Know Your School District Court Ended Tuesday

(That patrons may have better opportunity of really knowing their school this column will each week be given over to school news. It is the desire of the school executives that the patrons become better acquainted with the faculty, school methods and school aims.)

Reports show that certain high schools are giving courses of technical nature designed to meet the peculiar needs of the community. At Bedford, Ill., situated in a limestone district, a course in stone drafting together with work in the actual production of building materials is given. Stagecraft is taught in the high schools of Santa Barbara, Calif. Instruction relative to airplane and automobile engines, and the theory of flying are taught at Joliet, Ill. New Jersey schools give training in radio. The high school in Stockton, Calif., cooperating with a large harvester company, offers a course in foundry practice. Such changes in the curriculum serve to remind that high schools were not always what they are now.

Since Sanderson High School is situated in the midst of a stock-raising country, it could profitably include in its curriculum project courses in stock-raising, poultry-raising, or even fruit-tree cultivation. Instruction relative to the various steps of railroading would not be amiss.

Parents and guardians are advised to send their children to school warmly clad and well-fed for the next few days, since the only heat in the building is supplied by oil stoves brought by the children, when the boiler of the present heating system cracked Monday morning.

It has been necessary to send the boiler to San Antonio for repairs, but it is expected that it will be ready for service by the middle of next week. In the meantime, children and teachers are being made as comfortable as possible by the use of several oil stoves in each classroom.

The regular term of District court ended on Tuesday after being in session over a week. Several important cases were disposed of some being continued while others came to trial.

The first part of last week civil and non jury cases were heard. The following divorces were granted at this term: Mrs. Troxie Daugherty vs. Jessie Mills Daugherty, Jose Segura vs. Juana Segura, J. W. Daniels vs. Helen Daniels, Manuela Dias de Castro vs. Sarapio Castro, Rayes Hernandez vs. Julia Hernandez, Margaret Mayen Avilez vs. J. C. Avilez.

The following cases were dismissed from the docket: J. M. Pickens, indicted for swindling over value of \$50; Jose Segura, bigamy; Andy Eugene Meredith vs. Security Union Insurance Co., appeal from an award of the industrial board dismissed for want of prosecution. The following cases were continued until the next term of court: Jack Martin vs. H. C. Goldwire, suit for commission on debt; Florencia Hernandez and Edibujo Renteria, burglary; E. P. Measles et al vs. Lewis Rice injunction; O. W. Adams vs. Ben H. Brown to collect commission on debt, continued to await the action of the Court of Civil Appeals; H. C. Goldwire vs. Lee McCue, injunction; Clyde Deaton vs. Ben H. Brown, suit on note; C. H. Arvin vs. L. W. Leeper, suit for cancellation of agreement.

In the case of C. H. Gregory vs. Julian S. Rumsey which was being tried to try title as for damages the judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff.

The R. M. Gatlin vs. J. F. Nichols case which was a jury one and was tried on Monday and Tuesday was one of the most important cases. This case for a debt in regard to the building of a fence line. The jury awarded the case in favor of the plaintiff.

Gain Shown in Poll Tax Payment

Registering of Cars Below Normal; Many Will Have to Pay Penalty

A total of 883 poll tax receipts were issued in Terrell county by Tax Collector W. J. Banner at the close of business on January 31. This is the largest number of voters that has ever been in this county. Most of the gain in voters were in this precinct, while at Dryden, precinct 2, and in precinct 3, there was also a slight gain.

The number of poll taxes issued in each precinct were as follows: Precinct 1, 640; precinct 2, 120; precinct 3, 33; and precinct 4, 40.

About half the cars were registered as to the number that the records showed last year. 461 cars and 89 trucks were registered up to the close of business on February 1.

Former Citizen Highly Honored

J. H. Walsh's Name on Honor Roll; Tribute Paid for Deeds

J. H. Walsh at one time a citizen here and conductor for the S. P. was named Austin's Most Worthy Citizen for 1929 in services held at the Majestic Theatre in that city on Sunday, January 26th. This honor was bestowed upon Mr. Walsh in recognition of his numberless deeds of kindness and generosity in making education possible for the orphan, in brightening the lives and providing food and comforts for children of hospitals and homes for the underprivileged, in helping the aged, and in furthering the welfare of countless people.

