(That patrons may have better opportunity of really knowing their school this column will each week be given over to school news. It is the desire of the school executives that the patrons become better acquainted with the faculty, school methods and school aims.)

Sunday's Dallas News states that the Texas State Teacher's Association expects to have a membership of 22,000 when the annual meeting is held in Dallas during the Thanksgiving recess. This expectation was expressed by Rush M. Caldwell of Dallas, president, on his return from a conference with other officials in Fort Worth.

The membership has increased by more than 800 during his year in office. Mr. Caldwell said and is more than 100 in excess of what it has ever been. Present membership exceeds 17,000.

All of the Sanderson teachers are members of the Texas State Teachers Association. Supt. B. J. Brannan, Mr. S. E. Nelson, principal, and Miss Gladine Bowers have completed their arrangements for attending the convention.

The program as outlined in the recent November issue of Texas Outlook affords the largest and most distinguished group of speakers that has ever attended a Texas State Teachers convention. Dr. Albert Edward Wiggam, editor of the American Magazine, Dr. M. S. Pittman, Director of Rural Education and Teacher Training of the Michigan State Normal, Prof. Robt. L. Lyman, University of Chicago, Miss Ruth Pyrtle, President of the National Education Association, are just a few of the cosmopolitan group who will address Texas teachers during the three convention days, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, November 28th to 30th inclusive.

That Sanderson parents are interested in their children was evidenced to a high degree last week by their attendance at the school program. The register showed 50 parents at Tuesday's program, 70 Wednesday, and 50 Thursday. A crowded auditorium saw the pageant, "Texas Under Six Flags," Friday night.

STUDY ENVIRONMENT OF U. S. CHILDREN

Nation-Wide Inquiry Is Sponsored by President.

Washington.—A nation-wide inquiry into the physical and social environment of the American child is moving forward. Permanent headquarters for a secretariat have been opened in the Interior department and 24 prominent educators, physicians, and sociologists have agreed to direct various phases of the investigation, which was sponsored by President Hoover.

Organization of the working force to place the American child under a microscope, determine his ills, and recommend means of curing them have been completed. The group of public men chosen to make the survey immediately will begin collecting data. Fully 18 months, they predict, will be so spent.

General Meeting to Be Held. With the study completed, a general conference of the committeemen will be called in Washington to consider conditions as they have found them and decide what may be done to improve them.

The investigation, announced by President Hoover at a White House conference some months ago, was made possible by a gift of \$500,000 by some of the President's friends. He declined to name them.

A complete picture of the American child and his environment will be painted by the investigators, who will turn the spotlight of science into the home and school in their search for facts. Public health organization, medical service for children, the family and parent education, vocational guidance, parental and maternal care—these are some of the subjects assigned to the study committee.

The Handicapped Child. The handicapped child, including both the physically and mentally abnormal, will be the subject of a particularly diligent study. Four committees will work in this field. One will survey state and local organizations for the handicapped, another the physically and mentally handicapped child, yet another the child who is socially hampered by dependency, and finally, another will seek data on delinquent children.

A committee of 25 persons, including Secretaries of Interior Wilbur and of Labor Davis, was designated by Mr. Hoover to supervise the investigation.

Negress Gives Up White Baby in Hospital Mixup

Havana, Cuba.—A kinky-haired baby that nearly wrecked one Cuban home and a fair-haired infant that was the pride and joy of a young negress who thought she was its mother finally were returned to their proper parents when a strange case was solved in City court.

Bernadina Vega, the negress, gave up the white child she had learned to love and look upon as her own, and accepted in its place a dark-skinned picaninny that nearly caused a divorce in the family of Caridad Perez.

Ten days ago Senora Perez called on the police to aid her in proving the child in her possession was that of a negress. Chief of Detectives Calvo started a search and found this white infant in the possession of Bernadina.

California Coeds Get 2:00 A. M. Curfew

Los Angeles.—Two o'clock in the morning has been set as the deadline for coeds at the University of California at Los Angeles to return from dates. This decision was reached at a women's council meeting headed by Mrs. Helen Matthews Laughlin, dean of women. The time limit for week night dates was set at twelve o'clock. Freshmen have been limited to two week-end dates only; sophomores have been limited to two week-end dates and one during mid-week, while upper classmen may use their discretion so long as they are in their rooms before the deadline. Special regulations governing houses where girls are staying were also discussed.

