Know Your School

(That patrons may have better opportunity of really knowing their school this column will each week be devoted to school news. It is the hope of the school executives that the patrons become better acquainted with the faculty, school methods and school aims.)

The 60th anniversary meeting of the National Education Association will be held in the world's largest auditorium or famous boardwalk at Atlantic City, February 22 to 27. The meeting of the Department of Superintendence was held in Cleveland last February.

Supt. B. J. Brannan is a member of the Department of Superintendence and will attend the Atlantic City convention. He will make the trip in the company of other Texas superintendents, who will leave Texas on a special train, stopping over places of importance on the turn trip.

The annual meeting of the Department of Superintendence, the largest educational organization of the world, calling together men and women from the Pacific to the Atlantic Coast. The general theme for the convention is "Education is Life". The subject will be developed from the standpoint: life is idealistic, education must aim high; life is friendly, education must be friendly; life is social, education must be social; life is progressive, education must adjust itself to new conditions; life is cooperative, education must itself cooperate.

Today ends the first week of the new semester, which means that the school child has traveled through his course. You, as a parent, should make yourself aware of the character of work done by your child the past 4½ months. Has he or she been successful? What are the handicaps to normal progress? Are they physical ones that need to be treated by a physician?

One of the easiest ways to give a child's chances to realize the initial endowments of his bright is to let him grow up in a negative atmosphere, telling that school will never increase his advantages, that the world is a huge giant ready to swing an avenging axe, and that no man cares for anybody but himself.

