Representatives from most areas over Parker County last Friday night attended an open meeting at Bovina and endorsed a program to construct a 140-mile network of paved roads in Parker County.

The meeting, announced in the Star last week, was attended by Dan Eldridge, W. L. Edelman and J. C. Wilkerson, as Friona representatives. The meeting was called by Commissioners of Parker County.

A second meeting has been called for Friday night, March 25, by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce. Farwell representatives refused to vote at the Bovina meeting, declaring that they would not back an issue on roads unless they knew the roads would run. The Farwell meeting, called chiefly for Precinct 3 but open to all interested, will be held in the courthouse at Farwell at 8:00 o'clock.

## Construction Of Elevator Begins

The contract has been let for the new elevator that is being built here by the Santa Fe Grain Company, and the work of excavation is already in progress.

The A. F. Roberts Construction Company of Sabathia, Kansas has the contract for the structure. They are the same people that are now building the new elevator for the Friona Wheat Growers.

This building will be entirely of concrete, with a capacity of 300,000 bushels of grain, and will increase the total storage capacity of the Santa Fe Grain to one half million bushels.

The building will be fully constructed, equipped and everything in readiness to receive grain by the time the first truck load of 1949 wheat rolls into Friona.

The new elevator is being erected just east of the older elevator of the company.

While the new elevator will be a complete unit in itself, with its own leg for moving grain or transportation, it will also be connected by tunnel with the other elevators and storage bins that constitute the company's present large grain handling plant.

## FRIONA WEATHER

The weather at Friona during the past week has been mostly mild and clear. There were two days when the wind hailed in from the north and was a little frigid, but no freezing and very little frost.

According to Coach Brantley, Friona will be well represented in all of the contests.

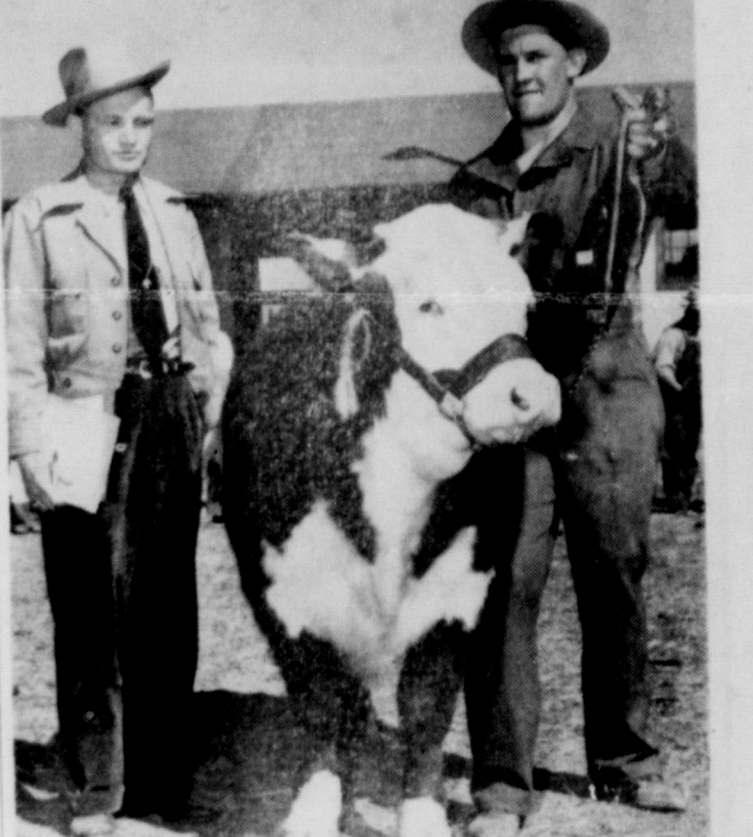
Winners of the District 11B meet will be entered in Regional meet, of which the plans are not complete.

## Friona Locker Company Takes First Place At State Convention

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Lamdrum, of the Friona Locker and Grocery Company, have been attending the convention of the Texas State Locker Association, which was held in San Antonio during the past week.

Speakers from the State and National Associations and some from the Department of Agriculture, lectured and conducted demonstrations on operating a successful locker plant, with special emphasis on the processing and methods of wrapping and storing frozen foods.

One of the main events of the convention, was a "Ham Contest," sponsored by the Association for the purpose of comparing quality and workmanship of the products entered.

There were approximately ninety-seven entries in the show from lockers throughout the state. The Friona Locker Company placed first with their eighteen-pound commercially cured ham. A commercial cure is one that is mild, and intended for hams that are to be kept under refrigeration. The most popular commercial ham is usually tender, and characterized by a deep, rich color.

They were to be successful, taking three weeks to a month, and the quality is done with a specially prepared history saw dust. Judges in this event were Dr. Dan E. Brady of the University of Missouri, and Mr. Ray Sordir of FFA College, Texas.

stressed the point that the quality of the finished product can be no better than the quality of the animal from which the meat is taken.

Lee Campbell and A. L. Talley, employees of the Friona Locker and Grocery Company, did all the work on the prize-winning ham; preparing it in the same careful manner, which is taken in the processing of each customer's meat.

## Large Concrete Mixer Near R. R. Tracks

No, it is not another town nor a highway building outfit, but it is a factory of no insignificant proportions. It is manufacturing the cement for the construction of the new concrete elevator that is now in process of construction as an addition to the Friona Wheat Growers' grain handling plant.