People So Law-Abiding Justice Is Idle 25 Years

Butler, Pa.—W. B. Higgins, justice of the peace in Oakland township for 25 years, probably has set a record. In all the time he has held the office he has not heard a case, civil or criminal, so law-abiding are the residents. If differences arise between neighbors, Justice Higgins either reconciles them or advises that they take the case to another court.

Seized Slot Machines Turned Into Birdhouses

Merrill, Wis.—With a hammer and a jackknife John Aho whittles away his time in the county jail here making birdhouses out of confiscated slot machines. After breaking them to pieces the sheriff turns the slot machines over to the ambitious prisoner, who already had made several birdhouses which have been lodged in trees in the jail yard.

Mystery in Diamonds

The bulk of fine diamonds is obtained from the hard bluish-green serpentine rock known as "blue ground" which is found in funnels or craters deep within the earth.

FIND OLD WALLS OF ROMAN TIMES

Rich Discovery Made by German Archeologists.

Berlin.—The foundation of a wall, consisting almost wholly of sculptured stones of the Imperial Roman period, is the astonishing spoil of the spades of German archeologists working in the neighborhood of the town of Alzey in the Rhine country. Seeking for traces of a medieval church, they came upon the remains of a much older building, about sixteen yards square, which dates back to the days when the legions still occupied the parts of Germany that bordered upon Gaul.

The construction of the foundation was of a most unusual type of masonry. The stones consisted largely of sculptured fragments of ancient pagan shrines and temples, including among others, nine altars, twenty-five pieces of pillars, four stones with inscriptions, six broken statues and reliefs, and six blocks with images of gods on all four sides. The structure suggests that it was the work of builders who not only disbelieved in the old gods but were actually hostile to them and wished to show their contempt for them; therefore possibly of early Christian date.

An examination of the sculptures and inscriptions shows that here, as elsewhere in southern Germany, the pre-Christian populace of mixed Germans, Romans and Gauls identified local gods with deities of the Roman pantheon. Apollo was linked with Grannus, a Celtic divinity, and the Roman Vulcan with the Celtic Cerunus.

Jupiter is shown with a nine-spoked wheel, and the wheel is not a Roman emblem, but a German, being a figure of the sun.

Monument to Motherhood to Be Raised by Vets

Kansas City, Kan.—A monument to the motherhood of America is to be erected on the grounds of the V. F. W. National home at Eaton Rapids, Mich., founded four years ago by the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, for the care and welfare of the widows and orphans of deceased veterans.

State commanders throughout the country will recommend one man from their respective states to act on a committee charged with the responsibility of gathering the necessary funds and erecting the memorial.

The movement, sponsored by a resolution adopted by the thirtieth national encampment of the V. F. W. held at St. Paul last August, contemplates the erection of "a utilitarian monument bearing the inscription 'To the Motherhood of America.'"

The contribution of American motherhood, manifesting itself in every human activity, affording stimulus and inspiration to the better causes of civilization, was cited by those supporting the plan as a "vital force in our American heritage."

The project also gives recognition to the "multiple and continuous sacrifices, both in times of war and in times of peace, on the part of the motherhood of America for the most part unhonored and unsung."

Dog Saves Cat's Life but Earns No Gratitude

Malone, N. Y.—Dogs are not commonly known to befriend cats, yet one instance of such anomaly was witnessed here.

The cat had been missing three days. Its mistress hunted vainly for her, notwithstanding felines are supposed to return of their own will. Finally a state trooper, apprised of the lost pet, observed a dog standing on a rock ledge barking vociferously at an island in Salmon river. Search of the island brought forth the cat, a bit haggard at having been marooned three days, but still able to "spit" at the dog which had unwittingly saved her life.

Missouri "Houn' Dogs" Increasing in Value

Springfield, Mo.—The houn' dog is not a thing of the past.

The major portion of coon and fox hounds in the United States are furnished by this section of the country. Each year, prior to the opening of the hunting season, buyers from all over the country come into the Ozarks to purchase hundreds of dogs.

And the value of the "old houn' dawg" has increased until a first-class one is now worth \$100.

Army Truck Operates With Wood for Fuel

San Francisco.—Using a sackful of broken tent poles for fuel, an army truck had demonstrated that it could pull a load of more than 38 tons.

Army officers watching the test of the invention of Col. Jean P. Lambert, former French army officer, were astounded by the performance.

The appliance invented by Colonel Lambert was placed in the truck in the place of the gasoline tank. After the container had been filled with wood a torch was applied, and a few minutes later when the truck had been cranked it chugged away with the load.