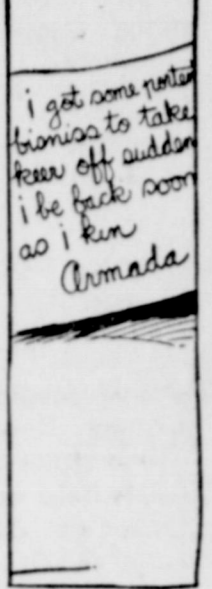

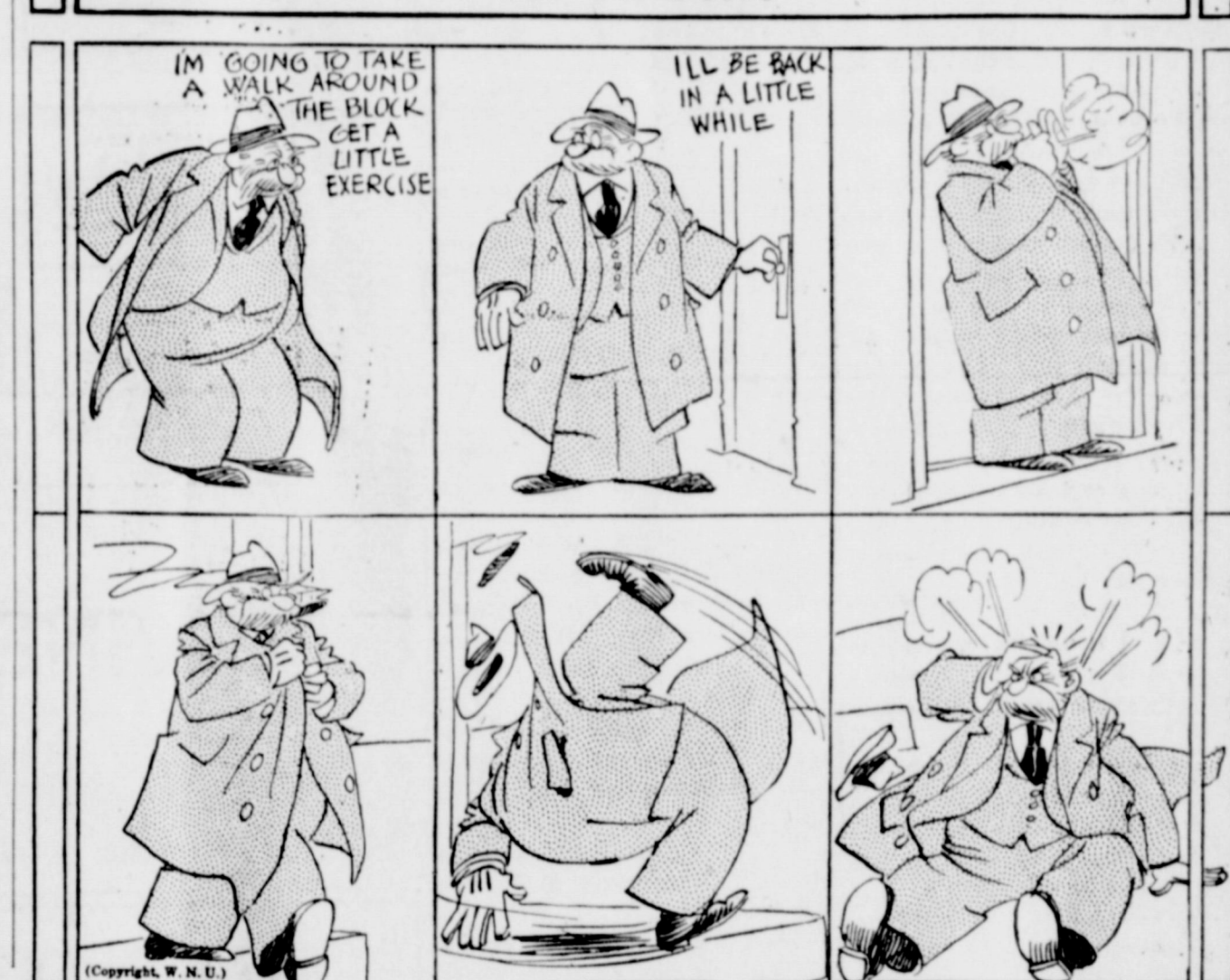

E. E. (Pat) Murphy, prominent attorney of San Angelo and former County Attorney of Tom Green county has formally announced his candidacy for Congress from the 16th district. He promises to wage an intensive campaign in every part of the district between now and the July primaries.

Mr. Murphy is a native of West Texas, a graduate of the San Angelo High School, he read law at night then attended Cumberland Law School in Tennessee, and was admitted to the bar of Texas in 1915. He finished his legal education in Washington, D. C., obtaining a LL.M. degree from National University and completed a 4 year course in the School of Government and Foreign Service of Georgetown University specializing in international Law, Tariffs, treaties, marketing and other economic studies. While there he familiarized himself with the various departments of the Federal Government.

During the war Mr. Murphy enlisted as a private and served throughout the war with the 36th Division, spending eleven months overseas and rising in rank to the grade of lieutenant. After the war he resumed the practice of law in San Angelo, was twice elected county attorney and also served as the first commander of the James J. Goodfellow Jr. Post of the American Legion.

Mr. Murphy is married and has one son. He is an active member of the First Christian Church. He will predicate his campaign upon his special knowledge of governmental affairs, as well as of the needs and desires of the people of West Texas.

WAGE FIGHT TO SAVE ANCIENT COURTHOUSE

Donors' Heirs Want St. Louis Landmark Left.

St. Louis, Mo.—Although St. Louis' stately old courthouse, where the only decision freeing a slave was ever returned, will soon be abandoned, it may still be retained as an historic landmark, even though it will be stripped of its official dignity.

The courthouse, which was once "the best in the west," has been replaced by another, a bigger and better one, and now official St. Louis is about to forget the old edifice.

The heirs of the donors of the site where the old courthouse stands, however, are not so forgetful, and, with an array of legal talent among them, they are preparing to recover the property which their ancestors once gave to the city.

Property Given in 1822.
The recovery of the property, though valued at more than \$1,000,000, is not for commercial possibilities. Instead the descendants of the once owners of the ground want to insure the old structure against the possibility of its being razed.

The site, which is to be the basis of the suit for the recovery of the property, was given to the city of St. Louis in 1822 by two leading citizens of that period, J. B. C. Lucas and Auguste Chouteau. In assigning the property to the city, they specified that it should always be used for the site of the County court.

Legal opinions advanced on the case differ. Some believe that the property can be recovered because it will not be used in the future. Others point out that it was given to the city for use as a county court—and St. Louis is no longer a county. They claim that the suit should have been instituted when the city and county were separated.

The Dred Scott Case.
This structure has housed the administrators of justice for over a hundred years, and decisions made within its walls have played an important part in the affairs of the city as well as the nation.

Its steps were once used as an auction block for slaves, and in one of its chambers the slave Dred Scott was adjudged a free man.

The Dred Scott case drew national attention, since it was a test of the claim of a negro that because his master had taken him to a territory where slavery was prohibited he was a free man and could not be inherited as a chattel upon his master's death.

An upheaval among the ranks of slave owners was felt when the court upheld the negro's contention, but the case was carried to the state Supreme court and the decision was reversed. The negro was then sold to a New Yorker from the steps of the court which had a short while before made him free. With his sale to an owner where he would have to be transported, Dred Scott took his case to the federal District court and then to the United States Supreme court in vain.

Accuses Daughter of Fraud in Mortgage Case

Boston.—A mother accuses her daughter of gross fraud in a bill in equity filed recently in the Middlesex Superior court at East Cambridge.

Mrs. Alice S. Parker of Everett, through her attorney, Jennie Lottman Barron, asserts in a bill of complaint that her daughter, Mrs. Fannie A. Moses, and the latter's husband, Samuel R. Moses, both of Everett, fraudulently obtained a discharge of a mortgage on land in Everett through deceit practiced on her, and asks the court to set the discharge aside.

