





WOOL NOTES

A pair of woolen mittens in use 44 years holds what is believed to be the world's record for wearing quality, according to Ripley's famous "Believe It or Not" column.

Optimism in the future for better wool prices is viewed in the opinion of Textile Apparel Analysis, which declares that "wool prices will, the bureau believes, average somewhat higher in 1932 than in 1931."

United States consumption of wool, exclusive of carpet wool, for the first eleven months of 1931 totaled 386,990,000 pounds, or 67,380,000 pounds more than for the first eleven months of 1930, according to figures compiled by the National Wool corporation.

Consumption for November, 1931, totaled 29,354,000 pounds of wool, exclusive of carpet wool, or 4,570,000 pounds more than for the same month a year ago.

The Southwest Texas Wool and Mohair Marketing corporation of Del Rio wished a Merry Christmas to its friends with wool neckties for the holiday season, and reminded recipients of a new fashion creation that "the next tie you buy should be made of wool" in its attached greeting card.

"With respect to the 1931 wool, we are pleased to say that over three-fourths of our 1931 wools are sold at very satisfactory prices," reports R. E. Jones, manager of the Minnesota Cooperative Wool Growers association.

"Consumption of domestic wool in the four years of 1928-1931 showed an increase over the previous four years of more than 200,000,000 in the grease," says the Boston Transcript, wool authority.

### ON TEXAS FARMS

Many Texas farmers have out-witted cash grain markets to maintain the 1929 level of prices. It has been done by selling feed in the form of livestock. Texas is dotted with demonstrations of this sort, from the reports of which might be mentioned that of Tom Roden in Lamar county. Last spring he fed out 10 shotes to receive \$1.12 per bushel for his corn, and this fall he reckoned a return of 99 1-2 cents per bushel for corn fed to eight pigs run on sweet clover pasture and getting four gallons daily of skim milk.

During November in Coryell county four dairy herd demonstrators figured a price of 45 cents per bushel for oats and 76 cents per bushel for corn fed to dairy cows. It represented \$29.65 more than they could have obtained for the grain on the local cash market.

Corn brought \$1.12 per bushel and oats 50 cents to Irvin Ellibracht of Mason by feeding same to 12 calves on creep feeders since July 20th.

Corn and hegari fed to eight pigs in a dry lot of self-feeder brought \$1.64 per hundred to Robert Rogers, Wharton county 4-H club boy. The grain was balanced with a protein supplement consisting of rice polish, cottonseed meal and tankage.

Haskell county poultry demonstrators working with the home demonstration agent made 17 cents more profit per hen in the year ending October 31st than in the previous year, although egg prices were much lower in 1931. The same old story explains: lowered production cost due to home-raised feed, home-mixed mash and skim milk, and increased production per hen.

A garden that paid the farm taxes by keeping the grocery bill for a family of five down to \$16 for four months is reported by Mrs. A. C. Voyles of Delta county.

### Texas Overlooking Industrial Profits Engineer Declares

That Texas, with her wonderful natural resources, large population, wealth and adequate markets for commercial development is overlooking an opportunity to profit in allowing her raw materials to be shipped to other states for fabrication and then purchasing them in manufactured form on their return, is the opinion of Dr. Henry Mace Payne, consulting engineer of the American Mining Congress, in discussion of the greater commercial development of the State and its possibilities.

"Texas can produce all the fruit and vegetables she needs," Dr. Payne pointed out, "yet she annually imports \$50,000,000 worth from California."

"Texas produces more cotton than any other State, yet she has only 5,700 mill operatives and buys most of her cotton clothing goods from other States."

"Texas produces more leather than any other State, yet it buys annually \$55,000,000 worth of shoes made elsewhere."

"Texas produces more wool and mohair than any other State, but she has not a single wool or mohair factory."

"Texas has an abundance of fire-proofing materials, yet frame buildings subject to loss thru fire and burdened with high repair, depreciation and insurance charges predominate almost universally over the State."

Stocks in Texas grocery stores prove that Texas produces only her own meats, wheat and rice, Dr. Payne went on to say, adding that it does not even produce all of its meat, having to import pork and pork products in large volume.

Dr. Payne urges a study by Texans to determine the quantity of goods economically available for

Pointing out the value of attracting factories to Texas, Dr. Payne showed the value of the pay roll by stating that one-half of every pay roll is spent in the retail stores of the town where the pay roll is provided and that the retail dollar in this country turns over five times in a year.

"Thus a monthly pay roll of \$1,000 means \$30,000 worth of goods sold in the retail stores of the town which would not otherwise be sold except for the industry maintaining that pay roll," concluded Dr. Payne.
