Not practical, no business ability-a dreamer. Ocasionally we hear someone thus characterized by matter-of-fact business executives. The writer has always been interested in and partial to dreamers nevertheless. Possibly because he, too, is a dreamer.

Most dreamers are, it seems, happy possessors of philosophic analytic minds. They calmly watch, as from afar, the mad rush of the mob in its ceaseless efforts to acquire wealth, power and the pleasures of life.
