## C. W. A. TO END SATURDAY; STATE RELIEF FUNDS WILL BE EMPLOYED TO HELP NEEDY

L. A. Lowe, administrator for Terrell County Relief Board, received word Thursday morning to terminate CWA relief work in this County on that date. In the future a State relief program on a budgetary basis, will replace the CWA work.

It will be April 16th, at least, before the State program will be started, Mr. Lowe was informed. Any program will be one of relief and not employment. Only those cases of proven need will receive direct relief.

There will be no change in administration set up for this County and the present board, as far as could be learned, will carry on the State relief.

This week there has only been a crew of 25 men, which has been the County's quota for the past several weeks, working. The men have been working on the sanitation program and doing some road work on the county road south of town.

### Alfred E. Creigh, Jr., Seeks Re-election As County Attorney

In the announcement column of the Times this week will be found the name of A. E. Creigh, Jr., present County Attorney, who is seeking re-election to that office subject to the November election.

## FOUR BAGS OF MOHAIR STOLEN AT SPOFFORD

Officers Are Watching For Thieves, Sacks Weigh 350-375 Pounds

DEL RIO, March 28.—Four bags of mohair were reported stolen from the Petersen warehouse at Spofford in a telephone call Wednesday to Sheriff A. E. Steinmetz.

Officials at the warehouse declared they had not yet made a sufficient check-up to determine whether the mohair was kid hair or goat hair, but asked that a sharp lookout for the stolen goods be kept in Del Rio.

The sheriff's department here advised the wool houses in Del Rio of the theft and will endeavor to check any mohair coming into the city.

Sacks taken from the Petersen warehouse were said to be marked "24" but it was pointed out that the mohair would be probably be re-sacked before any attempt to dispose of it was made.

The sacks were said to range between 350 and 375 pounds each.

### TEXANS TO LONDON RODEO

Allen Holder, former San Angelo and Rankin rancher, now of Midland, and Joel Whiteley, former Arizona and New Mexico resident, also of Midland, plan to attend Tex Austin's world championship rodeo at London, England, June 9 to 30. Both men are well known ropers, and took part in the Southwestern Exposition at Fort Worth.

The calf roping event alone offers total purses of \$9,000, with day moneys of \$150, \$100, \$75, \$50 and \$25 for first to fifth places respectively. Entrance fee is only \$25. In addition to the day moneys, prizes for the lowest time on all calves are first \$1,000, second \$800, third \$500 and fourth \$300.

Besides the calf roping purses, others include bronc riding \$9,000, cowgirls' bronc riding \$4,200, steer wrestling \$9,000, bareback bronc riding \$3,200, fancy roping \$3,000, trick riding \$3,000, cowgirls' trick riding \$2,600, steer riding \$3,200 and wild horse race \$3,200.

Holder will take his brown roping horse Cap on the trip. The animal was not in condition for the Fort Worth show, having skinned a hind leg while stepping out of a trailer at San Angelo the week before. —San Angelo Evening Standard.

All Terrell County awoke last Saturday morning to heavy laden skies which soon turned into a cold rain, with sleet and snow in some places. A strong north wind hit this section about daylight and soon the thermometer began to drop.

While the rain was not very heavy here in town it will help as it was very dry. Reports from the various ranches are that from one half an inch to more than an inch of rain fell. The moisture will bring relief as many ranchmen were feeding.

The weather continued cold all day Saturday and that night one of the coldest spells yet were felt. Sunday the temperature did not change and it was Tuesday before there was a change to warmer weather.

Just how heavy the losses among livestock here has not been learned. Most of the goats had been sheared while others were being sheared at the time the cold weather came. It is not thought though that the losses were as heavy here as in some sections of the State.

Newspaper reports from Del Rio stated that the total rainfall in that section over the week-end, amounted to .38 of an inch. In other parts of the State the precipitation was heavier.

Estimates place the goat loss at about 25 per cent of the total number in the State, which, with losses from previous cold spells, will cut the mohair production this fall, it is believed, by more than 2,500,000 pounds, while the kid crop apparently will be the shortest on record, less than 20 to 25 per cent, placing a premium on kid hair, Sam Ashburn states in the San Angelo Morning Times.

