ON TEXAS FARMS

By W. H. DARROW Extension Service Lator

For dressing well a whole year on \$17.35, Mrs. O. L. Howard, wardrobe demonstrator for Oak Home Demonstration Club in Ellis county. gives credit to careful planning and the use of a foundation pattern.

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The cost of insuring a steady milk flow from his dairy cows was \$1.02 per ton for 80 tons of seeded ribbon cane buried in a trench silo, Dr. J. G. Daniels, dairy demonstrator at Gilmer, has reported to the county agent. "My two trench silos are worth more than any other improvements on my farm." he says.

To improve the quality of sheep, goats and poultry, and to wage active warfare against predatory animals and thieves which prey upon this class of stock, 47 Brown county farmers and ranchers have organized a sheep, goat and poultry improvement association. A government trapper has been hired and rewards will be offered for arrest and convicition of thieves, the county agent reports.

Sheep have paid for a nine-room two-story brick house on the farm of O. A. Peterson in Denton county, without interfering, he says, with his other farm activities. Sheep have kept down the weeds on the 528-acre farm, and greatly improved the pastures.

After raising a garden and canning 247 quarts of vegetables, besides helping three neighbors with their canning, Pearl Lee, Haskell county 4-H club girl. finds that she has produced \$69 worth of food. "But it would have cost lots more than that if we had bought it," she adds.

Geo. Baker is moving his livestock from Pumpville to the Walter Stansell ranch in the south part of the county.
