

Facts About The New Chlorinator And The Sanderson Water Supply

Several persons have questioned us recently about the new chlorinator, which was recently installed for treating the Sanderson water supply.

This chiorinator was installed at the request of the State Health Department, when one of the periodic tests, made by the Department, indicated a slight doubt as to the purity of the local water supply. Although the condition was not regarded as dangerous, it was deemed best to install the chlorinator in order to avoid any possibility of contamination.

Since the equipment was put into service, tests made by the State Health Department have received the highest rating, which means that Sanderson water is absolutely safe and pure, beyond the shadow of a doubt.

The amount of chlorine applied is so small that, under normal conditions, the water should have no chemical taste. Regular tests are made to insure that exactly the right amount-neither too much nor too little-is used.
