#### Glass Windows Found

in Old Roman Houses Glass windows are not the relatively modern things they are commonly re puted to be. According to Dr. M. Blaschke, a German ceramic chemist they were in use in ancient Rome Most of the panes did not exceed 12 by 16 inches in size, though a few larger ones have been found. Glassmaking, known for many centuries in Egypt, came to Rome relatively late. During the time of Cicero, who died in 43 B. C., glass objects of any kind were rarities, and glass windows were unknown. A hundred years later most households owned some, and by the time the empire was well established glass was fairly common. I. How the Kingdom Was Received (ch. 11).

In showing the attitude of heart of the people, four classes of hearers are described.

1. The perplexed hearers, like John the Baptist (vv. 2-11).

John believed that Jesus was the Christ (v. 2), but was somewhat perplexed as to the manner of the estabishment of the kingdom. The Baptist had in his preaching mainly emphasized the line of prophecy which made the King to be a mighty conqueror (Matt. 3:10-12). He said that in his pack provisions for three days the ax is laid unto the root of the tree and that there was to be a separation traveled in single file over the pow of the chaff from the wheat and a dery new snow of the last fall, first purning of the chaff. John saw Christ as the one who would remove the sins the shoes of the first man sank inches of the people by the shedding of His blood (John 1:29), but he failed to see the interval between the time of His suffering and the time of His triumph.

2. Violent hearers (vv. 12-19). These were willing to receive the kingdom according to their own way, but were unwilling to conform to its laws. They seized it with violent hands. They would not repent when called upon to do so by John, nor reoice to do so when called upon by Christ (vv. 17-19).

3. The stout-hearted unbelievers (vv. 20-24).

In Chorazin, Bethsaida and Capernaum, Christ had done most of His mighty works, but the people deliberately set their hearts against Him and His message. Tyre and Sidon were filled with immoral profligates and idolators, but they will be more tolerably dealt with in the Day of Judgment than will those who wilfully reject Jesus Christ.

4. Hearers who are babes in spirit (vv. 25-30).

There were some among the people who heard Jesus with childlike faith. They believed that Jesus was the Messiah and opened their hearts to re-

II. The Antagonism to Jesus (ch. 12).

In chapter eleven we saw the shame ful indifference of the Jews to their King. In this chapter we see the positive and bitter antagonism manifesting itself against Him. The immediate occasion of their wicked determination was Christ's relation to the Sabbath.

1. The Son of Man is Lord of the Sabbath (vv. 1-8).

The hungry disciples were plucking corn on the Sabbath. With this the Pharisees found fault. To their cavils Christ replied, and showed that God's purpose in instituting the Sabbath was to serve man's highest interests and to contribute to his happiness.

(1) He is greater than their greatest King, David (vv. 3, 4). (2) He is greater than their sacrifice and priesthood (v. 5), (3.) He is greater than the temple (v. 6). The temple, with its gorgeous rites and ceremonies, was but typical of Himself, (4) He is greater than the Sabbath (v. 9), for He is the very Lord of the Sabbath. 2. Healing the withered hand (vv.

In order that they might accuse Him, they asked, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath days?" Jesus' reply was both a question and a declaration, 3. The unpardonable sin (vv. 22-32).

The occasion of their blasphemy against the Holy Ghost was the casting out of the demon. In this act, Christ displayed His power to cast out demons. The effect of this miracle was twofold: (1) Upon the multihorned owl, there she is! This must tude. They were amazed, and cried out, "Is not this the son of David?" (2) Upon the Pharisees. When they heard what the people were saying, their anger and satanic malice were et down stream, we walk into de camp aroused. They said He was casting out demons by the prince of the demons. With unanswerable logic, He met their accusations and demanded decision. He charged home upon them their awful guilt. They had attributed the work of the Holy Spirit to the devil. This Christ calls the blasphemy against the Holy Ghost, for which there is no pardon.

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
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



#### FIND RED SURVIVORS OF CUSTER BATTLE

#### Old Warriors Among Sioux in Canada.

New York.-Indian survivors of Custer's battle on the Little Big Horn have been found among a band of Wapeton Sloux in central Saskatchewan by an expedition from the Cambridge university museum and the British museum.

The expedition, led by an American, Donald A. Cadzow, has just returned lightful tablets as often as you please; to civilization after traveling thousands of miles to study scattered tribes of Canadian Indians whose old native culture is fast vanishing. Cadzow has been accompanied by Robert Rymill of England and John Rymill of South Australia.

#### Moved to Canada.

The band containing the Custer fight survivors moved to Canada shortly after the battle, Cadzow said. The group fought its way northward to good hunting country on the north shore of the Saskatchewan river and there it settled. The old chief, Four Stars, is still alive and they all call Americans "Che-moki-men," or "Long Knives," after the name long ago given to American cavalrymen who carried

In northeast Saskatchewan the expedition found an untamed tribe of Salteaux Indians, led by a blind old chief named Nippy, and independently hating everything that suggests the white man's America.

"These Indians live as their ancestors did a hundred years ago, hunting moose, deer and fish," Mr. Cadzow said, "Repeated efforts by the government to keep these long-haired pagans on a reservation have failed. They refuse to accept treaty money offered to them each year by the Indian department and missionaries sent to them by various faiths have given up all hope of converting them because it is impossible to work with a roving band of hunters who refuse even to talk with a white man."

#### Preserve Ancient Rites.

Many of the ancient secret societies still function among the tribes, the expedition found. The Piegan Indians of Alberta hold their annual sun dance, but the torture of warriors by placing sharpened sticks through the flesh of their breasts is omitted because it is no longer necessary to make warriors.

"The weird throb of the tom-tom played by medicine men and herb doctors still can be heard on the reserves," Cadzow stated, "But it is only a matter of a few years before the white man's civilization will wipe out the last vestige of true Indian

#### American Ways Rapidly Getting Hold in Sweden

Stockholm.-The gradual Americanization of Sweden is noticeable everywhere in the country, but is most pronounced in Stockholm. The citizens of the capital like American novels, magazines, dramas, musical comedies and, especially, motion pictures.

Sudak of this city were compelled to wait until dark for a funeral which had been scheduled for midafternoon. A rush order was given for a motor hearse as soon as the reason for th delay was discovered, but night had already fallen before it could reach the cemetery.

Linz, Austria.-Doctor Urban, the primarius of the Charity Brothers' hospital, a church institution of this city, celebrated an event which locally was considered of the highest importance, and was congratulated by many former patients as well as by

his own fellow surgeons. This event was his four thousandth goltre operation. Goltre is particularly prevalent in this district, due, it is believed, to the peculiar mineral deposits in the drinking water.




