DO YOU BOYCOTT TEXAS?

Several years ago a distinguished citizen of Fort Worth, a leader of that community and one of its most aggressive builders, was advised by his physician to go to certain watering places in Germany in order to obtain relief from a malady from which he was suffering. He did so, but with unsatisfactory results.

For some time the editor of The Texas Weekly has been collecting stories of incidents like that, and he now has a surprising number of them. All of them are of incidents in which Texans have taken it for granted that something outside of Texas was necessarily better than something within the State, and have failed to recognize the merit or value of something within the State.

Now, nobody can accuse us justly of being provincial or of desiring to build a wall around Texas. Just as we have aggressively opposed such movements as that embodied in the slogan "Buy American", we have also opposed the idea that Texans should buy Texas goods to the exclusion of all other goods merely because they are made in Texas.

The Livestock Situation

J. A. McNAUGHTON

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 26, 1933.—At the most representative gathering of stockmen held in many years, members of the United States Livestock Association, at a recent meeting in Chicago, declared the present condition in the livestock world an acute emergency and called upon government officials for immediate action.

The following recommendations were made to the Secretary of Agriculture:

(1) Prompt and effective action upon the Corn-Hog program, but on a graduated basis in order not to discourage consumption of pork products;

(2) Use of public funds to purchase beef products to be disposed of through non-competitive channels and in case of necessity of tax levy on beef or mutton that the funds so collected be used for no other purpose than to merchandise surplus products through non-competitive channels.

(3) That unless favorable reciprocal trade agreements can be made with other countries and areas of which competitive products such as vegetable oils, fats, hides and black-strap molasses are imported that further restrictions be increased by import duties or taxes on the articles mentioned;

(4) Inasmuch as beef importations during 1933 were 83 per cent more than in 1932 that we immediately stop the importation of all canned beef and that the Federal Government require the use of American livestock by all Federal agencies;

(5) Build up greater consumption of meat through Cooking Schools and other available means;

(6) Reduce the spread between the amount the grower receives and the amount paid by the consumer;

(7) That open competitive channels for the sale of meat food animals be served and maintained and that action be taken to place country buying on the same basis of Government supervision as now applies to Central Market operations thus establishing a uniform basis for the purchase of raw material manifestly of great importance to the grower;

(8) Orderly marketing of livestock to be worked out by men of ability and practical experience;

(9) The emergency campaign to finish testing all dairy and breeding cattle for tuberculosis including also abortion test, with equitable indemnities;

(10) Immediate announcement of National monetary policy;

(11) Pointing out that within the last thirty days meat prices increased to consumers from 10 per cent to

Facts About The New Chlorinator And The Sanderson Water Supply

Several persons have questioned us recently about the new chlorinator, which was recently installed for treating the Sanderson water supply.

This chlorinator was installed at the request of the State Health Department, when one of the periodic tests, made by the Department, indicated a slight doubt as to the purity of the local water supply. Although the condition was not regarded as dangerous, it was deemed best to install the chlorinator in order to avoid any possibility of contamination.

Since the equipment was put into service, tests made by the State Health Department have received the highest rating, which means that Sanderson water is absolutely safe and pure, beyond the shadow of a doubt.

The amount of chlorine applied is so small that, under normal conditions, the water should have no chemical taste. Regular tests are made to insure that exactly the right amount—neither too much nor too little—is used. Even though a little too much were added, however, there would be no effect other than a bad taste. The chlorine treatment is used by a large percentage of water companies in the United States and exhaustive tests have proven that it has no ill effect upon the human system.

The installation and operation of the chlorinator is costing the TEXAS-LOUISIANA POWER COMPANY considerable money, but does not add one cent to our revenues. The added expense is gladly borne in order to protect the health and well being of our customers.
