A storehouse of valuable information has been placed in the school library by the acquisition of a filing cabinet known as the Federal Index System, for which numerous bulletins can be secured through the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C. The initial cost of installing the system is practically the only expense.

Subjects included in the file are varied, covering every phase of agricultural life, stock raising, produce marketing, disease, national guidance, and every phase of industry known to the American people. Bulletins or pamphlets of accurately compiled material on all these subjects are received from Washington and placed on file in the cabinet.

Suppose that you are interested in starting a home laundry. What equipment and how much could you purchase? You can get the information and much more from the government bulletin, Home Laundering.

Are you interested in starting a poultry farm? You will want to know the breeds of chickens, the kinds of feed, the amount of feed, the kinds of pens, the care that the chickens demand, how to market them, and how to realize the profit from your investment.

The government bulletins will furnish the knowledge you desire.

DISTRICT COURT PROCEEDINGS

The regular term of district court was in session here this week. Judge Joseph Jones and district Attorney Julian La-Crosse and Mrs. Belle Sutherland of Del Rio were in attendance together with the local officers, Mrs. Luella Lemons district Clerk and Sheriff W. J. Banner.

The grand jury was empaneled on Monday and R. N. Allen was made the foreman. The jury was in session two days and many witnesses were examined and thorough investigations were made into affairs and past happenings that have occurred in the county since the last session. Seventy-two bills of indictments were returned but as no arrests have been made their nature cannot be revealed at this time.

All the cases that were tried this week were non-jury cases. One or two cases that had been on the docket were dismissed for lack of evidence or prosecution. Several land cases were tried to clear titles. Four divorces were granted at this time. The Pettit jury, which was summoned for Thursday, was notified that they were to appear Monday.

MRS. JOSEPHINE DOWNIE

The remains of Mrs. Josephine R. Downie were laid to rest beside her husband at Austin, Texas, on the afternoon of January 27th. Mrs. Downie died in Oakland, Calif., on the morning of January 23d, 1930, following a brief illness. At the time of her death she was in her 69th year.

Mrs. Downie was the widow of the late Charles Downie, and is survived by three daughters: Miss Octavia Downie and Mrs. Frank L. King, of Oakland, California, and Mrs. Etta M. Downie, of San Antonio, and a son, Edward R. Downie, of this city. An elder son, Charles Downie II, died several years ago. And the following grandchildren: Charles Downie III, Edward R. Downie, jr., Walter Gregory Downie, Jackson Nichols Downie, Frank Leroy King, and Mary Josephine King.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. P. B. Hill, pastor of the First Presbyterian church at San Antonio. The active pallbearers were Charles Bissell, of Austin; Chas. Dickson, Edwin Paschal, and Dr. Paul Peck, of San Antonio, and Alfred E. Creigh, jr., and J. M. Corder, of this city. The following served as honorary pallbearers: Joe Kerr, Alexander Mitchell, and Judge G. J. Henshaw, of Sanderson; J. S. Goething, of Waco; W. G. Franklin, Arthur Stiles, A. M. Blackman, and Walter Baker, of Austin; D. S. Barker, of Alpine; Ernest Brown, Marshall Hicks, Frank J. Lee, and N. S. Hineson, of San Antonio.

Born at Austin in 1860, Mrs. Downie spent her childhood and early womanhood in that city. Her maiden name was Josephine Rassler, the Rassler family having been a pioneer family of Austin. Her late husband was also of Travis county, and in the early 80s they were married at Austin. Soon after their marriage the young couple moved into west Texas, settling in what was then Pecos county, coming here when the country was very sparsely settled, and becoming one of the pioneer families of west Texas.

When Terrell county was created Mr. Downie and family claimed Terrell county as the county of their residence, and, until a few years prior to the death of Mr. Downie, they actually resided here. A few years ago, for the benefit of Mr. Downie's health, he and his wife went to California. Mr. Downie died at San Antonio the 25th of May, 1928.

Word of the passing of Mrs. Downie brought to her many friends in Terrell and Pecos counties the realization that her long and useful life was an intimate part of our community, and the severance of ties that cannot be measured in mere words, but profoundly felt in the hearts of her friends.

Mrs. Downie expressed to her family, shortly before her demise, the comfort she felt in the Master's words: "In my Father's House are many mansions; if it were not so I would have told you". Life was but a room of that great mansion, from which the passing was but to another and more beautiful room in which her loved ones would find her waiting.

