THE GODMAN IN TIME

The life of the Eternal Son among men is marked by three distinct stages, the Incarnation, the Crucifixion, and the Resurrection. Each of these great facts has its appropriate symbol.

The Star of Hope, the herald of the advent, guided the wise men of old in their search for the new born king, of the Jews, the prince of glory. And the expectant shepherds as they beheld the star, rejoiced while the angels sang, "Glory to God in the highest, peace on earth good will to men."

The cross is the symbol of the crucifixion. "And I, if I be lifted up will draw all men unto me," was the declaration of the Son of man to his followers, and his calmness before Pilate and the fortitude on the cruel cross, led the open minded Roman Centurion to testify, "Surely this was the Son of God." By this sign conquer, may well constitute the slogan and furnish the suggestion for the flag, of the conquering host of Christ's followers.
