

EW WATER SOURCE FOR THIRSTY LAND-Water discovered last April under a valley in Culberson county south of Van Horn, Tex., had led to irrigation and cotton farming on a large scale. Irrigation ditches and lines are shown above. Literally scores of wells have been completed. Water is 90 feet from the surface and goes to a depth of 375 feet in the huge sub-soil reservoir. Wells pump from 1,500 to 1,800 gallons per minute and irrigate an average of 300 acres each. Culberson county was the last of Texas' 254 counties to grow cotton. This was made possible by the new water supply.

Texas Mental Hospital Low Pay Scales Have Caused Them To Be Seriously Understaffed

Low pay for long hours of hard distasteful work keeps Texas mental hospitals seriously under

Texas newspapermen, on their recent tour of the mental institutions, got figures to this effect from hospital officials. They saw the facts for themselves The newsmen visited 913-pat-

ient ward in San Antonio, cared for by one attending physician. They saw women attendants doing the work of registered nurses for \$80 a month.

The newsmen talked to men ttendants who work 72 hours a eek for the same \$80 wage. "How on earth can we attract nyone when other hospitals pay hree times as much," exclaimed Dr. T. A. Hanretta, superintenent of the Austin State Hospital Most doctors in the State sysom are paid \$425 a month. Some eccive as low as \$325, and the op salary is \$500.

The Austin hospital houses 3,200 patients. According to minimum standards of the American Psychiatric Association, the institution should have 30 doctors and 133 registered nurses. It has 10 doctors and 4 nurses.

The shortage of doctors and nurses was prevalent in every institution the tour covered. Dr. R. C. Rowell, superinten dent of the Abilene hospital for

epileptics, says he needs 8 doctors nstead of 4. 12 nurses instead Dr. A. D. Patillo's 2,000 patients at Terrell have no registered nurses and only eight doctors.



He says that fruit plantings should be located on deep, sandy soil, which has the capacity fo releasing a greater percentage of moisture than do the heavier soils. Sandy soils also allow the roots to penetrate a larger area for moisture. Spacing the trees to give more room will help in

The Sand cherry-plum hybrids bloom late and usually escape the late spring frosts. The recommended varieties include Sapa Opata and Compass. The fruit is small and is used chiefly for preserving and canning. Trees are usual and are generally regarded as rather short-lived. They come into bearing at an early age and

produce well Sour cheeries grow and produce well, but birds usually get most of the fruit. Good varieties are Early Richmond, Montmorency and Dyehouse. Figs can be grown for home use but should be irrigated. Ramsey or Ever-

bearing is the best variety tried. Eleven varieties of peaches have been tested. None was found to be a consistent bearer because of the late spring freez es. Elberta (yellow free) and Mamie Ross (semicling white) have made the best record of those tried. The Douglas pear is the only one recommneded for that

Jujubes or Chinese date is a fruit that rarely misses a good crop, although the fruit has limited use. Keating says the grafted varieties of Lang, Li and Suimen are among the best yielders and one or two trees might be

worth a trial. Grapes top the list of all the fruits tried. They are consistent producers, are adapted to dryland culture and they bloom late Forty-one varieties have been tested and the following are recommended by Keating: Lenoir, Extra, Beacon, Armalaga Manito, Herbemont, Black Muscat and Golden Muscat. Grapes require some care. They should be trellised and special pruning is necessary for the best production. They should be cultivated to control the weeds and occasionally may need to be sprayed for controlling the leaf hop-

Keating suggests that if you are interested in starting a home orchard that you visit your local county agent or home demonstration agent for more information on the subject. They'll be glad to assist you.