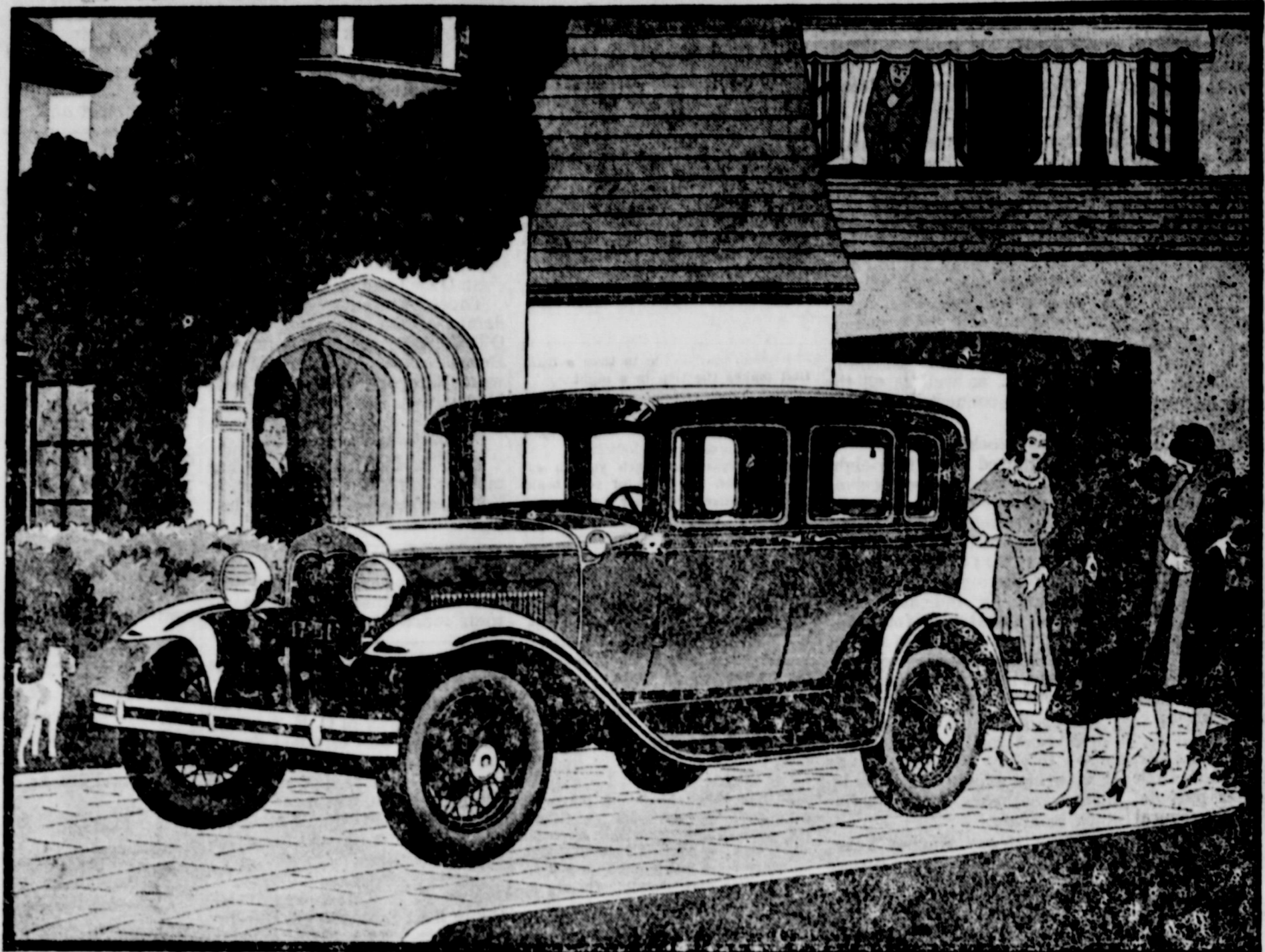

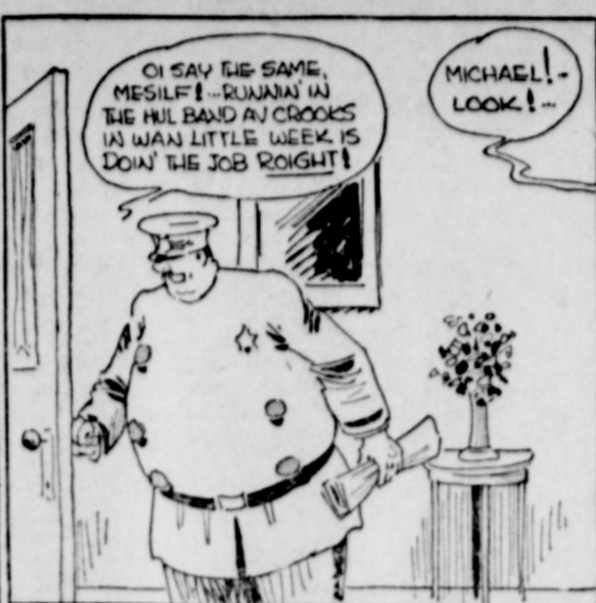

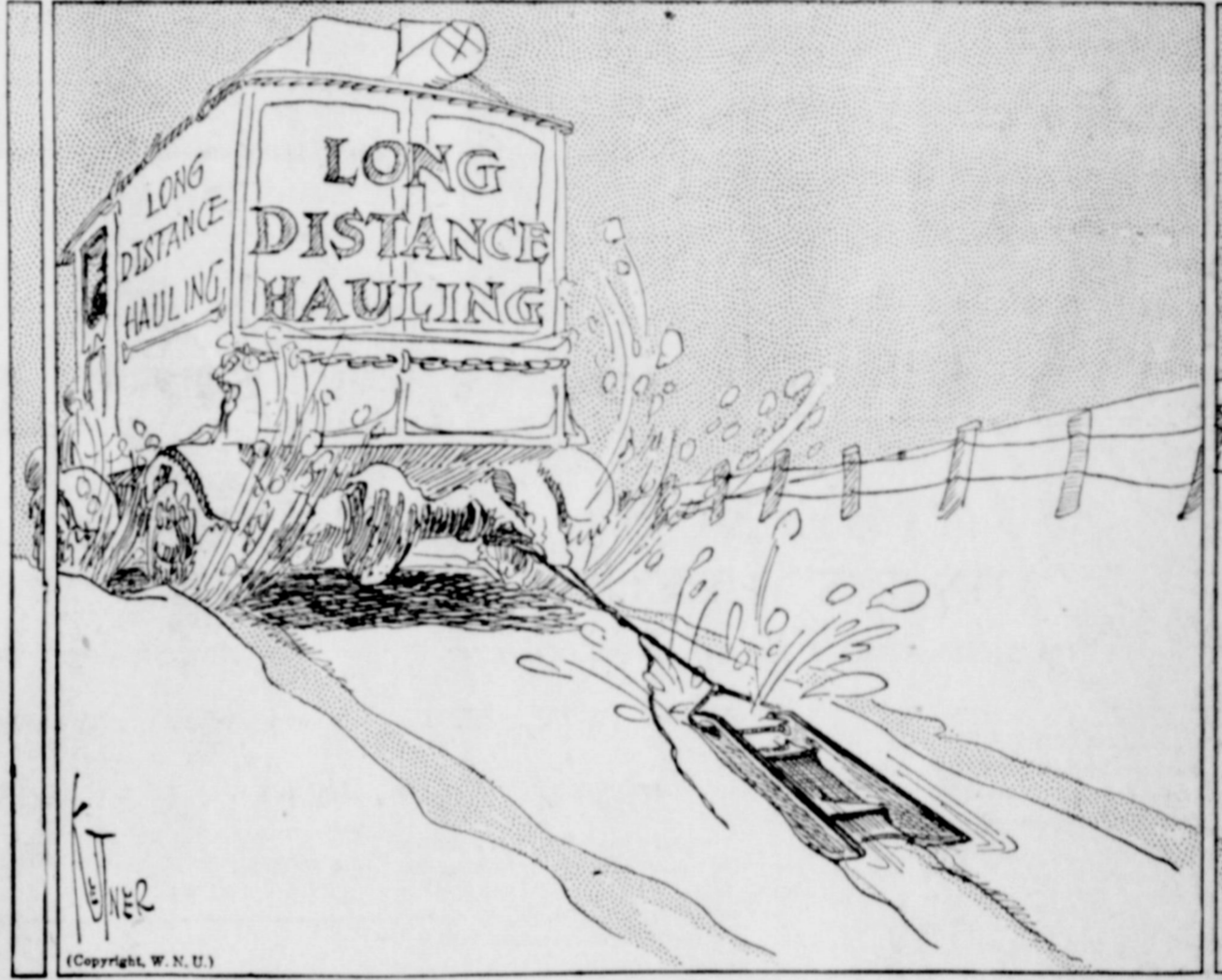

A representative in the National Congress should not only know the needs and desires of the people whom he is honored in representing, but he should also be equipped through training and education to properly carry out the duties of that high office.

