Students Should Check Social Security Cards

"Now that school is over, all students who intend to work should check on their social security cards," stated John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security field office.

"About this time of the year most students are preparing to take summer jobs," Mr. Sanderson continued, "and whether they work part-time or full time, they will need a social security card. The card represents an insurance policy with their government, and the best way to protect that policy is to show the card to each new employer. This will enable him to report the worker with his complete name and social security number, thereby enabling the Social Security Administration to give the employee full credit on his social security account for the work done."

"A student who has already obtained a card but has lost it, should apply for a duplicate at once. Other students who are sure of working on social security jobs in the immediate future, would be wise in applying for their original card promptly. In both instances the necessary application blank may be obtained from any Post Office or from the Amarillo social security field office. The completed application should then be mailed to: The Social Security Administration, Field Office, Amarillo. A social security card will be returned promptly to the student," Sanderson concluded.

Attorney General Urges Firm Stand On Tidelands Issue

Attorney General Price Daniel today urged Texans to continue their firm stand against the Federal attempt to take the tidelands away from the State Public school fund. "Our case is not lost. The fight has just begun, and we are going to win in the Court or in Congress. If Texans themselves do not weaken or give up the fight," Daniel said. A prepared statement by the Attorney General said:

"True it is a hard fight, but with honest and righteous claims a fighting chance is all most Texans ever ask for. The odds were ten to one against Texas at San Jacinto, but they won. Had they become weakened and afraid to fight because of great odds, this area would still be part of Mexico. "This has been my position on this subject constantly for two years, and I hope the people and especially the newspapers will not at this late date attribute future political significance to my actions. I had rather win the tidelands case than to hold any public office that exists, and if it becomes necessary for me to remove myself from unsolicited speculation on the political scene in order to maintain united support on this case, I shall do so without hesitation."

"Of course, Federal officers would like to compromise because even with a court decision such as they have in California, they cannot take over the lands without an Act of Congress authorizing them to do so. It will take both a court decision and an Act of Congress to enable Federal agencies to enter upon the lands which Texas has held in trust for its people for the past one hundred years. Even in California, that State still operates its land and leases two years after an adverse court decision. Therefore, there is no reason to rush into a settlement on account of fear as to what the Court will do in the Texas case. Expressions of fear only serve to weaken our chances in the Court and the Congress," Daniel said.

Applications for these positions will be sent upon request by Mr. Russell E. Strader, 805 Littlefield Building, Austin, Texas. Each eligible candidate will be given a written examination by the Merit System Council. The written examination, together with an evaluation of the applicant's training and experience, will determine eligibility for the position. Qualifications include graduation from high school and from an acceptable school of nursing together with licensure to practice nursing in Texas. Preference will be given those who have had training in public health.

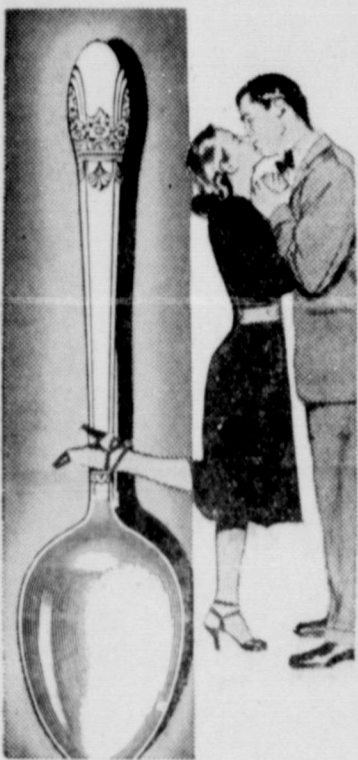

Schools To Offer Driver's Training This Summer

PAMPA (SP)—Thousands of Texas students will learn safe driving next school year as the result of a series of teacher-training courses to be offered in colleges and universities this summer. It was announced here today by Mr. Don Conley, Regional Director in the Texas Safety Association.

Eleven courses in seven schools will be available to prospective driver training teachers. Mr. Conley said.

"The organized safety program is rapidly eliminating the two obstacles that have stood in the way of driver training in the secondary schools," Mr. Conley said. "Schools have not had qualified teachers or money to provide automobiles. The 100 e courses will qualify from 200 to 300 new teachers. And members of the Texas Automotive Dealers Association are furnishing cars free to schools having qualified teachers."