A silver mantle set, including a plaque engraved with the record of the award, was unveiled by Gov. Neff and presented to Mr. Walsh, with the declaration that even outliving the graven record in silver, his deeds of kindness would live in the hearts of those he had befriended and those who come after.

The trophy, which was furnished by the American Statesman, represented Gov. Neff said, a commendable part by the newspapers in the spontaneous expression of honor by all the people of their civic benefactors. Mr. Walsh is the sixth Austin citizen to be so honored.

Since 1921, Mr. Walsh has been superintendent of the Austin division of the Southern Pacific system.

His many friends here extend congratulations and best wishes to him for so being honored.

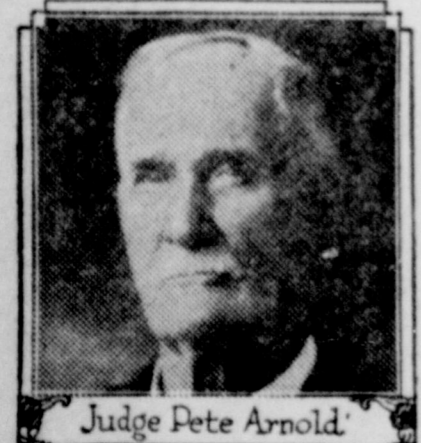

The comparative safety and comfort of the modern ocean vessel may be blamed for the disappearance of the sea serpent, in the opinion of Austin H. Clark of the Smithsonian Institution. The tales of marvelous and fearful sea monsters all belong to the days when sailing the seas was highly dangerous and the large fish could come uncomfortably close to the ship's passengers. A man on the dry, secure deck of the modern vessel lacks the stimulus to his imagination that would make him see queer creatures in the sea, although occasionally even now tales are told in all sincerity of sea serpents being seen.—Exchange.

CRIME IS GROWING IN SMALL CITIES

Find More Young Criminals, Report Shows.

Washington.—A census report just issued shows the ratio of young criminals is increasing, smaller cities have more crimes than larger ones, and the lack of home ties tends to promote law breakers.

Persons between fifteen and thirty-four years of age made up 73.6 per cent of the prison commitments in 1923, whereas citizens of these ages constituted only 49.7 per cent of the general population. In many cases unsatisfactory home conditions were indicated as causes.

Medium-Sized Best Behaved. Cities of from 25,000 to 100,000 show the highest commitment ratio, 28.6 per 100,000, but they are just slightly above places with from 2,500 to 10,000. According to the census report cities of 10,000 to 25,000 are the best behaved.

Crime was found far more prevalent in the city than in the country.

"Of the total number of prisoners for whom the location of crime was reported," it is pointed out, "77.8 per cent were imprisoned for crimes committed in urban places, and rural sections were the scene of only 22.2 per cent of the crimes. Urban places show a commitment ratio per hundred thousand of population of 25.1, as against the rural ratio of 7.6."

The census report added that the "commitment ratios, according to sex, show a greater disparity for females than for males between the urban and rural commitment ratios."

"For females," it said, "the commitment ratio was 3.7 for urban places, as against a rural ratio of 0.5."

Prisoners Migratory.

Census bureau agents found that prisoners are migratory, moving from community to community. Education, it is stated, is a deterrent for crime. The commitment ratio is about three times as high for the illiterate as for the college group.

"These figures," declared the bureau report, "afford no support to the sensational statements frequently made in recent years, to the effect that education, and especially college education, tends to promote crime."

But, it is said, "it is quite probable that offenders having education are more successful in avoiding arrest and conviction for their crimes."

"At the same time it is to be noted that the prisoners comprise an abnormally high proportion in the younger age groups, and these in the general population have decidedly higher educational attainments than persons belonging to the older groups."

French Soldier Escapes Kitchen Police Duty

Paris.—Hereafter the French soldier will confine his efforts entirely to the manly art of fighting, with no time out for "kitchen police." Innovations in the new army bill take cognizance of the limited time the one year training law allows for learning soldiering, and all the latest mechanical devices, such as make housework a pleasure instead of a drudgery, will be introduced.

According to the 1930 war bill, French mothers will no longer raise their soldiers to be gentlemen spud peelers, barrack cinderellas, kitchen scullions, and mop wielders. In the new bill housemaid's knee will be entirely eliminated from the army, for Minister of War Maginot is going to replace all these domestic jobs, usually given as penalties, by the latest culinary and household inventions.

