Know Your School

Searching efforts to stamp out illiteracy in the United States have been instigated by persons of unusual prominence in the nation's life. Within recent months the nation has been amazed to learn of the ignorance prevailing among the mountaineers near President Hoover's summer camp at Rapidan, Va. The situation gained nationwide notice because Rapidan is less than 100 miles from the nation's capital and because the president himself took an interest in these poor folk who could not read or write, who had never seen an American flag, whose children knew nothing and had only the slightest idea of play.

President Hoover is having a school established for one of these communities, and a young man who is familiar with the type of teaching suitable for mountain schools will be in charge. Social workers are helping the children to learn the best to help them.

With the announcement by Henry Ford that he expects to invest \$100,000,000 to education, it became known that he really started this program 5 years ago helping the Berry schools in Mount Berry, Ga., to the extent of \$1,000,000. These schools were founded 25 years ago by Miss Martha Berry, bring education to mountain boys and girls.

Texas is making a last minute drive to wipe out illiteracy in its isolated districts before the 1930 census is achieved. The census placed Texas as 35th from the top in literacy. Since that time no special efforts have been made to reach the individuals who were considered unlearned then. Since many of the southern states that ranked low with Texas in the 1920 census have taken definite measures to overcome ignorance in their rural districts within the last few years, it is quite likely that Texas will still rate low. In order to meet this situation the state Department of education at Austin has issued suggestions to county and city superintendents to hold night schools and use any legitimate means to improve present conditions.

State and Federal Appropriations Doubled. Poison Bait Put Out in Two Counties

In an interview with the editor of the Sanderson Times this week, Will Funderburk, who is with the U. S. Geological Survey and State Predatory Animal Control, reported that Mr. Bailey working in Pecos county led the state trapping force last month with a total catch of 62 coyotes. A. A. Henning working in Jeff Davis county, and Felix Strey working in Upton county, came a close second.

Mr. Funderburk stated that he had just finished putting out 24,000 pork fat baits in Midland and Ector counties and reports from there were to the effect that many dead coyotes were being found. He said ranchmen of the south plains were well pleased with the work being done and he felt sure of their continued support.

State and Federal appropriations, Mr. Funderburk said, had been more than doubled. He said the Department was now working in 50 different counties in the State and hoped in the near future to extend their work to 30 more counties.

ALEXANDER MITCHELL GIVES INTERESTING INTERVIEW TO SAN ANGELO PAPER

"Alexander Mitchell, ranchman of Terrell county, says that country has suffered no losses during the winter and that if the county escapes them during the incoming month that it will have escaped them practically altogether. Some few ranchmen are lambing there now, but most of them begin the first of March. The old Downie ranch, one of the pioneer ranches devoted to sheep in that section, has been cut up, leased out in part and sold in part. Mr. Downie came to the section in 1884 while Mr. Mitchell arrived there in 1890. The Indians were driven out in 1882. Mr. Mitchell learned from the late General Bullis, who said that in that year the last Indians in Texas were chased across the Mexican border.

Mr. Mitchell says the ranchmen in that county are looking for traders to contract lambs but there are none there thus far." — The San Angelo Morning Times.

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Spring Race Festival at San Angelo

Fast Horses Will be There to Compete For Big Purse

San Angelo, Feb. 27.—Preparations to entertain record numbers of visitors in San Angelo during March are centering around plans for the Spring Race Festival March 19 to 22, sponsored by the San Angelo Board of City Development, and the 54th annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, March 18-20.

The inaugural Spring Race Festival will bring the fastest horses in the Southwest to San Angelo to compete for purses totaling \$3,375, and race fans from throughout the state are expected to attend, according to Jess Elrod, chairman of the executive committee in charge.

Preceding the Spring Race Festival by a day and attracting attention of cattlemen throughout the Southwest to San Angelo, the 54th annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association will convene here March 18 for a 3-day session.

The initial program of the Spring Race Festival will be dedicated to the visiting cattlemen and their ladies when six events will be run. Five events will complete the race program on each of the following three afternoons.

Backed by leading sportsmen of Texas, the initial Spring Race Festival will be launched on a scale comparable to the nationally famous Tia Juana and New Orleans spring meets, and its sponsors hope to give it classification with the great spring track classics of the nation.