The series will begin May 23 with a five-day short course for college professors at the University of Texas, Austin. Two short courses for high school teachers will be held simultaneously at the University of Texas and at Baylor University, Waco, beginning May 30.

Semester courses for high school teachers will be offered at East Texas State Teachers College, Commerce, beginning June 6 and July 18; at the University of Houston, June 9; North Texas State Teachers College, Denton, June 8 and July 19; Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville, June 6 and July 18; and Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College, June 3.

Teachers may earn either graduate or undergraduate credit in the courses.

Co-sponsors are the State Department of Education, Department of Public Safety, Highway Department and the Texas Safety Association.

Health Officer Urges Immunization For Diphtheria

AUSTIN, TEXAS—With 14 reported cases of diphtheria within the past week, and a total of 297 cases reported in the first 19 weeks of this year, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging Texas parents to have their immunized children Schick tested to determine immunity, and if inoculation is necessary, to have it done immediately.

"There is a widespread belief that once immunity is established, it lasts forever," the State Health Officer said. "This is not always true. In some cases, it diminishes and finally dies out, and reinoculation is necessary in order to protect the child."

"Every child who will enter school next term should be inoculated or Schick tested now, because it takes from three to nine months for immunity to be completely established after the injection is administered."

As long as cases of diphtheria occur, a child is in danger unless protected by immunization. The germs throw off a powerful poison which goes all through the body. It is particularly harmful to the heart, blood vessels, nerves and kidneys, and serious complications often accompany the disease. Some of the more dangerous complications are broncho-pneumonia, to which the patient is particularly susceptible; paralysis, which may last for days or for as long as 3 or 4 months; or permanent injury to the heart, nerves or kidneys.

"The best thing to do with diphtheria is to stop it before it starts," Dr. Cox said. "When toxoid is injected under the skin, the system manufactures a disease-fighting antitoxin which can successfully resist the disease. Children of school age should be inoculated or Schick tested now, so that immunity will be established or nearly so, before the opening of the next school term."

GRILLED HAM-PINEAPPLE PLATTER

Arrange on platter and serve. If the oven is being used, the sweet potatoes may be heated in the oven while the other food is cooking. Slice apple rings may be used in place of pineapple. Serve with hot rolls, margarine, and a tossed green salad.

KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARKE

If you don't feel like turning on the oven to bake cookies, try *Grid-dle Cookies* cooked over the top burner. Preheat griddle for three minutes with flame full on then turn down to low simmer for entire cooking period. Best heat test is a drop of water which should dance rather than steam on the griddle surface. Put 1 egg, slightly beaten, into 1/2 cup milk. Add 1 cup rusks. Sift once 3/4 cups all-purpose flour, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. baking soda, 2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. salt. Work 1 cup shortening into dry ingredients with pastry blender, until mealy. Then pour into the milk, egg and raisin mixture. Mix wrap dough in wax paper, chill in refrigerator 1 hour. Roll out 1/4" thick. Cut with cookie cutter. Brown on slightly greased griddle on one side, then on the other. Makes 24 cookies.

Don't worry about boilovers on your top burners. Just whip them up with a cloth dampened in warm water. Later, when your gas range has cooled, you can do a more thorough cleaning job.

Neither hot water nor gas is wasted when you have an automatic regulator on your gas water heater, because gas is turned on and off automatically only as hot water is needed.

The built-in towel drier and movable racks on some new gas ranges not only save precious space but also hide unsightly dish towels and cloths.

An ordinary vegetable parer is a good tool to use for grating chocolate or cheese and certainly easier to clean than a grater.

SPEER LAW POINTS SAFEGUARDING PUBLIC BONDS

The public at large is probably not aware of the magnitude and importance of legal scrutiny of all issues of public bonds by the State or its agencies. The aggregate of public debts thus created is staggering. It is indispensable in the financing of public affairs, from the smallest improvement district, to the State itself. The projects thus financed could not be effectuated without pledging the future. Such issues frequently are serially maturing annually for 40 or 50 years. The State could not function but for its sovereign taxing power, nor could it function to the best advantage if its building and other constructive projects and programs had to upon a cash basis. Not only does the State issue bonds, but so do the counties, cities, towns, school districts, irrigation districts, water control districts, reclamation districts, and other subdivisions agencies and authorities too numerous to mention.