Chinese Palaces to Be Made Hotels, Schools

Peking.—The former presidential palaces in the Three Lakes park, once the pride of the new Chinese republic, are to be turned into a modern hotel, a sanatorium, and a mass educational school, if plans by the board of park commissioners are successful.

Since the capital was moved south, the palaces have been of little use, and the board feels that they should not stand idle. They have obtained a large portion of the necessary funds by public contribution, and hope to begin alterations upon the palaces in the near future.

Dozen Nations Ready to Change Calendar

Geneva.—Eleven nations have already followed the example of the United States in forming national committees for the reform of the calendar, the League of Nations has just announced.

As in the case of the United States, all of these committees are composed of leading bankers, industrialists, astronomers, scientists and men of the highest standing and authority on the subject.

The last committee formed is in Holland under the presidency of Prof. A. A. Nijland, professor of astronomy at the University of Utrecht.

The countries that have already taken this necessary initiative are the United States, Brazil, Costa Rica, Cuba, Ecuador, France, Hungary, Nicaragua, Panama, Holland, Peru and Salvador.

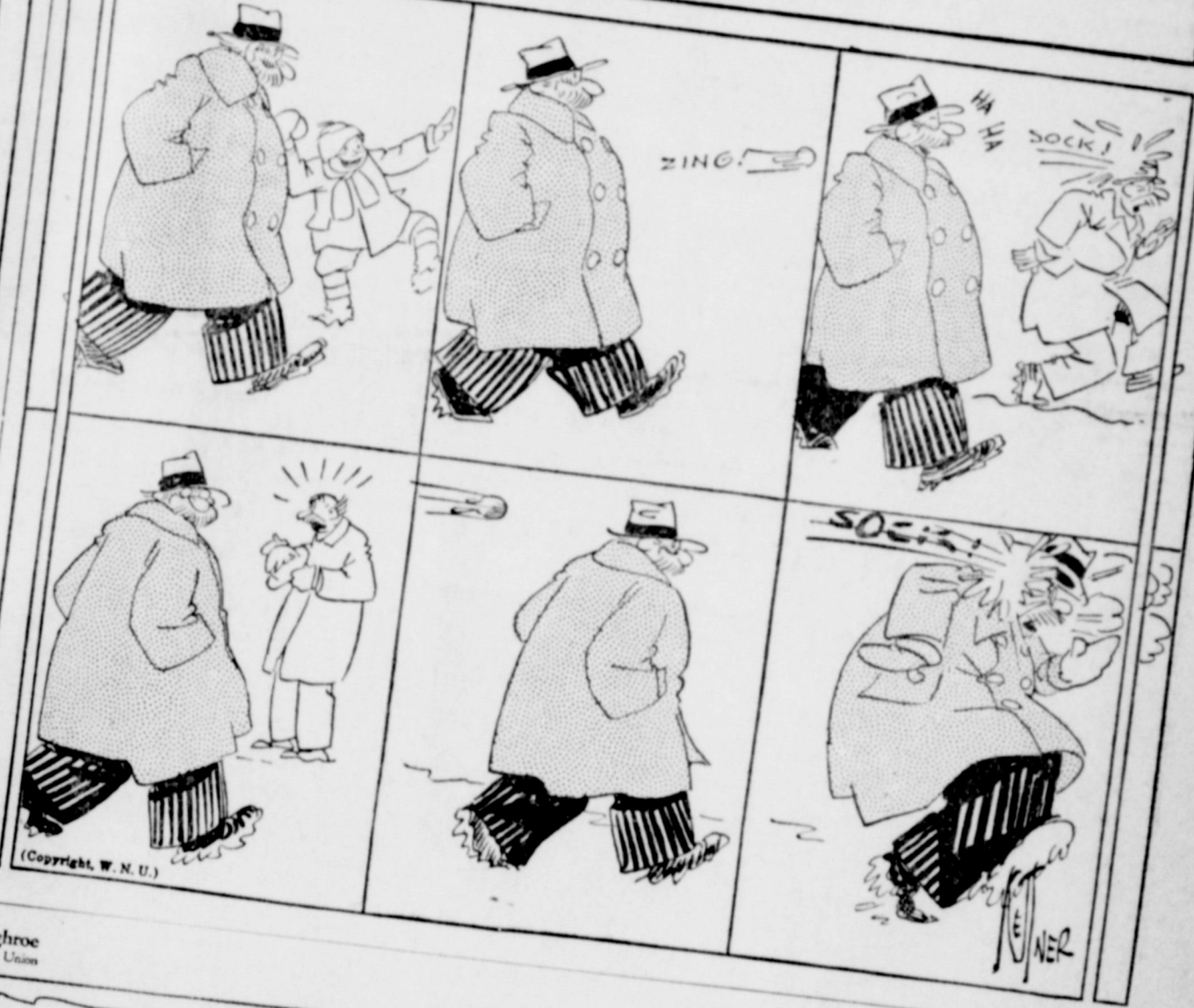

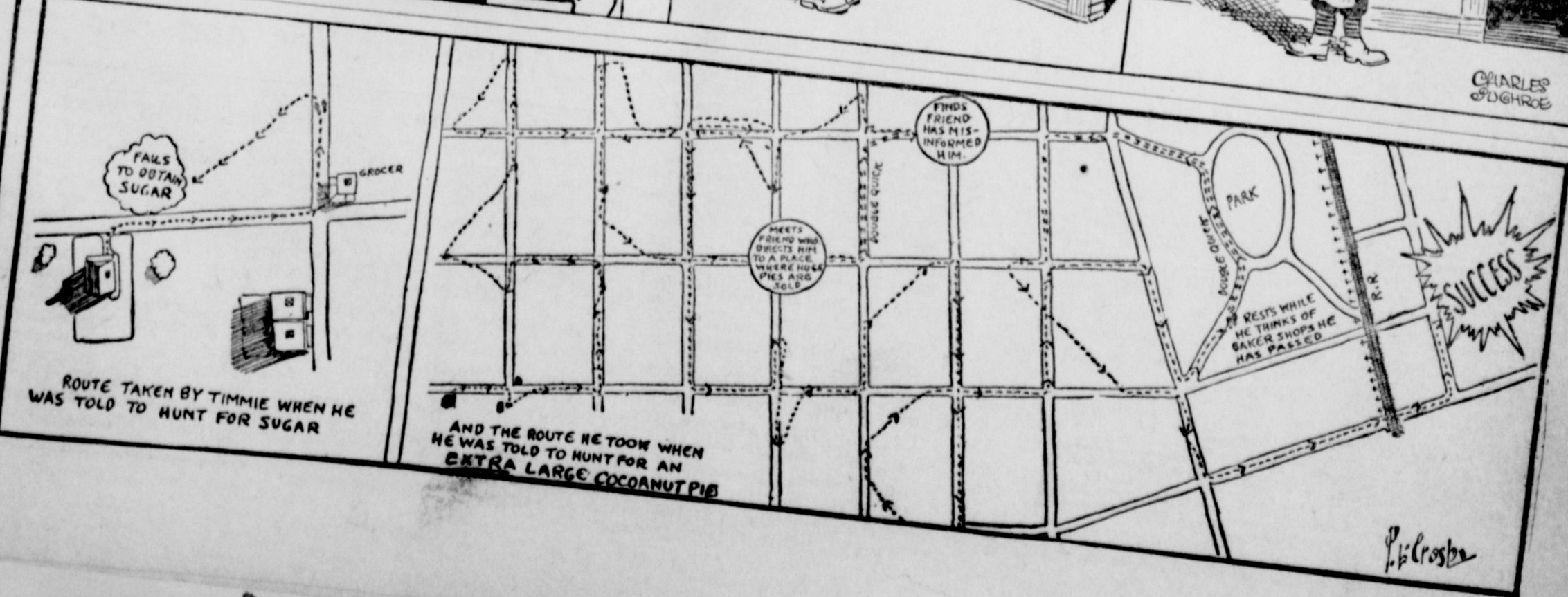

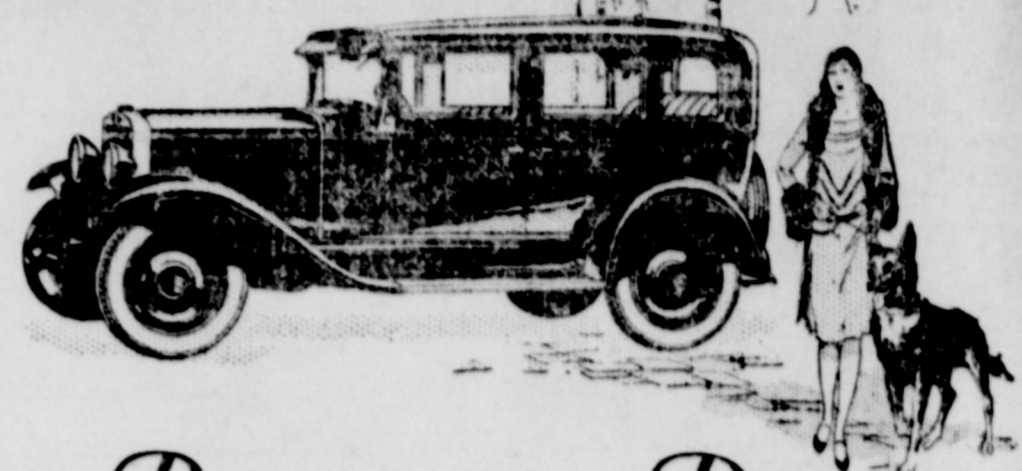

Lesson for February 9
WARNINGS AND PROMISES
 (TEMPERANCE LESSON)

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 7:1-29 (Print vs. 1-12, 15-27).
 GOLDEN TEXT—Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire.
 PRIMARY TOPIC—Obeying Jesus.
 JUNIOR TOPIC—Keeping the Law of Christ.
 INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—The Truth About Alcoholic Beverages.
 YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Cutting Down the Corrupt Tree.

1. Concerning Censorious Judgments (vv. 1-12).

1. The sin and folly of (vv. 1-5). This prohibition should not be so construed as to forbid our making an estimate of the lives of those about us, for "by their fruits ye shall know them." Neither should it prevent us from administering rebuke to those who deserve it. It is not wrong to condemn the errors and faults of those who are in the way of sin. It does not mean that sin should go unrebuked until we ourselves are perfect. It rebukes readiness to blame others and to magnify their weakness and error.

2. The duty of discrimination in dealing out holy things (v. 6). The Gospel should be preached to all. We should turn from those who reject and treat with contempt the Gospel message.

3. Qualification for discrimination (vv. 7-12).

(1) A life of prayer (vv. 7-11). Only those are able to rightly divide the word of truth who live a life of prayer. (2) A disposition to treat others as one would be treated (v. 12). It is not merely to refrain from doing injury, but positively to do for others that which we would desire to have done unto ourselves under similar circumstances. No man can live this rule unless he has been born from above and abides with Christ.

II. Entrance into the Kingdom Urged (vv. 13, 14).

There are two ways only before each one—life and death, heaven and hell. The narrow gate is the way of life. While the gate is strait and the way narrow, it is an open gate and the only gate to life, and all are invited to enter. The gate which opens to every good thing in life is strait—restricted. The way of Jesus Christ is not the way of the crowd.

III. Warnings Against False Teachers. (vv. 15-20).

1. Their real existence (v. 15). Ever since God has had a people, false prophets and teachers have appeared among them.