The temporary factory's plant is located beside the railroad, just east of the steel pens, where immense piles of sand and gravel have been deposited, and a large war-house is kept well filled with cement.

A large crane lifts large scoops full of sand, gravel and cement to the top of a high hopper, from which it passes into mixing machinery where water is added and the whole mass partially mixed and dumped into mixers of 2-yards capacity, that are stationed on trucks, where the mixing process is continued until the truck reaches the building site, nearly a half mile away.

By that time it is thoroughly mixed and ready to be dumped into the forms which are being erected as rapidly as they are filled.

Health Notes  
**AUSTIN, TEXAS** Contrary to the popular belief that pyorrhea is always incurable, this is only true in the most advanced cases, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. His advice to persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea is to seek an early diagnosis from their dentist so that proper treatment is still curable.

"Early detection and proper treatment for pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment. Since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of having pyorrhea," Dr. Cox said, "regular visits to the family dentist are extremely important in the control of this disease."

"The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of the main therapeutic features is the proper hygienic care of teeth and gums as outlined by a reputable dentist. Carelessness is usually the basic cause for the trouble."

The family dentist can usually remove the cause of the trouble, Dr. Cox said, and when this has been done, intelligent routine care of the mouth by the patient will help to effect a fairly quick cure in the majority of the early cases.

## AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SPEED OF TRAINS THROUGH THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, AND FIXING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any train to exceed a speed of forty (40) miles per hour in the corporate limits of the City of Friona.

SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful for any train picking up or dropping mail for Friona to exceed a speed of twenty-five (25) miles per hour in the corporate limits of the City of Friona.

SECTION 3. Any person, firm, corporation, or officer, agent, representative or employee of such corporation violating or permitting or causing to be violated any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten (\$10) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100) dollars.

SECTION 4. Each act violating the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately and be enforced upon its passage, approval and publication.

SECTION 7. The fact that a great deal of mail is being destroyed when being dropped from fast trains and the danger to traffic at the crossing at Main Street creates an emergency and a public necessity that the rule requiring an ordinance to be read at more than one meeting before passage, be, and the same is hereby suspended.

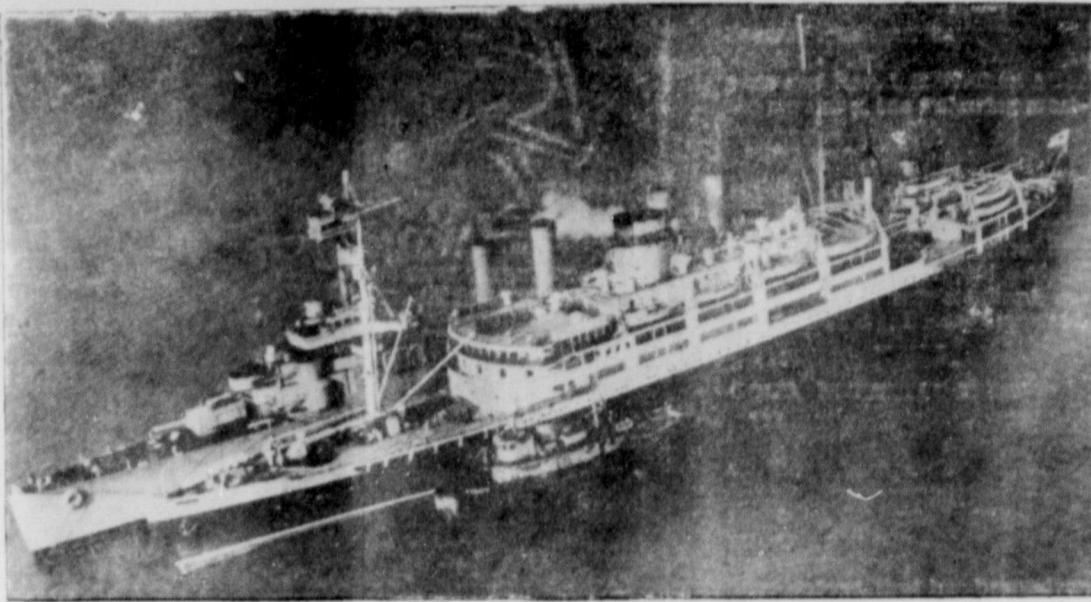

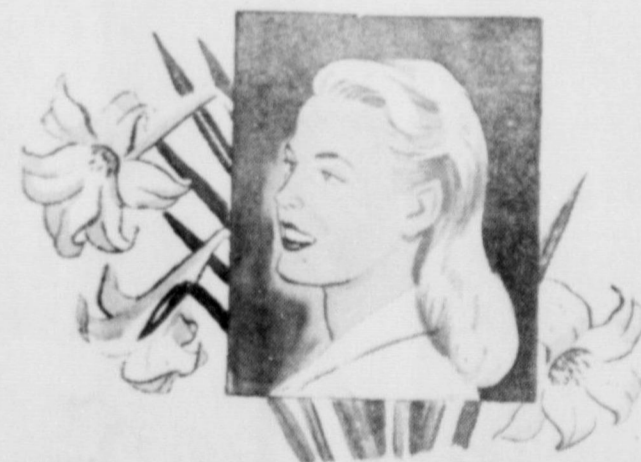