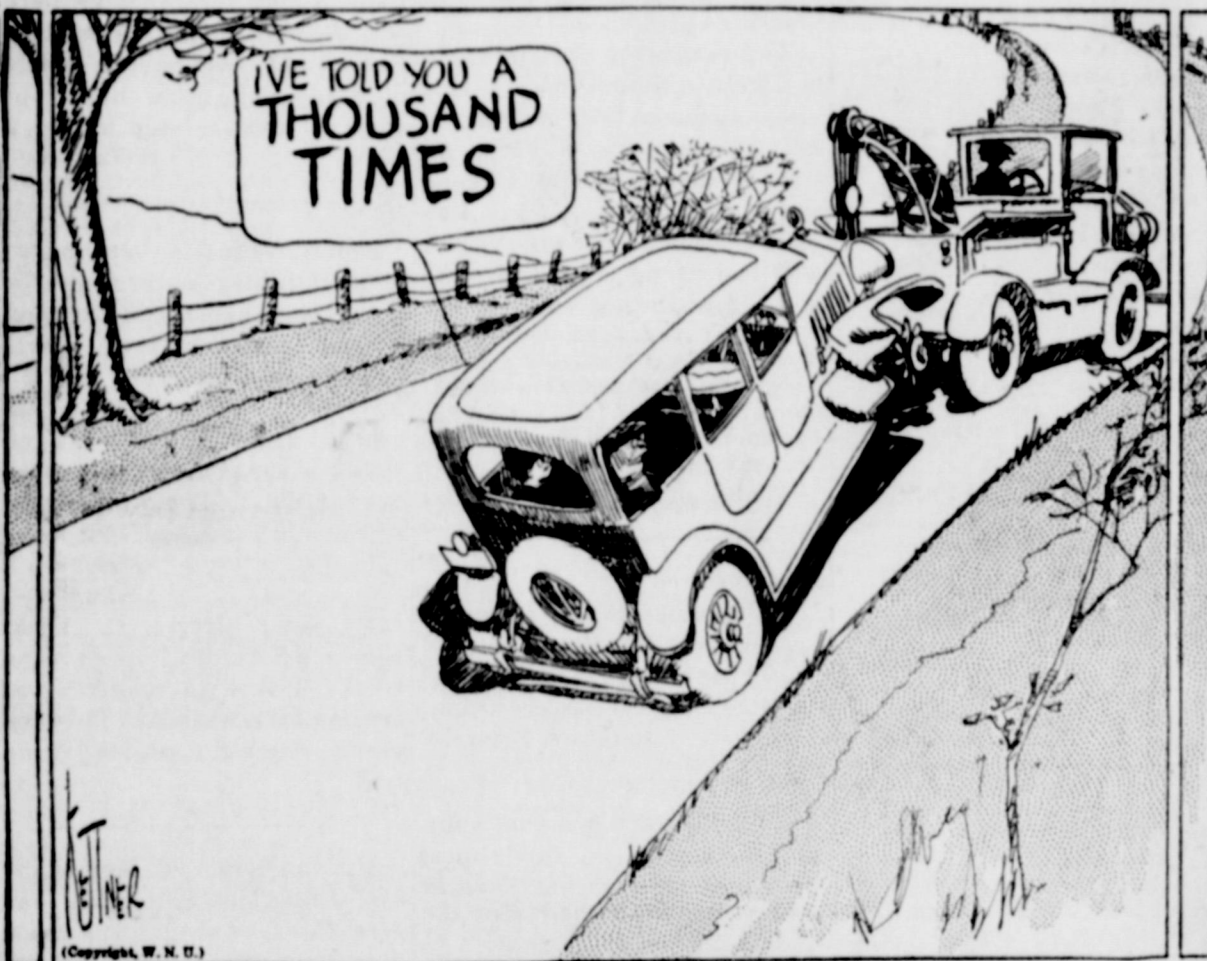

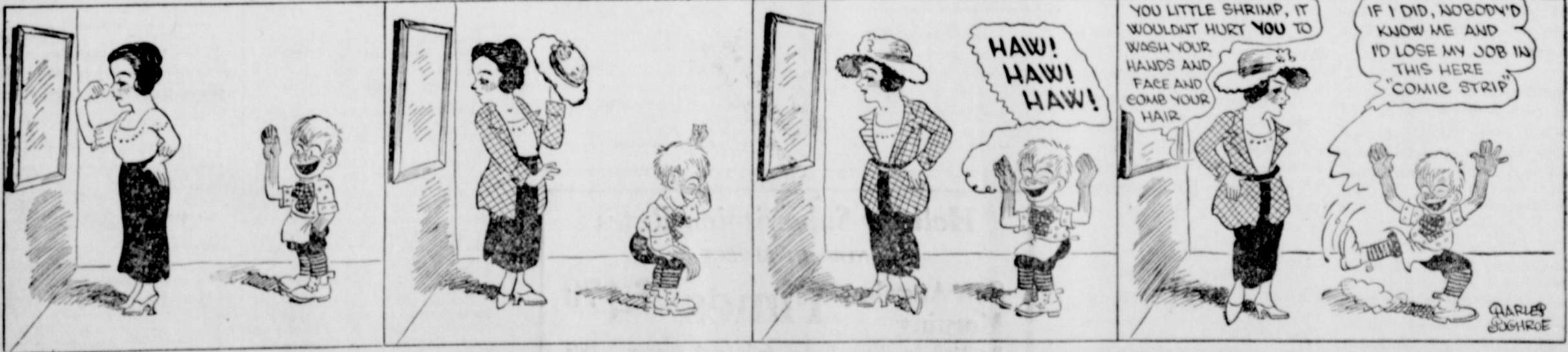

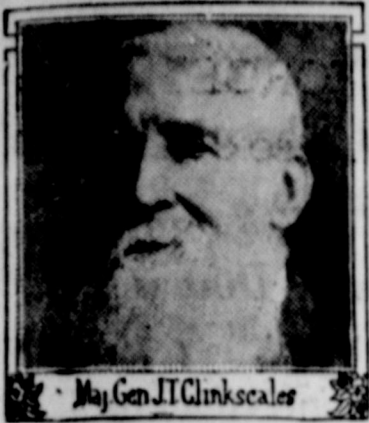

Lesson for November 24

THE HIGHER PATRIOTISM

LESSON TEXT—Jonah 1:1-3; 2:1-5; 3:1-11.
GOLDEN TEXT—And hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth.
PRIMARY TOPIC—God's Love for Everybody.
JUNIOR TOPIC—God's Love for Everybody.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—What is True Patriotism?
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Patriotism and Internationalism.

The lesson committee has rightly suggested the entire book of Jonah as the basis of our study. The topic selected by the committee may seem a little strained. It will hardly do to call the spirit which moved Jonah to preach to the Ninevites, patriotism; rather, we should recognize it as the passion of a missionary going forth with the message of God, calling upon men to repent and turn to Him. Patriotism means love for one's country while the spirit of the missionary is passionate love for lost men of all countries.

I. **Jonah's Call and Commission** (1:1, 2).
Jonah, a Jew, was called to go and preach repentance to a Gentile city. In a real sense, salvation is of the Jews. In the seed of Abraham all nations of the earth shall be blessed (Gen. 12:1, 2). The story of Jonah graphically portrays the history of Israel as a nation. God separated Israel to be the channel through which His mercy and salvation were to be carried to all the nations of the earth. They, like Jonah, have been recalcitrant to duty. Because of this God has caused them to be swallowed up by the nations, who will one day in the future spue them out upon dry ground, Palestine. After chastisement they, like Jonah, will discharge their obligation and nations will repent and turn to God.

II. **Jonah's Flight From Duty** (1:3).
He turned his back upon God and attempted to flee from His presence. He went in the opposite direction to which he was sent. He did not believe in foreign missions. In the same way, Israel has become an apostate people, and instead of a blessing has become a burden and curse to the nations.

III. **Jonah's Correction** (1:4-2:10).
1. Overtaken by a storm (1:5).
Trouble soon came upon the disobedient servant of God. So with the Jews, misfortune after misfortune, storm after storm have overtaken them because they turned from God. They are now tossed about by the nations. They, like Jonah, are asleep.
2. Cast overboard (1:15).
In their perplexity the sailors cast lots and the lot fell upon Jonah. According to his own direction they did this. God had prepared a great fish which swallowed Jonah.

3. Jonah's deliverance (ch. 2).
Jonah in his affliction turned to God and prayed (James 5:13).
God miraculously preserved him while in the belly of the fish. God has miraculously preserved Israel while in the heart of the nations. The fish could not digest Jonah, neither can the nations assimilate Israel. Jonah repented while in the fish. So Israel will repent as she goes into the great tribulation. God made the fish to vomit out Jonah. So He will at the proper time cause the nations to cast out Israel.

