It is a common mistain for some advertisers to think that they can turn advertising on and off, like water from a faucet, and expect it to become immediately effective whenever they are prepared to recume operations. Advertising does not work that way. Temporary conditions should not influence us to make too serious inroads on the program of advertising, which can be wisely conceived only on a long term basts.-Francis H. Until we learned better, we used to mix wood and steel in our car bodies and wheels.

It was the best way to make bodies -- then. But the state of the art

has advanced. Of course, it is more expensive to make an all-steel body than to make a wooden frame and nail steel panels on to it. The all-steel body is more expensive -- to us, but not to you.

By all odds, then, steel bodies seem preferable. Wheels also have become all-steel. No one argues that an electrically welded one-piece steel wheel, such as the Ford wheel, needs to be


