## PIONEER TEXAN PASSES AWAY ON WEDNESDAY

### Mrs. Quinna A. Green Dies At Home Of Daughter

Mrs. Quinna A. Green, 85, mother of Mrs. R. E. Fred of this city, passed away here Wednesday night at 10 o'clock at the home of Mrs. Fred's following an illness of several months duration.

Mrs. Green, a native and pioneer Texan, was born November 14, 1849 near the town of Brenham, Washington County. She lived on the frontier during the war and Indian days and most of her early life was spent at Johnson City, Blanco County. Her maiden name was Quinna Arabella Harrington. On November 14, 1867 she was united in marriage to John Green, they making their home in Johnson City. Mrs. Green was a devoted mother, a good christian woman, being a member of the Baptist church for 65 years or more.

Survivors include: two daughters, Mrs. Alice V. Kane of Pumpville, and Mrs. R. E. Fred of this city; two sons, J. W. Green, Edna, Texas; R. L. Green, Johnson City, Texas; and 7 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren. She is also survived by 2 sisters, Mrs. V. F. Smith, Johnson City; Mrs. Priscilla Harden, Clarendon; and 6 brothers, E. D. and J. W. Harrington, Pantanna, Arizona; V. P. and T. C. Harrington of Albuquerque, N. M.; D. E. Harrington of San Diego, Calif.; and Tom Harrington of Silver City, New Mexico.

The remains, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Fred, Mrs. Alice V. Kane and Mrs. Ernest Jessup and children left here early this morning, going overland to Johnson City where the funeral will be held. The Doran Funeral Home, of Del Rio, had charge of the remains.

Funeral services for Mrs. Green are planned for Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the home of her son, R. L. Green. Rev. J. C. Dodgen Baptist minister of that city, and a life long friend of the deceased will hold the services. Interment will be in the Johnson City cemetery.

## MEXICO ORDERS RADIO STATION XER FROM AIR

### Villa Acuna Station Is Closed On Last Saturday

The Mexican radio station XER of Dr. John R. Brinkley, which is located in Villa Acuna, Mexico, just across the border from Del Rio, was closed last Friday night on orders of the Mexican government.

The station, a 150,000 watt, was erected in 1931 by Dr. Brinkley, who moved to Del Rio from Milford, Kansas.

Officials of the company stated that the troops forcibly closed the station in face of an injunction handed down by the Supreme Court of Mexico.

Associated press reports reaching Del Rio Monday stated that two engineers were enroute to Villa Acuna from Mexico City to supervise the dismantling of the radio station.

When informed of the plans of the Mexican government to dismantle the station Dr. J. R. Brinkley made the following statement: "If the Mexican government dismantles the station the government will be violating its own contract with the broadcast company."

## Dove Hunting Season Changed in South Zone

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 26.—The Senate Friday finally passed the House bill fixing the same open season for hunting doves and quail in the South zone, from Nov. 15 to Jan. 16, inclusive, except in the white wing zone where it shall be the same, from Aug. 20 to Oct. 31.

Formerly the open season on doves was during October and November in the South zone, while on quail it was from Dec. 1 to Jan. 16. No change is made in the North zone.

Final passage was also given the House bill imposing a five-year closed season on wild fox in Titus and Morris counties.

## DISTRICT CAGE TOURNEY HELD AT STOCKTON

### Sanderson Is Consolation Winner Of The District

The district tournament for the newly-organized district 30, held at Fort Stockton February 23 - 24, brought to a close the most successful basketball season that the Sanderson Eagles have had since 1927, when Coach J. A. White and his quintet, captioned by Walter Grigsby, won the district and bi-district championships. The 1934 Eagles, playing without Newton, who is considered one of the best forwards in this district, lost to the ultimate district champion when defeated by Presidio 19-18, but came back to take the consolation final from Barstow 24-20, after "Chick" LeCroy's team had led 14-3 early in the third quarter.

In the opening game of the tournament, Presidio led Sanderson 18-8 at the half, but scored only one point in the last half while Sanderson played inspired ball in a rally that had Presidio all but helpless in the closing minutes of play. Sanderson was under their own goal trying desperately for the basket when the whistle ended the game with Presidio leading 19-18. Presidio went on to defeat Fort Stockton and Ozona, thereby whipping the three strongest teams in the district to win the coveted crown of District Champ.

Barstow, defeated by Ozona in the first round, went into consolation finals against Sanderson. The Eagles played a ragged game the first half, reaching the intermission on the short end of a 11-3 count. Barstow, appearing confident of victory, added three points to make the score 14-3 before the Eagle's offense began to click. Litton fouled out, Sullivan went in at guard, while Halley took forward. By their hustling and continual chatter, Sullivan and Falcon, ordinarily a pair of quiet lads, brought cheer to the hearts of the tiring team, and started a rally that tied the score in the last quarter, as both teams strove to break the dead-lock or regain a lost lead. With less than one minute to go, Sanderson leading 22-20, Mussey cut loose with a one-hand circus shot that put the game on ice. Score: 24-20.