The mother says that about September 24, 1925, her daughter obtained title to land at Kenwood road and Shute street in Everett, giving a promissory note. Mrs. Parker recites that on certain representations made to her a few months ago which constituted fraud, she executed a discharge of the mortgage she held. She further says no consideration was ever paid her for discharging the mortgage, and asks the court to enjoin her daughter and her daughter's husband from transferring the land. The case will come up for a hearing later.

Corpse Wished on Man by Snow-Bound Cortège

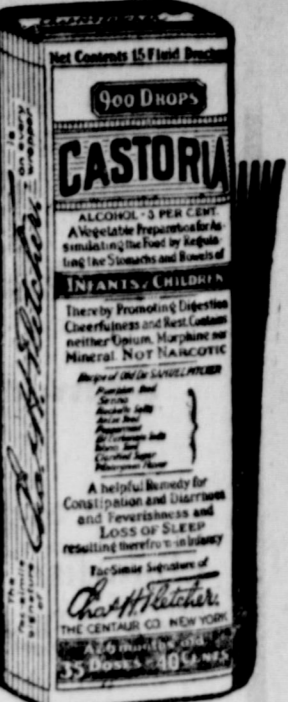

McPHEE WILDCAT IN TERRELL COUNTY REPORTS OIL TRACES

Mrs. J. B. McPhee of Los Angeles, Calif., was a visitor in the city Monday. In a conversation with the Times Editor Mrs. McPhee stated that prospects were good for oil in the well she is now drilling. She stated that they were still drilling and had never shut down as has been the report. Below our readers will find an article taken from the Val Verde County Herald of last week's issue, which facts Mrs. McPhee states are correct.

"The McPhee well located in Terrell County, on section 78, block 7-B, which has been shut down for the holidays, reports a very nice showing of both oil and gas, in the Permian or Upper Pennsylvanian.

It is reported the operators have muddled off the water, until casing and a larger rig can be obtained. The casing is now on the ground at the location and preparations are now being made to make a test. The log shows that they have had about 450 feet of shale, and the water is said to come from the 600 foot level, having been carried in the hole to present depth, which is around 820 to 840 feet, in order to keep the 12 1/2 inch hole as deep as possible.

In a conversation with Jack Well, the driller, the writer was

able to obtain most of the particulars. Mr. Well was for a number of years connected with sulphur interests of East Texas and Louisiana, and for the past 10 years has been drilling in part of the country and is thoroughly familiar with the conditions here.

Mrs. McPhee has also made arrangements for a production man and word has been received that he would be on the location this week. He has been in the oil game 30 years.

Mrs. McPhee is not a newcomer here, she has been living in this locality for the past 10 or 12 years, this being her test on this acreage. She is confident that there is oil in this locality. With the aid of her wells and the advice of her geologist, Mr. Bayer, located this well in the best possible, she seems to be on the rainbow's end."

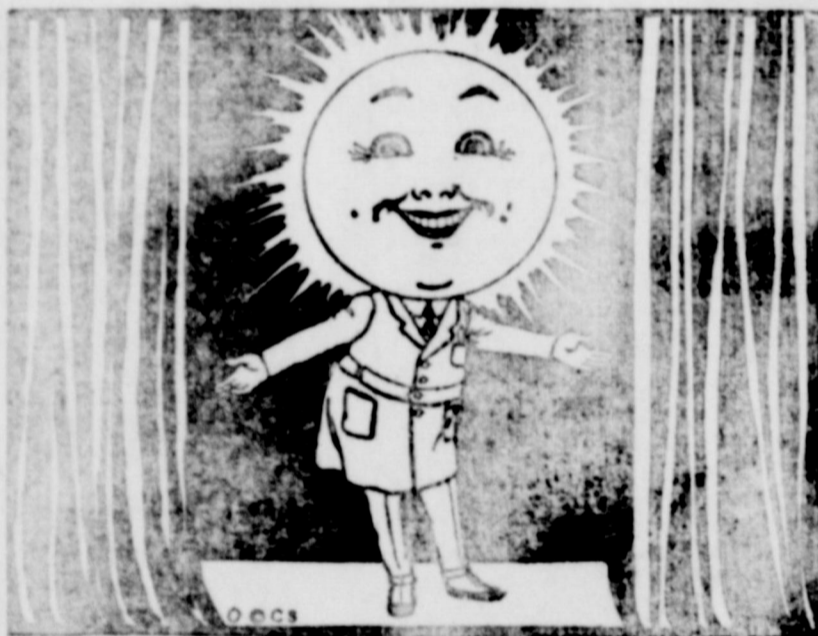