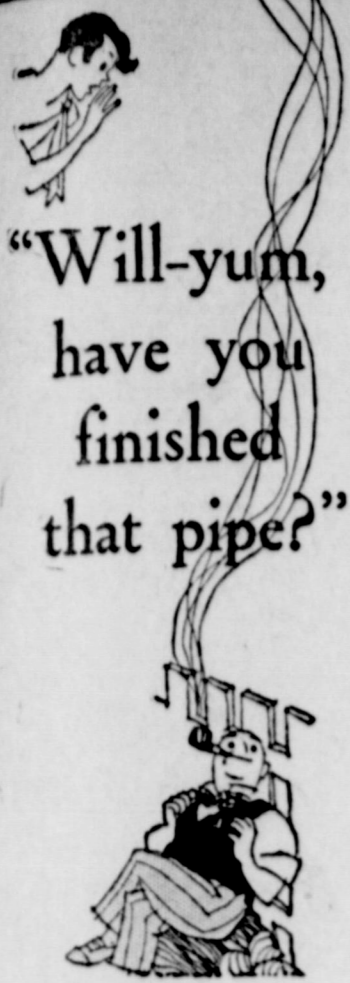

FIND RED SURVIVORS OF CUSTER BATTLE

Old Warriors Among Sioux in Canada.

New York.—Indian survivors of Custer's battle on the Little Big Horn have been found among a band of Wapeton Sioux in central Saskatchewan by an expedition from the Cambridge university museum and the British museum.

The expedition, led by an American, Donald A. Cadzow, has just returned to civilization after traveling thousands of miles to study scattered tribes of Canadian Indians whose old native culture is fast vanishing.

Moved to Canada. The band containing the Custer fight survivors moved to Canada shortly after the battle, Cadzow said. The group fought its way northward to good hunting country on the north shore of the Saskatchewan river and there it settled.

In northeast Saskatchewan the expedition found an untamed tribe of Salteaux Indians, led by a blind old chief named Nippy, and independently hating everything that suggests the white man's America.

These Indians live as their ancestors did a hundred years ago, hunting moose, deer and fish. Mr. Cadzow said, "Repeated efforts by the government to keep these long-haired pagans on a reservation have failed. They refuse to accept treaty money offered to them each year by the Indian department and missionaries sent to them by various faiths have given up all hope of converting them because it is impossible to work with a roving band of hunters who refuse even to talk with a white man."

Preserve Ancient Rites.

Many of the ancient secret societies still function among the tribes, the expedition found. The Piegan Indians of Alberta hold their annual sun dance, but the torture of warriors by placing sharpened sticks through the flesh of their breasts is omitted because it is no longer necessary to make warriors.

"The weird throb of the tom-tom played by medicine men and herb doctors still can be heard on the reserves," Cadzow stated. "But it is only a matter of a few years before the white man's civilization will wipe out the last vestige of true Indian culture."

American Ways Rapidly Getting Hold in Sweden

Stockholm.—The gradual Americanization of Sweden is noticeable everywhere in the country, but is most pronounced in Stockholm. The citizens of the capital like American novels, magazines, dramas, musical comedies and, especially, motion pictures.

The advent of the "talkies" had a distinct effect upon the everyday language, and such typical American slang phrases as "All right, kid," "O. K.," "Hello, baby," "So long" or "Howdy" are heard frequently. Daily life also is influenced by American habits in foods and clothing. Grapefruit and orange juice are served for breakfast, while "hot dogs" are sold all over the city. Shoe shine parlors are springing up in many places and even American soda fountains are found here and there.

American suits and hats, toilet preparations, office appliances, automobiles, chewing gum and cigarettes find increasing numbers of buyers, while records of Broadway melodies are played in homes and music stores. Even Rotary clubs have been started in several cities.

Tipsy Undertaker Makes Afternoon Funeral Late

Brunn, Czechoslovakia.—Because an employee of the undertaking establishment which had the burial arrangements in charge got tipsy and forgot to call at the hospital mortuary for the body, friends of the late J. Sudak of this city were compelled to wait until dark for a funeral which had been scheduled for midafternoon. A rush order was given for a motor hearse as soon as the reason for the delay was discovered, but night had already fallen before it could reach the cemetery.