2. Their nature (v. 15). (1) They are hypocritical. The devil does his most successful work by masquerading as an angel of light (II Cor. 11:14, 15). His ministers appear in this way and turn people from the narrow to the broad way. (2) They are destructive. This is suggested by their being ravening wolves. It is when the wolf is in sheep's clothing that it does its most destructive work. False teachers are doing their most deadly work while pretending to be loyal to the Bible and Jesus Christ.

3. The unfailing test (vv. 16-18). "By their fruits ye shall know them." Every tree bears its own kind of fruit. One may search the universe in vain for an exception to this rule. It is equally true in the spiritual world—there is a vital connection between faith of heart and fruit of the life.

4. Their ultimate end (v. 19). Although God has infinite patience and bears long. He will see to it that this evil work does not go on forever.

IV. The Dangers of Empty Profession (vv. 21-23).

1. Merely calling Christ Lord will not answer for doing his will (v. 21).

2. One may do supernatural works and not be saved (vv. 22, 23).

Not all supernatural worlds are divine. There is a supernatural world of evil. It is the business of every believer to test the Spirit (I John 4:1, 2).

3. Separation from God (v. 23). One may have been a Sunday school teacher or a minister and have performed many mighty works and yet hear from Christ the awful words, "I never knew you; depart from Me."

V. The One and Only Safe Way (vv. 24-29).

1. Hear the sayings of Christ (v. 24). To do this one must give attention to reading the Word of God.

2. Do what Christ commands (vv. 24-29). Hearing and doing the teachings of Christ is building upon solid rock. Hearing and not doing Christ's sayings is to build upon the sand.
