the paper, but we have promised not to tell any fact that will count against him.

We asked him if his country was any account, and he looked like he resented it but said that he wondered the same thing when he first saw it. "I bought some land at 30 cents an acre," he declared, "and after looking it over I thought I had been cheated. But now it is worth several dollars an acre. It has sold for \$5 an acre in that vicinity recently."

That is what the sheep and goat business has done for West Texas the past few years. Stock of this kind is being taken into that section on a large scale now, and it is past the experimental stage. The rough old hills of West Texas do more for a ranchman according to their promise, than any other part of the world. They have made our people prosperous.

### HJR No. 6 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that court.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to questions of law arising in the Courts of Civil Appeals under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as tend to such other questions as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated

by the Court.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court, for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

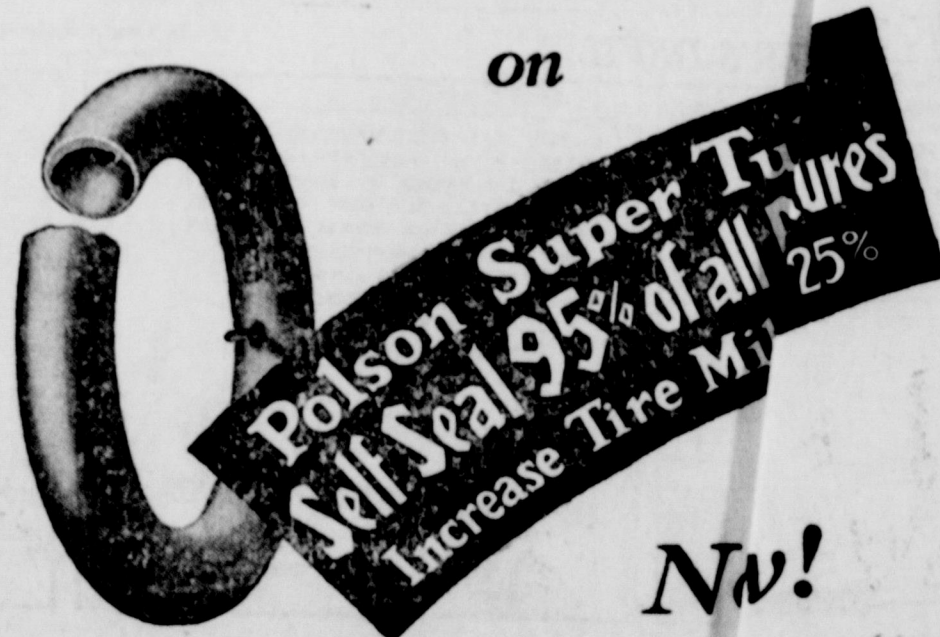

UNITED STATES NOW OWNS 9,000 ISLANDS

All Are Outside the Boundaries of States.

Washington.—Acceptance by congress of the Samoan Islands as part of the United States' territory definitely adds six more bits of land to the thousands of islands the nation now owns.

"The United States has acquired some 9,000 islands outside the boundaries of the 48 states," says a bulletin from the Washington, (D. C.) headquarters of the National Geographic society.

"This host of territorial islands is scattered from the South Pacific north across the Arctic circle. They sprinkle the seas of both hemispheres for a distance of 15,000 miles from St. John, in the Virgin Islands, to Balabac island, on the outskirts of the Philippines.

A "Milky Way" of islands. While 9,000 islands are few, perhaps, beside the island collections of Great Britain, Holland and France, yet American territorial islands decorate the oceans like star galaxies or ornament the heavens.

"The Philippines are the 'Milky Way' of the United States' island constellations. They alone comprise approximately eight thousand islands. Every one knows about Luzon, the monster Philippine island, as large as Ohio in area.

"Then there is the scarf of Aleutians swung across the blue sea void toward Asia. The United States coast and geodetic survey does not know for sure how many Aleutians there are, but it is endeavoring to find out by airplane surveys.

"How large is Hawaii? That all depends upon how the territory is measured. By square miles of land the Hawaiian Islands have an area equal to Connecticut and Rhode Island. By their spread over the Pacific ocean the islands occupy a region as long from east to west as the United States is wide.

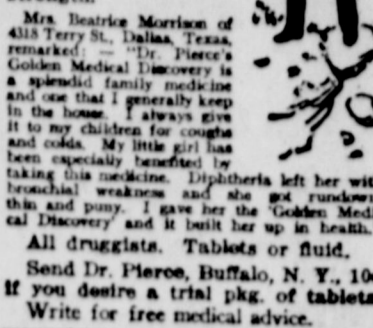

Seek Russian Colony in Wilds of Siberia

In an effort to find a lost colony in the wilderness of northern Siberia, which preserves the life and thought of the sixteenth century, a scientific expedition is about to leave Lenigrad.

Before the revolution a political exile, M. Zinzinoff, claimed to have penetrated the icebound fastness of the lost colony. He declared that the people spoke old Russian and were unaware of anything that had happened in the world since the sixteenth century.

Many Russians fled in the sixteenth century to the inaccessible parts of Siberia to escape political persecution. It is considered likely that the lost colony is formed by descendants of one of these groups of refugees.

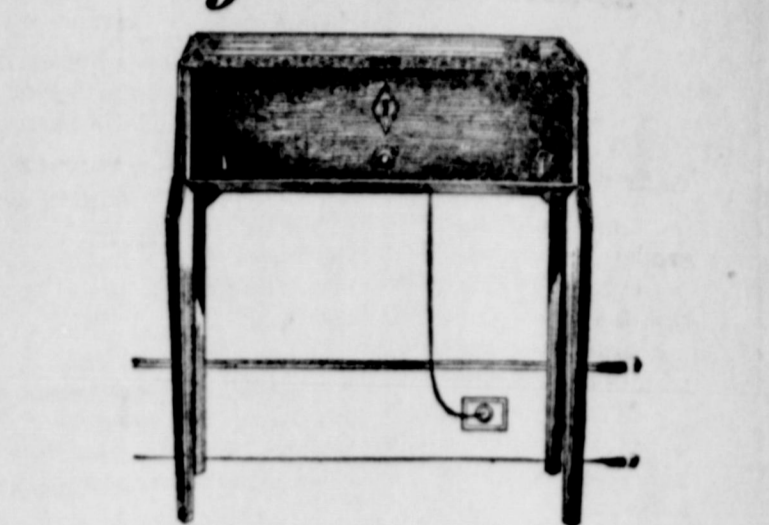

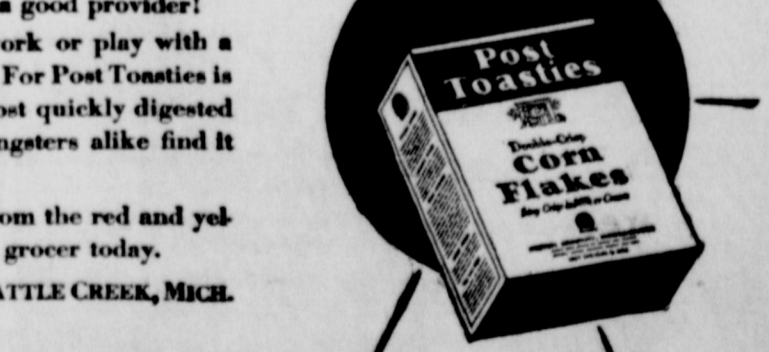

**HJR No. 7**

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution, and making appropriation of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution therefor.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**  
Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.