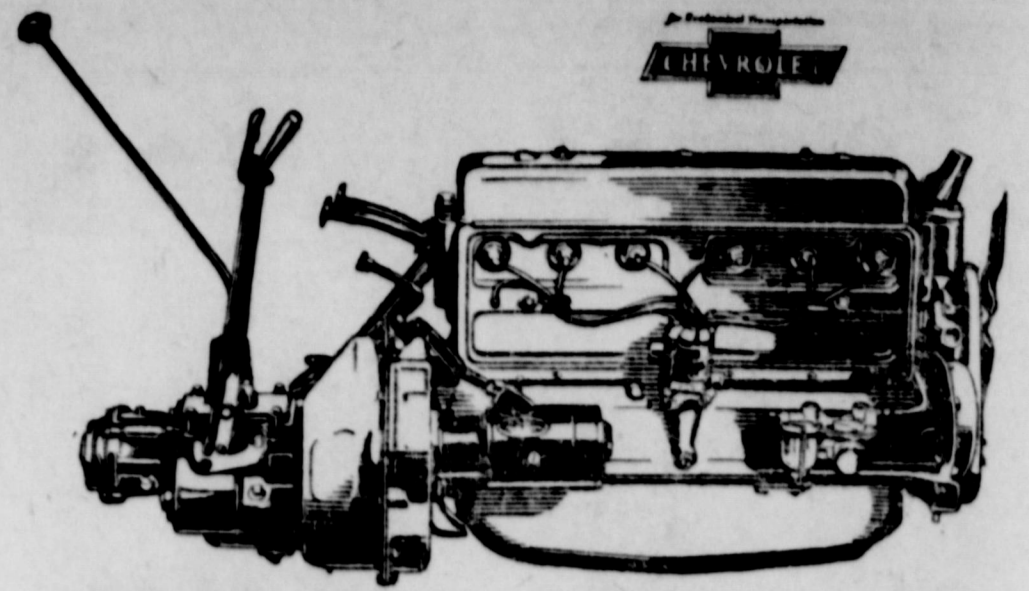
I have always thought that all the people in the district should have more to do with writing the platform of a candidate for Congress, rather than that he conduct his campaign as the representative of some particular group.

discrimination should be destroyed and agriculture placed immediately upon an equality with other industries. I believe the recent farm legislation creating the Farm Board should be given a fair chance to work out the problems before them.

The farmer is also discriminated against in the matter of freight rates. For example, if farm machinery is shipped from Chicago to New Orleans, for export to a foreign country, the rate is 47 1/2 cents per 100 pounds.

Oil Industry: Much of the prosperity in West Texas has been created by the oil industry. I favor a sound policy of conservation—a policy of America first, then conservation and correct marketing of oil and its by-products.

Education: I favor the establishment of a Federal Department of Education, with a secretary of education in the president's cabinet; Federal aid to our public free schools and a decent salary for every school teacher.

The present strength of our standing army is adequate in times of peace. The government should encourage and foster such organizations as the National Guard, Organized Reserves, Officers Reserves and Citizens Training Camps.

I favor the construction and maintenance by the Federal Government of a first class national highway along the Mexican border.

12. Civil Service: The boys and girls of Texas are entitled to a fair share of the civil service positions with the Federal Government.

1. Protecting dollars of American capitalists with lives of American boys, in Haiti and other places. 2. Lobbying: No man who has accepted favors from or who is under obligations to the paid lobbyist is fit to hold office.

3. Cancellation of Debts Owed by Foreign Countries: As long as women and children are forced to work in the field and sweat shops in our country for their daily bread; as long as want, misery, poverty and unemployment exist among our own people; as long as our disabled ex-service men have not been adequately cared for; not one dime will I vote to give Europe out of the United States treasury or what she owed the United States.