IV. **Jonah's Commission Renewed** (3:1-10).
Although Israel has been rebellious and failed in the execution of her commission, she will repent and go forward to fulfill her commission in preaching the gospel to the nations of the earth observe.
1. The field of his ministry (v. 3).
It was to be the great Gentile city Nineveh.
2. His message (v. 4).
He was instructed to "preach the preaching" which God had commissioned him to utter—Nineveh was to be overthrown within forty days.
3. Effect upon the people of Nineveh (v. 5-10).
They repented and sued for pardon. In the time to come the Gentile nations will repent of their sins when the gospel of the kingdom is preached unto them by the Jews.

V. **Jonah's Behavior** (4:1-11).
1. His displeasure (v. 1-3).
He now makes known the real reason for his flight from duty. He knew that the gracious God would spare the people who repented.
2. God reproves Jonah (v. 4-11).
By means of the gourd God shows him his error. The closing scene affords a striking example of the patience and pity of God in contrast with the hard-heartedness of man.

The DAIRY

VENTILATION FOR BARN ESSENTIAL

It Will Promote Health and Comfort of Dairy Animals.

Ventilation is necessary for the health and comfort of animals. It will preserve the building and contents from mold and rot, due to excessive moisture, and will aid in the prevention and control of disease.

There are barns today where the construction is such that there is ample movement of air through leaky walls, hay chutes, silo chutes, and stairways. Such buildings in extreme weather, however, become too cool for dairy cattle to give economical production.

For the best results we must admit fresh air, remove stale air, and control temperature and humidity. A system for ventilation consists of openings or inlets to admit air, openings or outlets to remove air, and some means of creating a movement of air.

The factors having the greatest effect on neutral ventilation are the heat, which is supplied by the animals in a building.

Since the heat to create an air movement through a barn must be furnished by the animals in the barn, it is evident that the kind and size of animals and the construction of the barn must be carefully considered. A cow or horse weighing 1,000 to 1,200 pounds will heat approximately 600 cubic feet space in a well built barn. Only such space as an animal can heat should be provided. For dairy barns the ceiling height should not be over six feet in the clear.

The King system of taking foul air out of the barn near the door and admitting fresh air near the ceiling has proved very satisfactory, and is the most widely used.

Definite rules for the King system of ventilation are:
1. The stable should be of tight, warm construction.
2. Allow 600 cubic feet of space for each 1,000 pound animal, or equivalent.
3. Intakes should be many and small.

4. Intakes should be located every 8 to 12 feet around the building.
5. Intakes enter at ceiling, open at outside about 4 feet lower.
6. Intakes should be insulated.
7. Out-takes few and large.
8. Out-takes draw from 15 inches above floor.

9. Out-takes equipped with heat door near ceiling.
10. Out-takes insulated, straight, high, and fitted at the top with a roof ventilator.
11. Allow one square foot of out-take fine for four 1,000 to 1,200 pound cows or horses, or equivalent in other live stock.

12. Total capacity of intakes should be equal to or slightly greater than out-takes.
13. Air can be drawn to the out-take a maximum of about 30 feet.
14. One roof ventilator for each 35 feet in length of a barn 36 feet to 40 feet wide.

Incompetent Feeder Can Reduce Milk Production

One member of a dairy herd improvement association was engaged in business that kept him away from home most of the time. He left his dairy herd in the hands of an incompetent feeder who dished up the feed with a scoop shovel and fed all the cows alike, regardless of production. Such feeding did not result in greater profits. In fact, that herd that year was carried at a loss.

The wise dairyman strives to build up a high producing dairy herd that will naturally bring an increased yield and increased net profits per cow when each cow is fed according to production. From such cows and from such herds only can the dairyman hope to get 100 per cent more milk from 50 per cent more feed.

Dairying Very Rich in Three Kinds of Gold

Dairying is rich in three kinds of gold—yellow, green, and white, and all three golds are as good as cash money.

The yellow dairy gold is the cream, ready to be sold for cash any day in the week. The green dairy gold is alfalfa and other legumes that feed the cows and build up the soil. And the white gold of dairying is the skim milk—not a by-product of no importance, but a golden stream of feed value for which no adequate substitute has ever been found.

Dairyman's Obligation

Theoretically, the dairyman's obligations of producing and delivering a clean, sweet milk end when the bottled product is set on the doorstep, but practically it does not end until that milk is consumed. It is imperative, therefore, that he deliver the milk at the doorstep at a temperature which will insure its keeping below the danger point—50 degrees Fahrenheit—even though it is left there half an hour. Thoughtlessness and carelessness in delivering cause complaints.
