AIRSHIP AKRON CRASHES OFF

In Waters Of Atlantic

In a blinding electrical storm, the Cleave Hamilton. Akron, mightiest dirigible ever to cruise the skies, crashed at sea off the Jersey coast early Tuesday Funeral Services morning and all hope has waned for 71 missing members of the crew.

Of the 76 men aboard the "mistress of the skies" as she crashed, four were rescuted, but one died before he was brought ashore.

Last May when the huge dirigible was enroute to California the deciding to break through the storm. mountains.

At that time, Commander Rosendahl, who was one of the few Survivors of the Shenandoah disaster, termed the conditions encountered in Texas the most severe ever experienced successfully by a rigid dirigible airship.