Fort Stockton is to be congratulated on the way it conducted its first district tournament. Trophies for winner, runner-up, and consolation winner and gold basketballs for individuals chosen on the all-tournament team, were awarded. Visitors during the tournament will no doubt look forward to the district meet to be held there in April.

ON TEXAS FARMS

A total of 1019 wheat benefit checks, amounting to 97 per cent of all such checks due on the first payment, have been received by Carson county farmers. The checks received total \$257,718.46.

Six steam pressure canners owned by Stephens county were used by 28 families in January for canning meat. A total of 450 beehives have been canned on farms this year, the home demonstration agent says.

The Government reduction program is resulting in more legumes in Hays county. Of six new pasture demonstrations started by the county agent in January, five are in alfalfa.

To use land retired from cotton to good advantage, 2000 berry vines have been supplied 30 home demonstration club women in 16 Matagorda county communities. These women are to demonstrate how a fruit supply may be produced at home.

Poultry flocks in good houses paid two Bastrop county poultry flock demonstrators \$33.90 more in November than three flocks not well housed, county agent records show.

Clothing accounts are being kept by 200 Navarro county 4-H club girls this year.

W. P. Allen, prominent Terrell banker, says the cotton program of the Government is the greatest thing to help farmers' prices since he has been in banking. "More debts paid, more money in the bank, more taxes paid—I'm 100 per cent for the program", he declares.

TO MAKE the Every Member Canvass effective, the envelope system should be adopted by the church officers and practiced by all the members of the congregation.

GIVING is an important feature in our worship. The use of the envelope which aids in regular weekly giving, enhances the part that our giving plays in the worship service.

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM aids the treasurer in keeping his accounts straight with every member of the congregation. It enables him to know week by week who are practicing the grace of giving and keeping up their pledges.

THE INDIVIDUAL MEMBER also has a handy method of keeping his own account with the church correct. Where money is not in hand week by week, the adoption of the Lord's Acre Plan and the use of the Pay in Kind receipts put in the envelopes each Sunday, automatically entitles the contributor to a place on the Stewardship Honor Roll.

TO BE ELIGIBLE to a place on the Stewardship Honor Roll each month one must have contributed every Sunday in the month in the envelope. To be on the Annual Honor Roll, a contribution, no matter how small, must be made in the church envelopes every Sunday in the year. The roll may be placed on the bulletin board or published in some other way.

### Governor Studies Over Mass Of Legislation

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 28. (AP)—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson and her husband-advisor studied today over the mass of legislation sent to the executive offices in the closing hours of a special session.

The session adjourned at 2:55 a. m., after a 30-day meeting.

No indication was available when the governor would act on bills to authorize more bonds to carry on relief work and to extend a moratorium to financially embarrassed property owners threatened with loss of their holdings through forced sale. These were the two main subjects submitted by Governor Ferguson in calling the legislature. Both would become operative on her approval.

The moratorium bill was passed finally at 1 a. m., one hour past the time for sine die adjournment under the constitution. Legislative clocks, however, had been turned back to permit the Legislature to conclude its work.

In addition to the bond and moratorium bills other legislation of importance also was before the governor. She has 10 days in which to sign, veto or allow the bills to become law without her signature.

One was to give the Texas railroad commission additional powers to regulate oil refineries. The commission would be given authority to investigate the books, records, tanks and other operations of refineries to determine if its orders governing oil production were being violated.

Another bill would increase the tax on oil producers from one-tenth to one-eighth of one cent per barrel to provide for employment of more oil proration enforcement officers.

Officials of the Texas bond commission, agency designated to sell the relief bonds, were awaiting action by the governor on the bond bill. It was planned to advertise the bonds for sale as quickly as possible because relief funds now on hand, derived from sale of a \$2,750,000 issue voted last fall, are near exhaustion.

The Legislature voted to issue \$3,000,000 in new bonds and to reissue \$2,750,000 of a previous issue on which no bids were received.

Relief officials hoped the increase in interest to 4 1/2 per cent and removal of the prohibition against investment of funds of state institutions in the securities would be an inducement to quick sale of the bonds. The first issue bore 4 per cent interest.

The moratorium against real estate foreclosures in worthy instances would be effective until Feb. 1, 1935. Terms of the bill could be extended at the regular session of the Legislature which will meet next January. Only property owners who had substantial equities in their properties could come under the proposed act. Creation of a commission to plan

for a Texas centennial observance in 1936 also was before the governor. An appropriation of \$100,000 was voted to pay expenses of the commission.

Much Legislation died on the calendars and in committees of both houses, including bills to levy a tax on chain stores, to release penalties and interest on delinquent taxes and to make supplemental appropriations for several state departments.

Rumors that another special session would be called immediately were dissipated with final action on the bond and moratorium bills.

The Senate elected Senator Margie E. Neal of Carthage, president pro tem to serve until the next session. She is the only woman ever elected to the State Senate.
