



Valuable Discovery in Tuning Church Bells

A church bell made from the finest bell metal may give forth a harsh, unpleasant sound, due to the fact that it is out of tune with itself. The stroke of a single bell sounds to us like one note, and until very recently even the most expert bell makers have not realized that the sound is really made up of five separate notes. The five notes must be in tune with one another in order that the bell may give forth a harmonious sound. What we then hear is a combination of what is known as the strike note; the nominal, which is an octave above the strike note; the hum, which is an octave below, and the third and fifth.

harmonics of bells has made possible the new art of bell tuning, a revival of what for two centuries was considered a lost art. The large bells are inverted on a huge turntable and revolved while the metal is pared away from the inside until it is correctly shaped to produce the harmonious tones.-Kansas City Star's Science

Catching Sylvan Pass in Her Easter Hat!

F YOU want the surprise of your Hfe sometime, try a Yellowstone park trip in June, before the mountains have had time to wake from their winter sleep to shake the snowjewels away. And if you want some action thrills with your surprises, go in the eastern or Cody gateway-because that is the Sylvan pass route, the route where the glistening Easter finery of the forests and high meadows lasts longest.

Yellowstone park opens annually on the twentieth of June. It offers a hundred different charms, in such profusion that to pick a weakness among them seems almost sacrilege: and yet there are one or two such weaknesses, if we may borrow the viewpoints of the average American who makes a hurried rail or motor pilgrimage to the garden where Mother Nature, on viewing her completed work, must surely have exclaimed "Hot Stuff!" in supreme satisfaction.

The average American who goes sightseeing in the national parks is on a brief, usually an all too brief, vacation from two environments: work, and summer heat. The trip alone is a wonderful antidote for work; but the psychological opposite of heat, of course, is ice and snow. And whatever else Yellowstone may and does offer, its July and August snow displays are a bit meager.

But to the traveler who slyly sails westward when his calendar reads 'June Two-Thirds," there is an amazingly different story revealed. Sylvan pass, which became the eastern boundary of the park last year in a revision which gave the reservation a completely new profile on the map, is still dreaming of Santa Claus and his reindeer; and your big bus, to reach the mountaintop gateway, must wiggle eel-like through rod after rod of squirming snow tunnel. Or if you're driving your own car, be sure not to have a flat, because it might be three weeks before you could drive off the road and repair it!

1. The Prophetic View of the Course of Time from Christ's Crucifixion to His Second Coming. (24:1-51). The order of events in this time are

in general as follows: 1. The moral condition of the world during Christ's absence. (vv. 1-14). This is the period covered by the

parables of chapter 13. 2. The appearance of the Antichrist (vv. 15-26).

3. The great advent (vv. 27-31). In connection with this advent there will be mighty convulsions of nature, the mourning of the tribes of the earth, and the gathering of the elect. Warnings to God's people in view of the great advent (vv. 32-51). The time of this advent is unknown and on the part of many unexpected. 5. Instruction to believers in view of the unexpectedness of Christ's coming (25:1-30).

II. Behavior of Believers in View of the Coming of the Lord (25:1-13). The teaching in the parable of the ten virgins has continuous application in the present time (I Thess. 16:18; Titus 2:11-13).

1. The equipment of the virgins

(1) The foolish virgins took lamps, but no oil with them (v. 3). Lamps signify Christian profession / (Matt. 5:16) and oil the Holy Spirit (Zech. 14). Having lamps but no oil shows that they were professors of religion, without possessing its reality. The Christian life is sustained by the Holy Spirit. As soon as a man is regenerated, the Holy Spirit takes up His abode with him. The Spirit's indwelling therefore, is an advance work upon regeneration. > (1) The midnight cry (v. 6). In the midst of the night when all the virgins were asleep the cry was heard, "Behold the bridegroom cometh." Who knows but that the time of this cry is now close upon us? (2) Activity of the virgins (v. 7). They all arose and trimmed their lamps. There will be great activity when the Lord comes on the part of both believers and those who only make a profession. It will be a day when the reality of one's faith will be tested. (3) The foolish virgins' request of the wise to share their oil (vv. 8, 9). The revelation of Christ will make manifest the genuineness of our faith and expose the folly of mere profession. When the Lord comes, it will be too late to mend one's ways. (4) The wise enter to the marriage (v. 10). While the foolish were seeking to amend their ways-trying to buy oil-the bridegroom came, and those who were ready were admitted to the marriage. (5) The pitiful petition of the foolish virgins (v. 11). They begged the Lord to open the door. (6). The awful judgment (v. 12). The Lord

> declared, "I know you not." 3. The solemn obligation (v. 13). "Watch, for ye know not the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh." Two solemn facts should engage the attention of every one. (1) Entering with Christ to the marriage depends upon faithfulness to the end. If oil and light be wanting when Christ comes, no admittance will be granted to the heavenly banquet. (2) Borrowed religion will not avail at that day. Despite the value of godly companions and associates, they can render no service in the day of Jesus Christ. Personal contact with the Lord Jesus through faith in His blood is the absolute essential.