Bond issues are usually secured by the credit of the issuing entity and paid through taxes levied, assessed and collected by the issuing authority.

The rates of interest paid are low, ranging from 1.5 per cent to 4 per cent, and the market for such issues is good. To keep a ready market demands necessarily a most scrupulous legal oversight and administrative safeguards.

The statutes require the Attorney General of the State to approve all bond issues supported by taxes and permits such approval where the issue is of revenue bonds; that is where payment is made from the revenues of the building or other project. So that practically no issue of public bonds is purchased until such official approval is obtained.

The Attorney General will of course refuse to approve when after an examination of a transcript of all the bond proceedings—court orders, elections, and the like—he finds the issue to be illegal. If this happens the issuing authority may institute an original proceeding directly in the Supreme Court to compel approval.

An approval by the Attorney General usually is conclusive of validity. Thus the purchasers are protected, and indirectly the tax paying public is protected against exorbitant rates of interest. Bonds thus safeguarded pass quickly into the hands of purchasers as negotiable investments—"coupons without baggage."

The Washington MERRY-GO-ROUND

Reds Get Advice

BIGGEST QUESTION MARK in the background is multimillionaire Fritz B. Burns, biggest west coast builder and former president of National Home Builders.

However, California congressmen would be even more amazed if they knew how the folks are being used by the committee for home protection. Here is how the lobby operates:

Committee agents approach citizens on the street, give them a "facts sheet," containing 10 sample telegrams denouncing public housing legislation, and ask them to select one, copy it on a telegram blank provided by the lobby's agent, and sign it.

When 20 such "earned" telegrams have been collected, they are sent to a member of congress. The latter assumes the telegrams are legitimate messages from the voters back home.

In addition to the "facts sheet," which lobby agents hand to the public, they also have an "instruction sheet," which they are very careful not to hand out. These confidential instructions are a good giveaway.

1. Select your prospect. Get a man who has absolutely no connection with the building or real-estate business. This is a "grass roots" campaign; so look for laborers, white-collar workers, veterans, housewives, small-shopkeepers—people in the middle and lower-income brackets.

2. Show your prospect your facts sheet.

3. Ask him to write his message on a telegraph blank. Get him to select his favorite argument and state that in a maximum of 25 words.

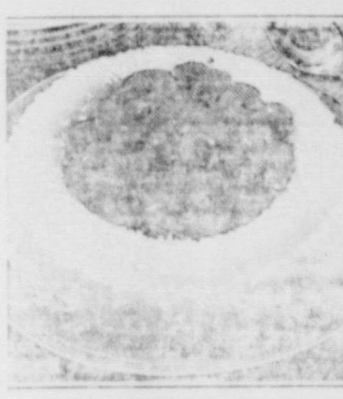

Stir and slowly 1/2 cup hot water. Taste for seasoning. Add more salt and pepper if needed. Cook slowly 1/2 cup hot water. Serve with rice.

Hereford Canning Company Operations Commence Soon

Preliminary operations for the opening of the Hereford Canning Company got underway this week with offices at the plant slated to open within the next few weeks, according to Worth Ware, general manager, who has announced the purchase of the properties, which were built at a representative cost of a quarter million dollars, shortly after the corporation was formed in March, 1946.

Officials of the plant include Ware as general manager, and president of the company, Mrs. Gail Ware, vice-president and assistant secretary-treasurer; Holman Jenkins, attorney of Dallas, vice-president; and P. T. Bee, Dallas, secretary-treasurer. Dell Hill of Weslaco, who has had wide experience in the operation of canning factories, has been named plant superintendent in charge of production and maintenance. Dell was connected with the Continental Canning Company in Chicago for years and was sent to Houston when that company built their plant there. Later he made numerous installations of canning plants in the Valley including the Harlingen Canning Company at Harlingen, Texas which is one of the largest canneries of its type in the United States.

Premium Foods
 "Texas foods bring a premium on the market and it is our intention to further promote Deaf Smith County's already well known slogan "The Town Without a Toothache," says

Ware. During a recent trip to the Valley a check was made with produce shippers and growers there as to the yield per acre and compared to 16 to 19 hundred pounds of green beans to the acre in the Valley. Deaf Smith County yields 6,000 lbs. Even with their two crop season they don't produce the amount of food that this county does in one. Tests also prove that the quality of the produce is better as more flavor is found in food produced in high altitudes.

