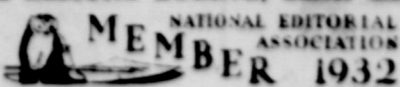

ON TEXAS FARMS

In spite of loss of a good tomato market this year, J. T. Youngblood in Upshur county declares he will stay with the crop another year because he has made more than \$30 per acre from three acres with the crop half picked.

Because nine Wharton county 4-H club boys made an average of 49 bushels of corn per acre last year, compared to a county average of 29 bushels, there are 37 farm boys growing corn this year under county agent direction.

Karl Miller of San Benito got a 15 per cent increase in Irish potato yields this year from land on which legumes were turned under last season. Up to July 1st 3243 acres of land to be planted to soil building legumes had been reported to the county agent.

A total of 12,592 containers of food have been canned in the community kitchen in Georgetown since its establishment a year ago by a civic organization in cooperation with the home demonstration agent.

Average grocery bills of \$3.77 per family are reported for May by 57 Robertson county home demonstration club women who are leading the way in demonstrations of wise living at home.

From a profit of \$3.63 and 55 frisers still on the yard, Betty Lee Bracher, Dawson county 4-H club girl is paying for her music lessons. She hatched 100 chicks in April.

H. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows: "Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of the State, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise extending credit, or expanding money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

H. J. R. No. 6. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows: Article VIII—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes; nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivision now receiving any remission of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

H. J. R. No. 21. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

S. J. R. No. 28. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows: "Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas. That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

S. J. R. No. 30. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the Legislature, No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 44th Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made or hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other State of Texas, or from any other source, except shall constitute and become a permanent University Fund, and the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of municipalities, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided, that the one-tenth of the alternate Section of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in, or constitute a part of, the Permanent University Fund."

H. J. R. No. 24. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which the taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis: (1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) per cent of the aggregate total; (2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding fifty (50%) per cent of the aggregate total."

H. J. R. No. 5. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such works and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred unless in any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

H. J. R. No. 1. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas should be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit: First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age. Second: Idiots and lunatics. Third: All paupers supported by any county. Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exception as the Legislature may make. Fifth: All soldiers, marines and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Section 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Section 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election; General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

H. J. R. No. 2. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such works and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred unless in any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932. (A correct copy.)



RECIPES AND MENUS

DENTON, Aug. 18.—Company suppers in the summer can be quite the most delightful form of informal entertainment to the hostess who plans her meal and prepares it without worry or bother. In order to accomplish this plan, she must choose those foods which are easily prepared in advance and served at the most convenient hour.

MENUS

Breakfast: Canteloupe, creamed dried beef on toast or white potatoes boiled, coffee, milk.
Dinner: Roast beef with browned potatoes, green corn on the cob. (Add 1 c milk to water in which corn is cooked.) Cabbage slaw, with boiled dressing, bread and butter.

Company Supper: Melon cup (watermelon and canteloupe balls), boiled tongue, cold sliced; asparagus cream glaze; hot rolls and lettuce salad; green tomato pickles; peaches served with sponge cake and whipped cream.

Breakfast: Sliced peaches with whole milk; bran muffins, grape jelly, poached eggs, coffee.

Dinner: Baked potatoes, meat balls, creamed carrots, emergency biscuits, wilted lettuce, grape fruit salad.

Supper: Sandwiches, (peanut butter); lettuce, sliced tomatoes, iced tea (lemon.)

RECIPES

Green Tomato Pickles: 7 lbs. tomatoes sliced 3-4 inch thick; let stand in salt water 24 hours; drain and put into a kettle with 3 lbs. brown sugar; 1 qt. cider vinegar; 2 oz. stick cinnamon; 1-2 oz. whole cloves. Boil until tomatoes are tender; test by piercing with tooth pick or clean straw. Fill into fruit jars while hot.

Asparagus Cream Glaze: Empty canned asparagus into colander and rinse. Reserve a few tips for garnish. Measure into a sauce pan; add 2 slices onion, a clove pressed into each slice; 2 slices carrot, parsley; 1-2 t sweet herbs and spices (in

a bag); 1-2 c water and simmer slowly until water is evaporated. Remove seasonings and press asparagus through a sieve. Into the puree (1 c) put 1-2 t salt, 1-2 t paprika, 1-2 T lemon juice. Chill in icebox. Beat 1 c cream until firm and fold into puree. Turn into melon mold lined with paper and pack in ice to freeze or put into tray of electric refrigerator. Serve on platter with lettuce and tips marinated. Use as separate course or an entree with meat.

Individual Spong Cakes: 4 eggs; 7-8 c sugar; 1 t lemon juice; grated rind of 1-2 lemon; 1-2 t salt; 1 c flour. Separate the eggs and beat whites and yolks thoroughly. Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add one half the sugar gradually to beaten yolks; then add the flavoring and other liquid that the recipe may call for. Beat mixture well. Add salt to egg whites and beat until whites are stiff and add 1-2 sugar. Sift flour several times. Pour egg whites over yolks, sift flour over this and mix a little at a time. Mix by folding the ingredients. Put into an unbuttered muffin pan and bake in a moderate oven 25-30 minutes. Place a pan of boiling water under the cake during baking. The oven door should not be opened during the first 10 minutes.



STERLING ENDORSED BY B. OF L. F. & E. FOR UNION RECORD

DALLAS.—Full indorsement of Governor Ross Sterling for his friendly record toward union labor has been accorded the governor by I. B. Arnold of Houston, Chairman of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, it was announced today at Sterling headquarters here.

The endorsement took the form of a letter from Arnold to all members of the union in Texas urging members of the railroad union to support and vote for Governor Sterling in the runoff primary election. The letter, in part said:

"R. S. Sterling was Chairman of the Board of Control of the Port Terminal Railway in Houston at the time the railroad was put in operation, July 1924. We employees were refused the right to organize on the property by the railroad officials. Our chairman, M. S. Jennings, handled this matter with Mr. Sterling and through Mr. Sterling we were allowed to organize and were given a standard contract signed by Mr. Sterling himself.

"Later we had some trouble with violations of our contract and were refused any back pay for the 1927 award. At that time the writer was elected Chairman and called on Mr. Sterling about the matter. He immediately stopped the working agreement violations and ordered the railroads to pay back wages due on our men.

"We railroad men who know the governor" the letter concluded, "and his excellent labor record are going to support him in the runoff, and in view of the above facts we are asking you to vote for Governor Sterling in the second primary and to make these facts generally known at every opportunity.

The letter was signed by Arnold and made available to Sterling headquarters without solicitation by the Sterling campaign forces.