Operates for Goitre for Four Thousandth Time

Linz, Austria.—Doctor Urban, the primarins of the Charity Brothers' hospital, a church institution of this city, celebrated an event which locally was considered of the highest importance, and was congratulated by many former patients as well as by his own fellow surgeons. This event was his four thousandth goitre operation. Goitre is particularly prevalent in this district, due, it is believed, to the peculiar mineral deposits in the drinking water.

Vienna.—Among the most popular presents in Vienna are little books of tickets issued by the State theater and opera, these tickets being accepted in exchange for regular tickets for any performance between January 1 and June 30 of each year.

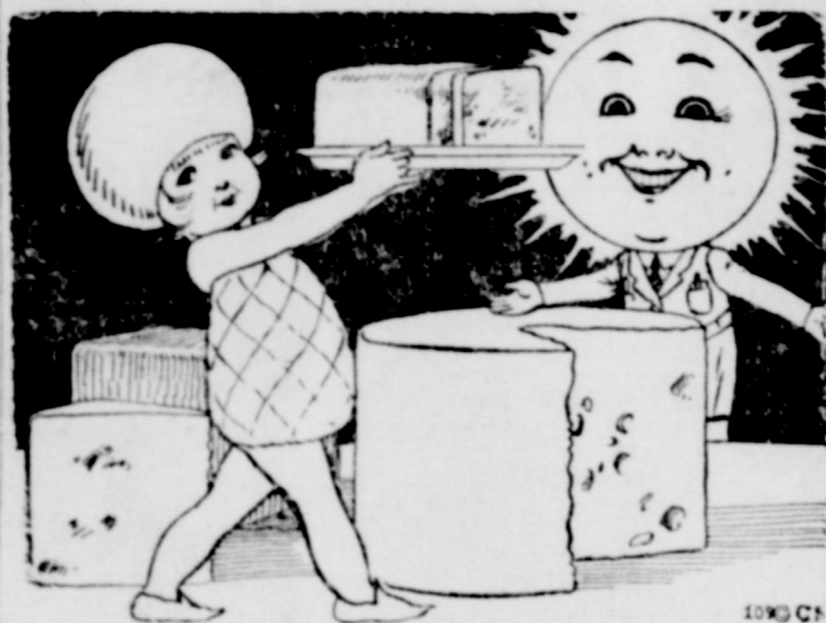

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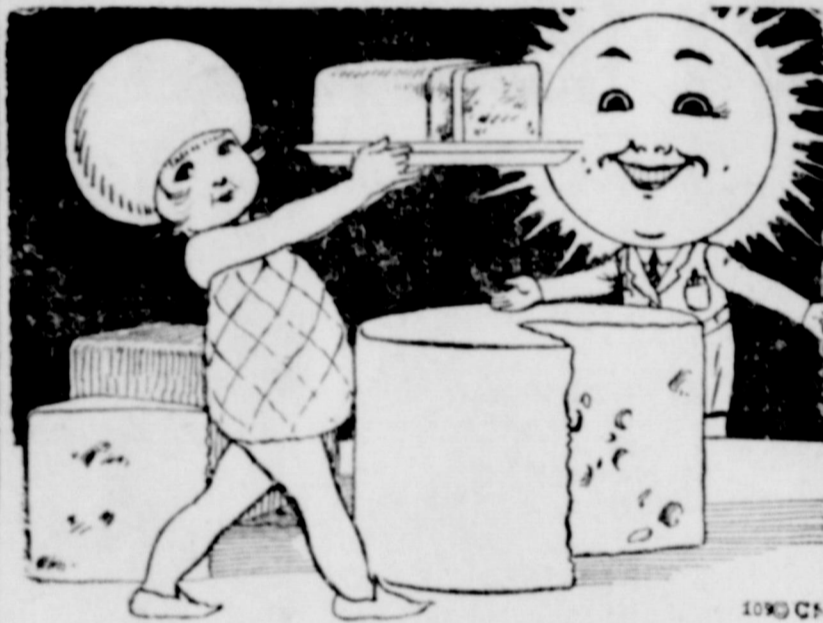
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