The actual canning is expected to start sometime in July and the plant will be equipped to can black-eyed peas, green beans, small Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, beets and carrots. The plant will be expanded to meet the demands, and acreage for test runs of tomatoes for next year will soon be contracted. Later negotiations for control of acreage with local growers will be considered.

When the plant opens in July it will have an output of 50,000 to 60,000 cans per day and nationwide distribution will be effected through food brokers. The plant will pack products for various food concerns under their private labels as well as under the Hereford Canning company labels.

Texas foods are being sold in all the forty-eight states, says Mr. Ware, who thinks that Deaf Smith County food can dominate other localities because of the superior flavor found in produce of this soil and climate.

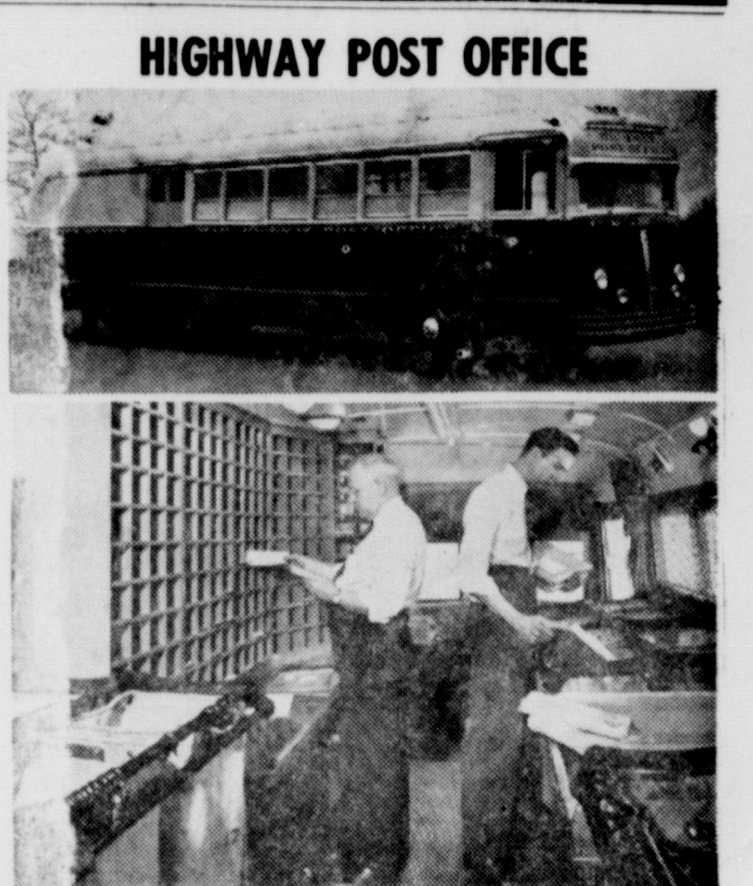

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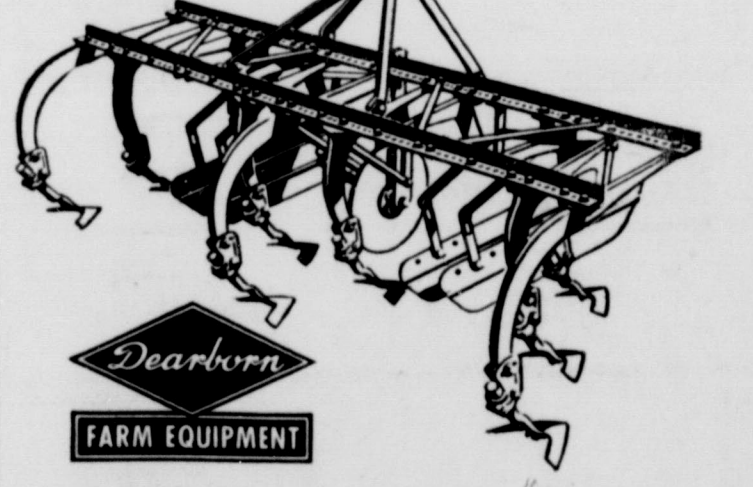