Country Broadcastings

Edited by Jno. V. McCall, Pastor Sanderson Presbyterian Church

The Department of Country Church Work in the Presbyterian Church U. S., has been promoting the use of a Standard for Village and Country Churches. A large wall chart is sent free to any country church in which the session will make application for it.

The Presbyterian Church at Wayside, Georgia, of which Rev. Fred E. Manning is pastor, has made a good use of the chart.

In January 1930, the Workers' Council of the Wayside Church and Sunday School met for the consideration of the Standard for Village and Country Churches. After carefully going over each item, we gave ourselves a grade of 240 out of a possible 400.

When we checked by the Standard January 1931, we gave ourselves

as a grade of 280. This is twenty less than we hoped, but fifty more than a year before. Following are some of the things we planned: 1. Increase our church membership by 32 per cent. 2. Increase church attendance by 25 per cent. 3. Increase Sunday school attendance by 30 per cent. 4. Secure a cemetery. 5. Make definite needed improvements on the church and manse. 6. Have graded socials at the church quarterly. 7. Organize a catechumen class before a week's evangelistic meeting. 8. Have a Stewardship study class. 9. Secure 50 per cent of our families taking a church paper. 10. Have a Daily Vacation Bible School at our mission church. 11. Have some of our Sunday school teachers attend a Standard Training School. 12. District the community and assign officers to each district. 13. Organize the Men of the Church. 14. Have quarterly visitation. This quarterly visitation is a sort of substitute for the survey. It is a friendly affair carried on by

members of some 20 per cent of the families." In January, 1932, it was discovered that the Wayside Church showed a grade of 340 and the goal for 1932 was set at 390.

## RECIPES AND MENUS

By Department of Home Economics  
Texas State College for Women  
(CIA)

**DENTON, March 29.**—How satisfying it is to sit down to a glass of fruit juice or some juicy fruit. There are so many ways we can serve fruits as well as a variety of fruits to be served. We have oranges, grapefruit, apples, bananas, grapes, peaches, pears, apricots, cherries, plums, as well as the dried fruits which are especially suitable during the winter months. Any fruit juice such as orange, grapefruit, grape or canned fruit juice are good served with mint or lemon to garnish; tomato juice is very pleasing for a breakfast drink.

When we think of breakfast we immediately think of eggs or bacon. Eggs are suitable for breakfast because they can be prepared in such a variety of ways. Of course we can fry them and maybe scramble them, but other ways to serve them are baked, hard cooked, soft cooked, creamed, eggs a la goldenrod, omelets, and souffles.

With the great variety of breads there is no excuse for having toasted white bread every morning. Why can't we serve variations of biscuit; orange nut, pin wheel, cheese, raisin, and fruit; cinnamon rolls, nut or fruit, whole wheat muffins, bran, date, or nut; waffles, both plain and chocolate; griddle cakes; French toast, milk toast, Welsh rarebit on toast, plain and whole wheat toast and rye, nut and raisin bread.

**Breakfast:** Orange juice, chocolate Pecan waffles, bacon, coffee, milk.  
**Luncheon:** Welch rarebit, baked corn, combination salad, date biscuit, hot chocolate.

**Dinner:** Roast beef, halved potato, buttered spinach, head lettuce, salad, bread, butter, caramel custard  
**Breakfast:** Grapefruit, bran flakes

jelly, ring biscuits, butter, coffee, coca.

**Luncheon:** Creamed salmon on toast, turnip greens, buttered green beans, bread, butter, fruit gelatin.

**Dinner:** Broiled steak, drawn butter sauce, potato puff, rolls, butter, tea, green Gage plum sherbert, Macaroons.

## Recipes

**Chocolate Pecan Waffles:** Mix 3-4 cup of flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon of salt. Add 1-2 cup of butter to 3 squares of melted chocolate. Mix 1 cup of sugar, and 3 eggs beated slightly. Blend these mixtures together and 1 cup of pecans. Have both sides of waffle iron hot. Grease well. Put tablespoon of batter in each section. Serve hot with butter and syrup.

**Date Biscuit:** Sift 2 cups of flour, 4t baking powder, 1-2 t salt, 1-4 c sugar. Cut in shortening. Add pecans, 2-3 c milk, mix to soft dough. Turn on floured board, knead slightly, roll 1-3 in. thick; cut in rounds. Bake in shallow pan in hot oven (450 F) for 15 min.
