

# **DRIVERS MUST** HAVE LICENSE

**ALL TRUCK** 

State Highway Patrolmen **Explains Legal** Demands

## All Paid Drivers

Only One Exemption For Drivers According to New Law

All truck drivers being paid for riving a truck must have a chaufeur's license, regardless of capacity of the truck, according to informaion being given out this week by tate Highway Patrolmen. This ffect August 22, 1931.

House Bill 336 stated that "It of Texas indedpendence. shall be unlawful for any person to operate or to permit to be operated any commercial motor vehicle of one ton or greater carrying capacity without first having obtained a chauffer's license as provided in Article 6687."

Article 6687 defines a chauffer s "one whose business or occupation is operating a motor vehicle himself, provided the truck is regis- kley. tered for one ton or less carrying The ranch, which is about 7 secrying capacity of more than one section of the country. ton he will then need a chauffeur's

The license cost \$3 per year or for any part of a year in which they are purchased. To obtain a license, a chauffer must be at least 18 years of age, and have sworn statements as to his ability, and whether or not he is a user of drugs or liquor.



Many Texas farmers have outwitted cash grain markets to maintain the 1929 level of prices. It has been done by selling feed in the form of livestock. Texas is dotted with demonstrations of this sort, from the reports of which might be mentioned that of Tom Roden in Lamar county. Last spring he fed out 10 shotes to receive \$1.12 per bushel for his corn, and this fall he reckoned a return of 99 1-2 cents per bushel for corn fed to eight pigs run on sweet clover pasture possibilities. and getting four gallons daily of skim milk.

During November in Coryell county four dairy herd demonstrators figured a price of 45 cents per bushel for oats and 76 cents per bushel for corn fed to dairy cows. may prove an important contender at It represented \$29.65 more than they could have obtained for the grain on the local cash market.