4. Monopolies, trusts, branch banking and excessive and discriminatory rates.

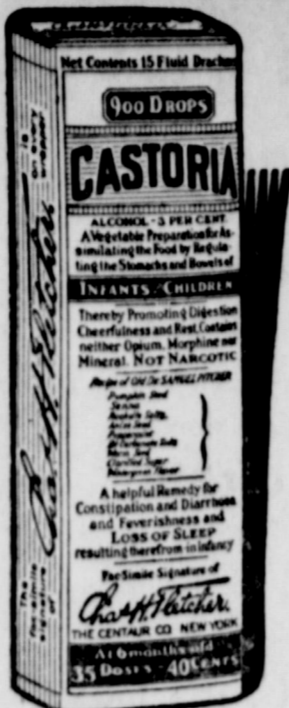

NEWS OF THE DRYDEN AIRDROME

The Dryden airdrome is maintained by the U.S. army and has five men on duty at all hours. They take care of the visiting aircraft that comes this way. There is a radio broadcasting station here which is operated by the signal corps of the U.S. army. Weather messages and arrival and departures of aircraft is sent and received. Two men are on duty with the signal corps in connection with the meteorological station. The purpose of this is to give out all weather information in order to keep flyers posted as to atmospheric conditions.

Lieut. Foster, with Sergeant Richardson as passenger, flew here from Fort Sam Houston with supplies for this station one day last week. They went on to Johnson's ranch, which is in the Big Bend country and at the foothills of the Chisos mountains. Johnson's ranch is 95 miles, airline, from here and can be flown in one hour, whereas by auto it requires 'about ten hours' driving. Mr. Johnson has a fine landing field and many flyers visit the place.

Lt. R. W. Douglas, with Gen. Lahn as passenger, made an inspection of the airdrome the past week. They were en route to the west coast.

J. O. Carparrs, of Toyah, Tex. flying an American eagle aircraft, which he purchased in San Antonio, spent the night at this airdrome. He made several flights with the personnel of this station. Included in the flights were Mrs. H. R. Norwood, Mrs. H. V. McCabe and son, H. A. Mooney, and Donald O'Connor. He departed the following

morning for his home.

Burt Pidcock, of Houston, spent a night here recently. He was flying a lock-head monoplane for the Texas Company, of Houston. He departed the following morning for the west coast.

J. F. Dexter, of Dallas, flying an air sedan, arrived at this station the 27th and went on to Alpine by auto. Mr. Dexter is a well known contractor in this section and has made several trips to these parts by air. The trip from Dallas was made in three hours, whereas by auto it would have required 12 hours.

The hangar is being painted yellow, which will give all flyers a better view of the airdrome and can be seen for many miles.

It is rumored that the airdrome is to be remodeled and that two new radio towers and two buildings are to be added.

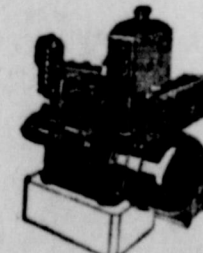

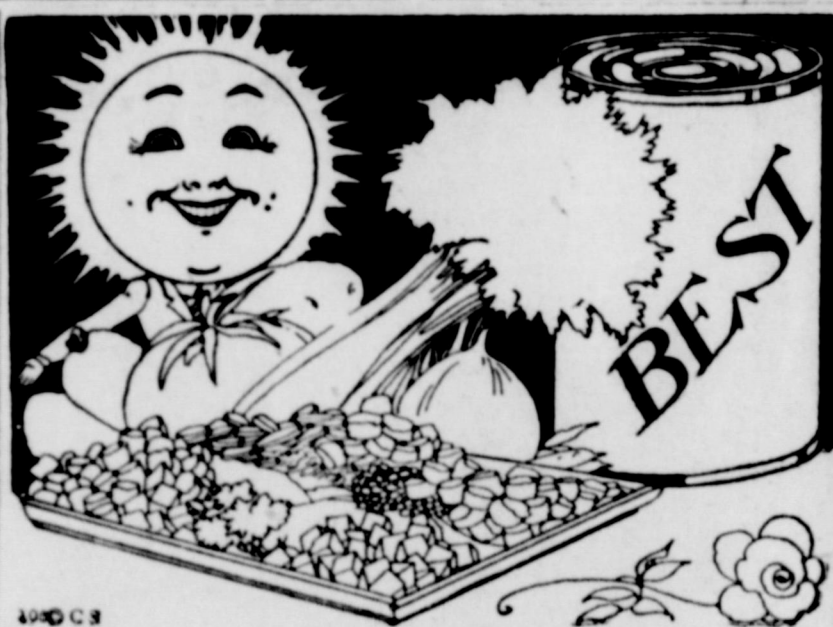
