January collections of State and County taxes showed considerable incrase over a year ago according to reports from the office of Lee A. Cook, Sheriff and Tax Collector.

There was also an increase in the number of poll tax receipts issued for this year. The total number of poll tax receipts issued for this year were 756 against a total of 506 for ast year. This is, according to the records, the highest number of poll receipts to be issued in the county. Two years ago a total of 732 receipts were issued.

The State tax collected during January amounted to \$17,194,02, while the amount of taxes collected for the County was \$25,588.33. Of the total county tax, the school will receive a sum of \$14,082.14.

The records of the collector also reveal that up to February 1, 330 passenger cars, 68 farm trucks and 76 commercial trucks were register-




